The Power of Faith

Faith in God does not always work according to the human reason, but sees the mighty God able to accomplish all that is needed to be accomplished.

Let us look at Elijah before the prophets of Baal. He made the altar and laid the sacrifice in order, then drenched all thoroughly with water. Faith could see all consumed; the water did not daunt the faith of Elijah. God had fire enough not only to burn the sacrifice, but also the wood, stones, and even the water. This showed the power of God, and demonstrated that He was the God of the fire, water, and rain. Elijah saw it was just as easy for God to withhold the rain as to send it.

If we regard God's power and might as well as His willingness to do and give, we would not be so likely to limit Him so often and in so many things. Neither would we measure Him by our human reasoning and ideas. Faith, like Elijah, sees the rain before it falls. The little cloud meant an abundance of rain. The handful of meal meant a year's rations for three. Starvation never stared Elijah in the face while there was a God of heaven.

We see this same faith demonstrated in Elisha, another prophet of God. He foresaw a great blessing, and when Elijah tried in vain to get away from him, no doubt to test his faith and loyalty, he persistently declined to be separated from him. In this his faith was rewarded, and he received the coveted blessing which helped to make the wonderful man of God he afterwards proved to be. He stood in the test and was rewarded. We see him go forth in the faith, and nothing was impossible to him. Later we see three kings making an inquiry of him. They are about to enter into battle, but have no water for themselves nor for their beasts. In this predicament they seek the prophet and tell him their distress. He commands them "to make the valley full of ditches, and it shall be filled with water, that ye may drink, both ye and your cattle and your beasts." And with confidence and faith he continues, "This is but a light thing in the sight of the Lord." We see it demonstrated— "And the country was filled with water," which

became a blessing to them but a curse to their enemies.

A woman comes to him seeking his help in her indebtedness. Elisha asks her what she has in the house and she answers, "Nothing save a pot of oil." He says, "Go borrow thee vessels: borrow not a few." We see in this again the greatness of his faith. He was not afraid the oil would be exhausted. Get all the vessels you can; faith is expansive, it takes in all the needs, no matter how great. Faith also has its effects. Look at the woman as she poured the oil. Her faith grew as the vessels filled, and it had grown to such proportions by the time the vessels were all full that she called for more vessels. She only desired to have the debt paid, but faith reached beyond the debt, even to future needs, and we see how amply it was rewarded. 2 Kings 4:6. A great miracle was as easy for Elisha to perform as a smaller one.

We are impressed with his conduct at Dothan. When the great Syrian army came against him and entirely compassed the city where he was, Elisha's servant cried in dismay, "Alas! my master, how shall we do?" Composedly and with assurance, he answers, "Fear not, for they that be with us are more than they that be with them." "And Elisha prayed, Lord, open his eyes that he may see. And the Lord opened the eyes of the young man, and behold the mountain was full of horses and chariots of fire round about Elisha." Elisha saw the host of Syrians, but he also saw a greater host, and the greater host had power over the lesser host and he saw them subdued. He had proven God time and again and found Him to be a God of love and power, and he knew He would not forsake him in this battle. The whole Syrian army was conquered through kindness.

Faith looks away from seeming impossibilities and cries, "It shall be done." Surroundings cannot affect faith. It calls the things that are not as though they were. The promise is equal to the thing itself. Faith satisfies and is satisfied in God. There is no reaching out for things that are a hindrance to its soaring. The person of faith lives within the radius of "thus saith the Lord," perfectly satisfied with the dealings of faith and the things faith brings. Faith is not a striving and reaching for things beyond our reach, but simply seeing the very needed blessing within easy reach. We may all have this kind of faith, for it is only believing God and acting accordingly.

Have We Lost Our Vision?

When we think of the "Church," of what do we feel it consists and what is its function? Sometimes I'm afraid our vision has so dwindled that all we see are the ones whom we personally know and associate with in the truth. The Church is ALL saved people who have been made pure by Christ's blood, regardless of the understanding they have. It is true that Christ designed that his people be of such oneness that as they receive light and understanding they will form a visible body of believers. As a part of His visible body, what is God's will for the Church in the United States? I wonder sometimes if we feel that the function of the Church is just merely to meet together on Sundays, Wednesdays, and at a few campmeetings during the year and try to weed out the ones we feel are falling short of the standards we hold.

The great commission that Jesus gave to the Church was, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature." (Mark 16:15) If we are the Church (of which I feel assured we are a part), we should have more missionaries on foreign fields today proclaiming freedom to the heathen and deceived. Where are the missionaries? How many can you name that have left their homeland to spread the gospel on a foreign field?

What about home missions? The streets and ghettos are crawling with derelicts who find escape from their miserable world in a bottle or through crime. How many missions do we know of among the saints here in the United States that are reaching out to help these rejects of society? When Jesus ate with a group of sinners who were outcasts according to the religious world, His reply to the reproofs of the religious people was, "They that are whole have no need of the physician, but they that are sick: I came not to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance." Are we concerned about the welfare of the fallen?

Where are the orphanages and homes for unloved and abandoned children? Our hearts weep at the pitiful condition of unwanted children who are pushed about here and there, never knowing what love and security mean. James said, "Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, To visit the fatherless and widows . . ." Does God not have someone that He wants to use to bring in rejected children and give them love and train them in the ways of God?

In the 25th chapter of Matthew, Jesus spoke of those who would be cast into hell because they failed to minister unto the sick, the starving, the oppressed, and the poor. Could we be guilty of such neglect?

We fast and pray for the Lord to work mightily among us, but we need to consider just what God is looking for when we fast. In Isa. 58, God talked to Israel about their fasting. He told them what kind of fast was acceptable before Him and what kind was not. Israel was daily seeking God and holding to God's ordinances, but they were missing out on the true will of God. God told them: "Is not this the fast that I have chosen? to loose the bands of wickedness, to undo the heavy burdens, and to let the oppressed go free, and that ye break every yoke? Is it not to deal thy bread to the hungry, and that thou bring the poor that are cast out to thy house? when thou seest the naked, that thou cover him: . . . Then shalt thou call, and the Lord shall answer; thou shalt cry, and he shall say, Here I am."

We see missionaries both at home and abroad, orphanages, homes for wayward teens, and other efforts being directed and supported by various denominations. Are these denominations doing work that God desires His Church to do? Then why is the Church not performing these functions? Is our vision growing so dim that we cannot see needs beyond the intimate circle of the saints? God help us to get a vision of the Church and the duties that God designed it to carry out. Let us stir up our pure minds to action by looking at the needs of the countless souls in the world and realizing that administering to these needs is the duty of the Church. —Sandra Whitson

Obedience

Obedience to the precious Word of God is the only thing that will bring peace to the mind and rest to the soul. Only those who live in perfect obedience to the will of God, have true heart-satisfaction. In Matt. 4:4, we read, "Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God." If we are obedient to all His commandments we shall surely live. In Jer. 7:23, we read, "Obey my voice, and I will be your God, and ye shall be my people: and walk ye in all the ways that I have commanded you, that it may be well unto you." Through all ages, God has required perfect obedience to all His commands. One act of disobedience on the part of our forefathers in the Garden brought the disapproval of God upon them.

Saul did not obey the voice of the Lord, and the Lord was so grieved that He repented even of having made him king. The Lord told Saul to utterly destroy the Amalekites and all that they had; but Saul spared the king and the best of the sheep and oxen. He not only disobeyed the Lord, but when Samuel questioned him concerning the sheep and oxen, he tried to hide his sin by blaming someone else. He said, "The people spared them." Saul had slain part, but not all. God took no notice of Saul's partial obedience; He took notice only that the obedience was not complete. Today there are many dear souls just like Saul. They are willing to obey part of the commands of the Lord, but not all. James says, "If we offend in one point, we are guilty of all." It behooves us, therefore, to give heed all the words of the Lord. to

We sometimes find even those who profess to be followers of the Lord, who are not careful to obey the Bible. They feel that certain portions of the Scripture are non-essential. Like Saul, they say they love and obey the Lord, but they have not slain all the sheep and oxen; and the bleating of the sheep and the lowing of the oxen come up before the Lord and His people, and their sin is made known. It pays to conform our lives to the full Bible standard, then we can say from the heart, "I have kept the commands of the Lord." Then His rich graces will flood the soul and His blessings will rest upon us.

There are many precious promises in the Word of God, but they are for those who obey Him. In Isa. 1:19, 20, we find these words, "If ye be willing and obedient, ye shall eat the good of the land: but if ye refuse and rebel, ye shall be devoured with the sword: for the mouth of the Lord hath spoken it." Here we clearly see that the blessings of the Lord fall upon the obedient heart. And God requires not only obedience, but also it must be a willing obedience. Some people obey the Lord just because they know that if they do not they will be punished. This is not pleasing to the Lord. He wants our hearts so in harmony with His will that we can at all times render unto Him willing service.

God wants us not only to conform our lives to His Word, but He also wants us to perform willingly every duty that He puts upon us. At times, He may lay some duty upon us that seems hard, something we would naturally shrink from. We may obey Him simply because we know He requires it of us, but this grieves Him. Unless our service has been willing, we miss the blessing. God wants us to have our wills so given over to Him. and our hearts so submitted to His will, that even the hardest duties will be gladly performed for Jesus' sake. As we move out in obedience to His voice, He will give us the grace that we need. A sweet consciousness that He is satisfied with us will fill our souls. Many are not enjoying all the Lord has for them, because they are not as careful as they should be in obeying Him in everything.

It takes but a small thing to grieve the Spirit of the Lord, and thus cause us to miss the rich blessing He has desired to pour out upon us. Let us be careful in our daily walk before Him, render unto Him perfect obedience—willing heart-service—and we shall then eat of the good things He has prepared for those who love and obey Him.

Mission Worker Arrived in India

Dear Bro. and Sis. Pruitt and co-workers, and all saints at home and abroad: Greetings in the precious name of Jesus, the One who died for the sins of the world.

Just a few lines from India, half-way around the world. Because of fog, the overseas plane I was to take to Bombay from Los Angeles, was delayed in takeoff for about thirteen hours. This threw the whole flying schedule off. When I arrived in Singapore, my plane had already taken off for Bombay. I spent two days in Singapore, trying to get a plane to India that would get me there before the 22nd. It is very expensive to tarry any place along the way. I finally entered India through Madras on the east coast. Bro. John and Sis. Sara Varghese met me in Trivandrum on Dec. 21. It was a long five-day trip and I was exhausted, but after hours of sleep I am much recovered, for which I thank God.

The next unpleasant thing to happen was that I found ants in my bed. I didn't realize ants could bite and leave such welts. I was quite miserable with many bites on my arms, shoulders, and around my right eye. As I write this, I am much better.

We went to the bank and post office yesterday. While in town we looked for a bathtub for Madamma (me). One was finally located—aluminum, about one foot deep, and two feet wide. I can stand and stoop freely in it. It is so much better than a pan of water. Then I have the advantage of using the same water to wash out a few articles of clothing. The tub cost 60 rupees.

There were about forty out to prayer meeting last night on Christmas Eve. We had prayer and singing

in Malayalam. Then they welcomed the Madamma to India once again. I used two pictures—the manger scene and shepherd scene, as I brought a message from John 3:16, and Luke 2, on Christmas and its real meaning to a lost world. We gave everyone a pencil as a Christmas remembrance. The pencils were donated by a good Brother and Sister in the Shawnee congregation.

Christmas day was spent quietly. There were no decorations in Christian homes and no special food. In the afternoon, Sunday school children gathered in the chapel at Karikkom and quoted Scriptures. It was handled much like a spelling bee. When they could remember no other Scripture they dropped out. No one quoted less than fifteen verses, and some could quote a hundred. Then the children in the Varghese compound played a few simple games, like ring the peg, etc.

On Dec. 26, Bro. John, Sis. Sara, and I left by bus to attend the last two days of a four-day meeting. It was good to see once again those whom we contacted two years ago. We were in three preaching services and a Sunday school service (special). I brought messages on the life committed to God, Psa. 37:5, and 1 Pet. 5:6-10, and also Luke 12:13-32, on seeking God first. A number of people sought help from the Lord. It was a profitable meeting.

Bus traveling is very hard on us. It's hard to get a seat and many stand in the aisle for hours to get to their destination. When the bus came that was to bring us home, somehow Bro. Baby John and Bro. Mattunni got on the bus first and held a seat for us. Bro. John took our bags and slipped them through the window from the outside. Then it was up to us to get on the bus through the crowd that was all trying to get on. We did make it. The brothers got off and went their ways, and we were headed home. We were thankful for a seat on an overloaded bus.

I am very happy to be in the field again in India. My aim is to be faithful to precious souls. The work is great and laborers are few, but thanks be to God who giveth the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. Continue to pray for us.

Question and Answer Column

Question: Will Jesus set His feet on the earth when He comes again?

Answer: According to the way I understand the Scriptures, the answer is "No." But that will, no doubt, require some projection and explanation, and I do not guarantee that I can explain it to every one's satisfaction.

In Rev. 20:11-13, we have a description of the judgment scene in these words: "And I saw a great white throne, and him that sat on it, from whose face the EARTH and the heaven fled away; and there was found no place for them. And I saw the dead, small and great, stand before God; and the books were opened: and another book was opened, which is the book of life: and the dead were judged out of those things which were written in the books, according to their works. And the sea gave up the dead which were in it; and death and hell delivered up the dead which were in them: and they were judged every man according to their works." Note, it says in this passage that the EARTH fled away from the presence of Him Who sat on the throne. The earth was corrupt and cursed because of sin (Gen. 3:17, 6:12, and Isa. 24:5-6). When Jesus came the first time. He came clothed in a fleshly body, "In the likeness of sinful flesh" (Rom. 8:3), and He walked on the earth here among men and identified with men and took their sins on Himself that He might bear them to Calvary and there make an atonement for them. Now that has been accomplished. When He comes again "without sin unto salvation" (Heb. 9:28), in complete holiness and in the naked, unsheathed glory of the Father and surrounded with all the holy angels, He will not count the corrupt and defiled earth as a suitable and fit place for Himself and those who will accompany Him to come in contact with. He will be through with the earth forever, so will just banish it from Him as He approaches.

Peter wrote, "But the day of the Lord will come as a thief in the night; in the which the heavens shall pass away with a great noise, and the elements shall melt with fervent heat, the earth also and the works that are therein shall be burned up." 2 Peter 3:10. Paul declares that this will be "in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye," and that it will be "at the last trump." And Paul describes this coming of the Lord and the sounding of His trumpet in these words in 1 Thess. 4:14-17, "For if we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so them also which sleep in Jesus will God bring with him. For this we say unto you by the word of the Lord, that we which are alive and remain unto the coming of the Lord shall not prevent them which are asleep. For the Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God: and the dead in Christ shall rise first: then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air: and so shall we ever be with the Lord."

Now I am somewhat familiar with the doctrine of the "Rapture" which is read into this passage and is so generally taught in Christendom today. But I do not identify with that teaching, and for the simple reason that this passage makes no reference at all to the saints coming back here at the end of seven years to reign in Christ's kingdom here on the earth for a thousand years or any length of time. Quite the contrary. It says they will be caught up to meet the Lord in the air, and so shall they EVER be with the Lord up there. This is further proof that Christ will not touch His feet upon this earth again, but will come in the clouds of heaven and catch His saints up to meet Him in the air.

1 Cor. 15:52, is speaking of the same thing as 1 Thess. 4:14-17, and there this trump is called the last trump. Also, Jesus said that saints would be raised on the last day (John 6:39, 40, 44, and 54.) Can you see the folly of trying to believe or prove there will be a thousand years or any number of days at all after the **last day** or the **last trump** to call forth the wicked dead for judgment after the righteous dead have been resurrected to reign with Christ in His kingdom on the earth? The holy Scriptures do not teach such a thing, and neither do they teach that Christ will ever set His feet upon this earth again.

Now we will look at a text in Zech. 14:4, which is strongly set upon by advocates of the Millennium doctrine. It reads: "And his feet shall stand in that day upon the mount of Olives, which is before Jerusalem on the east, and the mount of Olives shall cleave in the midst thereof toward the east and toward the west, and there shall be a very great valley; and half of the mountain shall remove toward the north, and half of it toward the south." This chapter opens with the statement, "Behold, the day of the Lord cometh." Verse 3 says, "Then shall the Lord go forth." Then verse 4 says, "And his feet shall stand in that day upon the mount of Olives." Then it is clear that it is the Lord's feet that will stand there and that it will be in THE DAY OF THE LORD. Several times in this chapter reference is made to "IN THAT DAY" (verses 6, 8, 13, and 20, beside this verse 4 which we are considering). These references all refer to the DAY OF THE LORD (verse 1). No doubt, this 14th chapter of Zechariah is referring directly to events pertaining to literal Israel. Many Scriptures and prophecies that pertain to literal Israel also have a clear fulfillment in spiritual Israel (the church in this dispensation). I feel that Zech. 14:4, is in this classification as well as several other verses in this chapter. We know that Jesus often went to the mount of Olives and spent considerable time there with His disciples when He was here upon the earth. In fact, it was the last place on earth that His feet touched and He ascended to heaven from there. Jesus Christ ushered in the gospel day (the DAY OF THE LORD) and shed abroad the burning, shining light of the gospel in the world. At that time He stood on the mount of Olives time and again. But the Scriptures referred to above strongly infer that He will never touch foot on any spot on this earth again.

However, I feel that Zech. 14:4, is prophetic and figurative and refers to spiritual truths in Christ's kingdom. This mountain stood on the east side of the city of Jerusalem and afforded a commanding view of the city and the temple. The city and its temple were both types of the Church of God. Then figuratively Jesus stands on the mount of Olives overlooking and observing all the operations of the Church. The mountain cleaving in the midst and forming a very great valley between, some have interpreted as the atonement of Christ extending back to include people in the law age and extending forward to cover this grace dispensation. There is some basis for this, inasmuch as Christ was a lamb "slain from the foundation of the world." (Rev. 13:8). Others have interpreted it as referring to the removing or breaking down of the mountain or barrier or "middle wall of partition" (Eph. 2:14-15) of the law system with its ordinances and rituals which stood as an insurmountable barrier to the Gentiles and opening the way through faith and grace for the Gentiles to have an access and entrance into the Church. I can see good basis for this also, since the mountain clave to the east and to the west and also removed to the north and to the south, which would include all the cardinal points of the compass and signify the gospel to the whole world and the bringing in of every nation, kindred, tongue, and people (Rev. 7:9).

I correlate or parallel this with what is said of the ministry of John the Baptist in Luke 3:4-6, "... Prepare ye the way of the Lord, make his paths straight. Every valley shall be filled, and every mountain and hill shall be brought low; and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough ways shall be made smooth; and all flesh shall see the salvation of God." In other words, it signifies the coming of Christ, the establishing of His kingdom and the effects of His gospel to all people.

What Kind of Literature Are Your Children Reading?

I am sure that all Christian parents are interested in the spiritual welfare and development of their children. For this, I feel free to approach you on this subject.

In the evening as you gather your children around the fireside and listen to their childish prattle and merry outbursts of laughter, how your heart yearns to see them grow up to be noble men and women for God! But it is evident that they will not naturally grow that way; they must be trained in the way of the Lord. Hence, your duty as Christian parents is to lead them in the paths of righteousness. While we look into this matter, may the Lord help you to see more clearly the extent of your duty.

We all admit that as the body of a healthy child increases in size, the development of its little mind increases accordingly; and, while yet very young, the child begins to thirst for knowledge. This is manifested by the numerous questions that crowd out of its little mouth, one after another, so fast that it sometimes seems impossible to answer all of them.

It is not only through the medium of spoken language that children obtain knowledge. As they grow older and become sufficiently familiar with written language to grasp the thought, how eager they become to devour the contents of every book, magazine, or paper that falls into their hands! Here, dear parents, I would sound a note of warning. Be careful about the kind of literature you allow your children, to read.

Because many books and papers are far more detrimental than beneficial to the growing mind of your child, is no reason why you should endeavor to deprive the child of the privilege of reading. It is natural for children to desire to read, and they will read. When I was small, possibly nine or ten years of age, my father learned that his little daughter was reading some of his old novels. This, of course, he knew would never do, so the books were destroyed; but no new supply of good, wholesome, interesting literature for children was furnished, consequently my desire for reading novels did not vanish away with the smoke of the burning rubbish. I began to seek for such reading elsewhere; and while at school, managed to secure and read a number of novels. Fortunately for me, however, I was saved at an early age, and that ended my novel reading. But, as I said, children will read, so it behooves their parents to be careful about the choice of their reading matter. See to it that they early cultivate a taste for good literature, then they will not be so likely to be bothered about wanting to read the other kind. -Elsie E. Egermeier

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Kicking Against the Pricks

A prick is a goad or sharp instrument. When a young ox was yoked to a cart for the first time, he did not like it and quite often tried to kick the cart to pieces. The master would fix a bar with a row of wooden spikes, and every time the ox tried to kick the cart he hit his legs against the spikes and hurt himself. Very soon he learned that it was better for him to be obedient to the reins and to the yoke.

Jesus is calling all of us to come to Him and to take His yoke upon us. He said His yoke is easy and His burden is light. Too many of us are like Paul was when Jesus told him, "It is hard for thee to kick against the pricks." There he was, on his way with the letters to give him the authority to bring men and women to Jerusalem to be cast into prison, or perhaps, even to be stoned to death as dear Bro. Stephen had been while Paul stood by consenting to his death.

I feel Paul had lots to think about on the road to Damascus. Surely he had to think of Stephen's sweet spirit in the hour of his death. Stephen had taken upon himself the yoke of Christ; he did not try to break that yoke but submitted to it in gentleness, kindness, and with a true heart. All who sat in the council looking steadfastly on him saw his face as it had been the face of an angel. Should Paul have been there, too, surely it would have troubled him. Stephen's last words, "Lord, lay not this sin to their charge," were enough to have broken the hardest heart. But on Paul went, kicking against the pricks, until Jesus shined that light round about him and he fell to the ground. The Lord spoke and Paul asked, "Who art thou, Lord?" The Lord answered, "I am Jesus whom thou persecutest. It is hard for thee to kick against the pricks." Then he began to tremble. "What will you have me to do?" was Paul's submissive reply.

Oh, the change! There Paul was, a man of authority to bind others for serving the Lord Jesus, now humbly asking the Lord what He wanted him to do. Paul was willing to take upon himself the yoke of Christ and to learn of Him—to learn how meek and lowly He is. Paul found pleasure and peace in serving the Lord to the extent he said, "Nothing shall separate me from the love of Christ!"

Young people are giving themselves over to fornication and adultery until they are so bound by the passions of the flesh that they cannot free themselves. But we hear Jesus calling, "Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls." (Matt. 11:28-29) Jesus can break the bondage of sin and cleanse and make you free. Oh, dear soul, stop kicking against the Lord and let Jesus come in and give you glorious freedom. —Sis. Margaret Eck

"Open Thy Mouth Wide"

"I am the Lord thy God, which brought thee out of the land of Egypt: open thy mouth wide, and I will fill it." Psa, 81:10.

I have heard many people, including some ministers say, "The Bible says, open your mouth and I will fill it," thereby meaning that we should not study what or how to testify, pray, or preach, but just open the mouth and expect the Lord to fill it with a testimony, prayer, or sermon without any effort on our part to prepare ourselves. Such people seem to forget that we are admonished in the Scriptures to "Search the Scriptures," "Think on these things," "Give thyself to reading," "Study to show thyself approved of God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed."

The truth in this text is fittingly illustrated by a mother bird's treatment toward her nest of young. When she comes with food, and gives notice of the fact, every mouth opens wide, and when every bird is satisfied, she stops making trips. So the Lord will supply all our need. When we ask it shall be given. The text has reference to temporal supplies, but in the light of the New Testament it means all our needs, both temporal and spiritual. In the picture of this text the people of God are the birds, and God

says. "Open thy mouth wide, and I will fill it." He means He has delivered them out of an awful state of bondage, and will surely supply their needs if they will open their mouth and ask Him. But we must not forget that He supplies both temporal and spiritual needs on conditions. He feeds the birds, but He does not scratch for them. And He feeds us, but we must plow and pull weeds or do our part in some other way. God's law is, "In the sweat of thy face shalt thou eat bread." One must not say, "Give us this day our daily bread," and open his mouth toward heaven and expect God to fill it with food. Neither should we neglect reading, meditation, nor prayer and expect to come to meeting with a convincing testimony, a fervent prayer, a stirring sermon. But there is real comfort in the fact that God will work and provide where we cannot, and will make our work a success if we do it in the spirit of this text. -David L. Walker

The Value of a Testimony

God's people are God's witnesses. Each can tell something that God has done for him. When we tell what God has done for us, it will interest someone else, especially those who feel the need of such blessing as we have obtained. If we testify how the Lord forgave us, it will interest those who feel the load of guilt; if we tell how God has sanctified our souls, it will interest and instruct those who feel the need of heart purity. If we testify to having been healed of some disease, it will interest and encourage the sick to trust God for healing. If we had a sore temptation, and God has graciously helped us through it, and we relate the experience, it is highly encouraging to any who may be in trial or temptation. Sometimes we have very peculiar trials and very peculiar feelings, and the enemy tries hard to discourage us and to get us to give up, but by God's help we overcome. To tell such experiences of help from God, is very helpful to others.

Let us be witnesses for God. Someone may be needing the very help or comfort you have been receiving; therefore, be sure and tell it out. If after a good sermon is preached, someone arises and testifies to an experience in demonstration of the thought presented, the testimony has the effect of riveting the truth upon the hearts of the hearers.

Some have had remarkable answers to prayer; some have received special comfort in times of trouble and sorrow; some have received grace to bear meekly the most abusive and insulting conduct; some have been healed of sore afflictions—all of these can, by telling their experiences, be a great help to others.

Let us testify; you may not be eloquent, nor even free of speech, but the fact, the experience, is what counts for good. Your own manner of talking is much better for you than the language of someone else.

"Ye are my witnesses, saith the Lord." If God has done anything for you, be sure and witness to that fact. This will increase your own faith and grace, and help others. -R. L. Berry
