Emotionalism

"The tendency to be emotional or to show emotion quickly and easily, an appeal to sway an audience to some belief: emotionalist: a person who uses or relies on emotions or emotional effects: or feeling." (Webster's Dictionary).

When it comes to something as important and as valuable as our soul, it is not safe to rely on emotions or feelings. Emotion means feeling physical excitement. I would like to say here that feeling has very little to do with our salvation. There are times of good feeling and rejoicing, but that is not salvation. It is only the results of having a deep settled peace down deep in our souls.

The devil works through our emotions. False prophets work on the emotions of the people. They get people all worked up; they jump, shout, clap their hands, and the people go home feeling good—with less money and no help to their souls.

I remember one night in camp meeting some years ago, we had a big emotional meeting, and about forty went to the altar. The next day there was a baptizing service, and only four wanted to be baptized.

Some folks rely on emotions to the extent that when they don't feel some physical excitement they feel like they are not saved any more. Some think that if someone is not outwardly emotional they are not saved, or they are not what they ought to be. I know a lot of saints that I have never seen shout or make any great outward emotional display, but they are just as solid as a rock. You can depend on them; they are faithful when there is something to do. When there is a sacrifice to be made, they are always there. At the same time the one who was jumping so high is the one who has gotten their feelings hurt and are off somewhere feeling sorry for themselves, or have become discouraged, or may have completely given up.

Some years ago there was a fellow who made the rounds of the camp meetings. He could jump about as high as anyone I have ever seen, but when the camp meetings were over he left and we haven't seen him since. It reminds me of when I was a boy growing up

on a farm. We had a young horse that we never could break to work right. You could hook it to a plow and it was so emotional that it would run about twenty feet and stop. Then when you got it started again it might just run side ways and break down a lot of corn. At the end of the day you were just worn out and had not accomplished very much. Then we had an old mule that was really slow. You could hook it up to the plow and it would go all day long. It might look like you weren't doing very much, but when the day was over you had accomplished much more.

Emotionalism can be dangerous. I think back during the war of how some leader would get all excited and all worked up. He would charge right into the enemy and not only lose his own life, but cause many good soldiers to fall by the wayside. The Bible says to "ponder the path of thy feet, and let all thy ways be established." Prov. 4:26. Peter seemed to be an emotional man. He told Christ that he would follow Him even unto death, but when the test came, he could not carry it out. Another time his emotions got the best of him and he cut off a man's ear, but Jesus reproved him for it.

Yes, it is good to have good feelings, be able to shout, and have great ambitions; however you cannot live on them. Some days you will feel like the bottom has dropped out. The devil says, "Now you have lost it all. If you were saved you wouldn't feel this way. You know the preacher said you should be shouting for joy." Then you may think, "I guess I'm just not saved any more." That doesn't mean anything unless you have committed sin or done something to grieve the Spirit. In place of feeling, check the fruit you are bearing: love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, and temperance. The fruit is what tells us what we really are. It is not what we feel like.

I like to see someone get tired of sin and the ways of the world, bow before the Lord and make a covenant with Him, then be like the old mule—just go at it day by day. The wise man said that "the race is not to the swift, nor the battle to the strong, neither yet bread to the wise, nor yet riches to men of understanding, nor yet favor to men of skill." Let us run this race with patience looking unto Jesus the Author and Finisher of our faith. An old saying is that, "still water runs deep." Don't try to live on feelings, but live by faith.

"Except It Be For Fornication"

This phrase found in Matt. 19:9, has been the source of much dispute in the religious world. Most denominations teach that it allows the innocent party to divorce an unclean companion and marry another. This is not the right interpretation, and I am glad the saints teach against double marriages.

Some time ago in reading this chapter, my attention was called to verse 3: "The Pharisees also came

unto him, tempting him, and saying unto him, Is it lawful for a man to put away his wife for every cause?" In what way was this a temptation? Smith's Bible Dictionary under the article "Divorce" tells us there were two different views concerning this question: Rabbi Shammai teaching that divorce was limited to moral delinquency in the woman, while the school of Rabbi Hillel taught it was allowed for trifling causes, e. g. if the wife burnt the food she was cooking for her husband. Now we see how Jesus was tempted. Whichever side of the question Jesus took, He would lose the favor of the other group. The question was not what was to be taught under the church Jesus was to build, but what did the divorce law Moses had given, which law was still in effect, really taught. We find that law in Deut. 24:1-4:

"When a man hath taken a wife, and married her, and it come to pass that she find no favour in his eyes, because he hath found some uncleanness in her: then let him write her a bill of divorcement, and give it in her hand, and send her out of his house. And when she is departed out of his house, she may go and be another man's wife. And if the latter husband hate her, and write her a bill of divorcement, and giveth it in her hand, and sendeth her out of his house; or if the latter husband die, which took her to be his wife; her former husband, which sent her away, may not take her again to be his wife, after that she is defiled; for that is abomination before the Lord: . . ."

This law, the law of Moses, was abolished, or fulfilled, when Jesus died on the cross, and we find no provision for divorce and remarriage under the law of grace.

Paul gives us Christ's law in 1 Cor. 7:10: "And unto the married I command, yet not I, but the Lord, Let not the wife depart from her husband: but and if she depart, let her remain unmarried, or be reconciled to her husband: and let not the husband put away his wife."

Again Paul, in Rom. 7:2, 3, says, "For the woman which hath an husband is bound by the law to her husband so long as he liveth; but if the husband be dead, she is loosed from the law of her husband. So then if, while her husband liveth, she be married to another man, she shall be called an adulteress: but if her husband be dead, she is free from that law; so that she is no adultress, though she be married to another man."

Therefore, in the New Testament dispensation under the law of Christ, only one marriage is allowed as long as both companions remain alive.

Okla.—Dear saints everywhere: Greetings in Jesus' precious name. I want to write our testimony of how the Lord spared our lives when we were involved in an auto accident. We also want to thank everyone who sent flowers, cards, love offerings, and all the many prayers that went up for us. We pray that the Lord will bless every person that was so kind to us.

On October 30, 1982, about 2:55 a. m., we were driving home from my husband's parents', and were struck at an intersection. We had been with my husband's mother who was very sick. I saw the other car just before it hit us, but I didn't have time to say anything. My husband, myself, and our oldest daughter, Tammy (nine years old at the time), were knocked unconscious instantly. It was approximately 20 to 30 minutes before the ambulance arrived. When I first regained consciousness a paramedic was talking to me asking my name. I am amazed at how calm the Lord kept me. I asked him how Jerry and the girls were. I couldn't see very well until I was in the emergency room at the hospital. I listened to hear signs of life from my little girls and Jerry. Jerry was groaning in agony, and our youngest daughter (four years old at the time) was crying so pitifully. Oh! how I needed the Lord to lean on! I could not hear a sound from Tammy, and this scared me. Our seven-year-old daughter, Jody, was talking and answering questions, so I knew she was all right. Thank God for sparing Jody from being hurt. She prayed for us the half hour before anyone got there. When I regained consciousness I could hear Jody praying, "Jesus, please don't let Mommy and Daddy die."

The paramedics told me that I had hit the main artery close to my temple area, and I could feel myself bleeding badly. They told me that they were worried about me because they couldn't get the bleeding to stop. I also had four ribs broken next to my spine. I prayed to the Lord that He would let me live to raise my children. It was 4:00 a. m., before they got us to the hospital and I was still bleeding from the gash in my temple. It was a deep gash and required twenty stitches on the inside and twenty on the outside. The doctor told me he was amazed that I was alive, and that it almost hit my skull. Oh, how I praise the Lord for sparing my life!

My husband Jerry never woke up until he arrived at the hospital. His lower jaw was broken in two places, and was wired shut for seven weeks. He also had some broken ribs in his chest, a head concussion, and a severely damaged right ankle. Our car was struck towards the front on my husband's side. If it would have been hit a little farther back, Jerry would have been killed for sure, and possibly some of the rest of us. . . .

Tammy had a broken arm and fractured wrist, a head concussion, and severe cuts on her feet. Rhonda had a severe blow to her left eye and cheek. Her face was swollen so badly that it was hard to recognize her. We are so thankful that we are in as good health as we are, and that Jody was spared from being hurt. Jerry is the only one of us left now with any severe problem. His right ankle is still in need of prayer; we're looking to the Lord to heal it completely. The Lord has brought us this far and He will not forsake us now.

I think of the song: "What Satan tried his worst to do, my Lord was by my side I knew. He answered prayer and took me through, He will not fail me now!" Praise the Lord! All praise, honor, and glory to God our Father, and to our Savior Jesus Christ, in whose Name all things are possible.

Although I had come to know the Lord in my teens, the cares and pleasures of this world slowly and surely caused me to lose my salvation, and it was so gradual that I didn't realize it for a long time. I thank our merciful God that He didn't give up on me, and about four years ago caused me to realize my lost condition. I then made the decision to seek His

forgiveness and to live for Him the rest of my life. I had to make some restitutions and ask forgiveness from several people, but I was determined that nothing was going to deprive me of a clear title, and I thank Him for helping me make right all He showed me that needed to be straightened out.

In the late 1930's, I sprained my right ankle so badly that I was on crutches for a couple of weeks or so. Since then it seemed that ankle was weak and very easily sprained. Then in 1948, while commercial fishing in Alaska, I turned that ankle so severely that a bone must have been broken, for a small knot came just below the ankle bone that never went away. I have been on crutches three or four times since 1948 because of a sprain in that same ankle. A few weeks ago, on a Friday evening, I turned that ankle again and suffered more severe pain than I ever had before. Of course I immediately asked the Lord for help and my wife prayed for me, too. We put an ice pack on it for twenty minutes or so, then wrapped it tightly with an elastic bandage. The pain by then had let up some, but did not go away; however, the Lord gave me a good night's rest. I work as a security guard at a plywood mill and was scheduled to work an eighthour shift the next day. We told the Lord we were going to trust Him for healing and did not call my supervisor to have someone take my place. Although it was painful to walk the next morning, I knew the Lord could heal me completely, and believed that He would, so I went on to work as usual. With quite a bit of pain I began my rounds, and as I walked through the deserted mill I sang songs of praise to God. Before completing the first round the pain was gone, and by the end of my shift I had walked about twelve miles and climbed more than 500 steps. Bless the name of Jesus, there has been no pain or trouble since!

I had told the Lord before this experience that if I could serve Him better by enduring pain and affliction, or if some soul could be saved through my suffering, my greatest desire is to do His will. I know that His promise that His grace is sufficient for me is true and will never fail. Please pray for me that I may be in His will always, and that my life will be as a shining light to all around me so they may see Jesus Christ in me and be drawn to Him.

Christian Instruction in Home Life

The Duties of the Husband

The husband is to be the head of the home in the honor and fear of God. "For I know him, that he will command his children and his household after him. and they shall keep the way of the Lord, to do justice and judgment . . ." Gen. 18:19. He is not to live with a woman and raise children by her and then leave her and expect the welfare to take care of his children while he goes to consort with another woman. This is an abomination in the sight of God which both the man and woman will answer for when they stand before the Judge of this world. "But if any provide not for his own, and especially for those of his own house, he hath denied the faith, and is worse than an infidel." 1 Tim. 5:8. Titus 2:6, says, "Young men likewise exhort to be sober minded" or discreet; wise; prudent; cautious; not rash. Sober mindedness in young men is a rare qualification, but will keep him from excess of and immature decisions when he is establishing a home.

The husband is to regard his wife in honor and respect, care, and protect her as the weaker vessel. "Likewise, ye husbands, dwell with them according to knowledge giving honor unto the wife, as unto the weaker vessel, and as being heirs together of the grace of life; that your prayers be not hindered." 1 Peter 3:7.

Husbands are to love their wives. "So ought men to love their wives as their own bodies. He that loveth his wife loveth himself. For no man ever yet hated his own flesh: but nourisheth and cherisheth it, even as the Lord the church." Eph. 5:28, 29. "... husbands, love your wives, even as Christ also loved the church and gave himself for it." Eph. 5:25.

What does it mean to love the wife or the husband? The English word "love" does not express the real meaning of the Greek word for love, "agape." which is used throughout the New Testament. This is a new creation of the Christian faith. It is a concern or giving of love with the characteristics of 1 Cor. 13, which says, "... seeketh not her own." It is the perfect love God showed to us when He gave His Son for our redemption. It is a new dimension or degree of love that husbands should love their wives as Christ loved the Church and gave Himself for it. If a husband or wife does not feel love for their partner any more, they are talking about affection that is lost because they have not been concerned for them by this love that comes only from God, and they are displeasing God and not obeying His Word.

The Duties of the Wife

The wife's attitude and attention to the home life is certainly of greatest importance in establishing a good home. A woman can never expect to build a godly home without the God-ordained sanctity of marriage. The great need of a man or woman is to have someone to care for them or love them, and God has provided the only true way that this can be fulfilled. A woman who allows a man to take advantage of this need in her life is only allowing herself to be a power of Satan and thus will damn her soul. "What? Know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost which is in you, which ye have of God, and ye are not your own? For ye are bought with a price: therefore glorify God in your body, and in your spirit which are God's."

The wife's attitude and attention in the home probably has much more influence upon the children than the husband, as she spends much more time with them. "Likewise, ye wives, be in subjection to your own husbands; that, if any obey not the word, they also may without the word be won by the conversation [behavior] of the wives; while they behold your chaste conversation [behavior] coupled with fear. Whose adorning let it not be that outward adorning of plaiting the hair, and of wearing of gold, or of putting on of apparel; but let it be the hidden man of the heart, in that which is not corruptible, even the ornament of a meek and quiet spirit, which is in the sight of God of great price." 1 Pet. 3:1-4.

Probably one of the greatest pitfalls in the family today is when the wife or mother of the home goes

out to work and has to leave the children with a baby sitter. This is a sad situation, especially when young children are involved and need the love and care of a mother. Many women are left today with small children and there is no father to help care or supply their needs. This brings a strong temptation to break their vows with God and one another, and enter into a double marriage. This is adultery in the sight of God (Matt. 19:9). It is better to please God and suffer lone-liness than go to a devil's hell.

Wives should love their husbands (Titus 2:4). They should reverence them even as a Christian reverences God (Eph. 5:33). Submitting to one another in the family brings harmony as it does in the family of God. "Submitting yourselves to one another in the fear of God. Wives, submit yourselves unto your own husbands, as unto the Lord. For the husband is the head of the wife, even as Christ is the head of the church: and he is the saviour of the body. Therefore as the church is subject unto Christ, so let the wives be to their own husbands in every thing." Eph. 5:21-24.

Question and Answer Column

Question: In the light of such Scriptures as Rev. 20:11, 2 Peter 3:7-14, and Mark 13:31, please explain Psalms 104:5, which says, "Who [God] laid the foundations of the earth, that it should not be removed for ever."

Answer: First, let us get these Scriptures set forth. Rev. 20:11, says, "And I saw a great white throne, and him that sat on it, from whose face the earth and the heaven fled away; and there was found no place for them." I will not insert all of 2 Pet. 3:7-14, but just the verses that apply directly to this question. Verse 7 says, "But the heavens and the earth, which are now, by the same word are kept in store, reserved unto fire against the day of judgment and perdition of ungodly men." Verses 10-12, say, "But the day of the Lord will come as a thief in the night; in the which the heavens shall pass away with a great noise, and the elements shall melt with fervent heat, the earth also and the works that are therein shall be burned up. Seeing then that all these things shall be dissolved, what manner of persons ought ye to be in all holy conversation and godliness, looking for and hasting unto the coming of the day of God, wherein the heavens being on fire shall be dissolved, and the elements shall melt with fervent heat?" In Mark 13:31, Jesus said "Heaven and earth shall pass away . . ."

There is one established law for interpreting Scripture which is known as "The unanimity of faith." What that means is that any text on any given subject must be interpreted in harmony with every other text in the entire canon of Scripture on that same subject.

If we find any text on the subject which contradicts our interpretation of a given Scripture, we can be sure we have missed the mark somewhere. There is certainly no contradictions in the Scriptures when we understand them properly. 2 Tim. 2:13, says that God remaineth faithful and cannot deny Himself. And that is just exactly what He would be doing if He taught one thing in any part of the Scripture and a contradictory thing in some other part.

In this question we do have an apparent contradiction. Mark 13:31, says that "heaven and earth shall pass away," and Psalms 104:5, says the earth shall "not be removed for ever." Mark 13:31, is a direct statement of Jesus Himself; therefore, it cannot be gainsaid or tampered with. I therefore set upon it as an anchor text and that it establishes beyond all doubt that the earth will pass away. Then applying the fixed law of "Unanimity of faith" we will have to find grounds for making Psalms 104:5, harmonize with what Jesus said in Mark 13:31.

In Cruden's Concordance, at the top of his references on "for ever" he inserts this note: "Many believe that the words for ever or everlasting are not to be taken as synonymous with eternal, as being without end, but to be understood merely as meaning a very long time, to be left indeterminate. There seems to be a considerable amount of argument in favor of this in many cases, but it is not safe to conclude that it always should be so limited." Matthew Henry, in his commentary, comments at this place, "To the end of time." With us in general and from time immemorial, the term "for ever" has been used as applying to the duration of a thing or to its termination.

I will insert some Scripture where "for ever" is used which in no way possible could be interpretated as referring to eternal or without end.

In Gen. 43:9, Judah said to his father, Jacob, concerning his youngest brother, Benjamin, "I will be surety for him; of my hand shalt thou require him: if I bring him not unto thee, and set him before thee, then let me bear the blame for ever." Again in Gen. 44:32, Judah said to his brother, Joseph, in regard to Benjamin again, "For thy servant became surety for the lad unto my father, saying, If I bring him not unto thee, then I shall bear the blame to my father for ever." In both of these texts referring to the same thing, it is clear beyond question that the term "for ever" could not possibly refer to eternal or without end because neither Judah nor his father would live that long or be bearing blame in eternity.

In Exodus 21:5, 6, it says, "And if the servant shall plainly say, I love my master, my wife, and my children; I will not go out free: then his master shall bring him unto the judges; he shall also bring him to the door, or unto the door post; and his master shall bore his ear through with an aul; and he shall serve him for ever." This would clearly refer to the remainder of his life and not eternally without end.

Lev. 25:23, says, "The land shall not be sold for ever . . ." Again "for ever" in this text would refer to the termination of a specified period because land is not bought and sold in eternity.

This could go on and on with this kind of Scripture, but it is not necessary. This is sufficient to establish the fact that the term "for ever" is used quite generally throughout the Old Testament Scriptures as referring to the duration or termination of any specified period of time, or a very long time.

But what about Psalms 104:5? It says the earth shall not be removed for ever. Well, when it runs head-on into our anchor text that the earth shall pass away (Jesus Himself said this in Mark 13:31), then we have to make Psalms 104:5, agree with what Jesus said because He is the supreme authority. But in view of the above texts and the general, common use of the term "for ever" in the Scriptures, this is not a very big problem. It will only be a problem to some folks who are hung up on some private interpretation to support some private doctrine. And all of these texts, and many more, give support to Matthew Henry's commentary at this place (Psa. 104:5) that "for ever" means "To the end of time."

"Pray Ye Therefore The Lord Of The Harvest. . . ."

Dear Saints everywhere: My burden today is for the effective work of our missionary effort in foreign lands. To follow the way of sectism in establishing the Church of God will bear little fruit for the Kingdom of God. Most countries have closed their doors to missionaries and are trying to remove most of those who have been there for a long time. So it is for us to get the truth established in the hearts of the people that they may be the missionaries in their own countries.

God is in need of dedicated young men and women to take this truth and help teach those who accept it. It is not necessary to stay long periods of time but several months or whatever is necessary. These shorter visits can be done on a tourist visa and allowed for different periods of time. Can we have a burden in the Church at large to designate our missionary offerings or have special offerings for the purpose of paying the fare of someone here to go to these lands? The saints have always been liberal givers for the spreading of the gospel when they know what the need is. The air ticket to Africa is around \$1,600.00, and to India it is about the same; to the Philippines is about \$1100.00. Those of us who have gone have been able to pay our own way so far, but it is becoming more difficult and our bodies are not as able to withstand the strain as the younger saints.

This is not a plea to discontinue our regular giving as we are doing to the native churches until they get established in the truth and are able to support themselves. It is just as necessary to establish the churches in these countries the same as they were established here in the same practices (in principle) and standards (in principle) in order that the native saints be established in the truth and teach it to others.

There is a new church started in Ghana who is needing someone to go and help them get established in the truth. Bro. Jim, who is the overseer there, reported that they had over 100 in their first meeting after Sis. Kaiser left. Sis. Kaiser is desirous of going back if no younger person is able to go. Also, there are two young churches in the Philippines that are desiring someone to visit them and teach them. Nigeria also has a number who are seeking help to get established.

Will your congregation take a bigger part of this world-wide outreach? I have not mentioned all the needs, such as Mexico, Central America, a number of West Indies Islands, Canada, Puerto Rico, and others. The Lord has brought a number of young men into the ministry in the last year and for this we praise God, but our burden today is that we all be stirred with compassion for the many souls who are dying in the clutches of Satan, and are waiting for deliverance for their souls. We cannot leave this burden to sectism for God has entrusted us with the truth as He chose the Israelites of old to learn of the true ways of God

A little Negrito man who was chief of a tribe in the mountains of the Philippines came down from his tribe to where we had a meeting, and after the meeting he clasped my hand with both of his, and said, "Will you come up and teach us of that 'book'?" Can we, who have so many of the blessings of God, deny this desire of many people? Will you pray earnestly for these needs? Prov. 29:18, says, "Where there is no vision, the people perish." Not only those who do not know the Saviour will perish but we, too, will become lean in our souls if we neglect our part. The church that is mission-minded is a church on fire.

"Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he would send forth labourers into his harvest." Luke 10:2. —Bro. George Hammond
