Distinguishing the Church

Mankind today is swamped with a great number of churches and religious groups that testify that they have and are holding to the "truth," or the doctrine of the gospel. They go by many different names. Some even use the title "Church of God." These religious groups are made up of people who have different motives and reasons for their affiliation with the group they are in. Some, no doubt, are seeking God and His truth. As they understand more from God, they respond to His leadings and walk in that new understanding. As they do, God will lead them to see the error of manrule and Babel's confusion.

Then there are those who join for convenience sake, for social and political notice, and those who join to have their "itching ears" soothed by teachers who say what they want to hear. Perhaps this last group would account for the vast number of churches that are in existence today.

We know Christ has only one body (Eph. 4:4), and that body is not divided (1 Cor. 1:13). Yet we see in those churches that testify of having the truth that they live such contrary lives to each other. They cannot agree together on the doctrine, and they have a varied list of do's and don'ts, yet live most worldly and unholy lives. Even in the individual congregations, jealousy and carnality abound. There is backbiting, striving for leadership or preeminence, and to have one's way; they are jealous over the different offices in the church. I knew of one case where there was much contention over who would be the piano player. You can see in these churches a lack of brotherly love and preferring their brother (Rom. 12:10).

In the churches of today, there is large-scale confusion on the doctrines of the Bible and what is the truth. It is little wonder they present to the people the question: Which is the right church, and which is the wrong church? Or even to the point that some will ask, "Is there anything to religion or Christianity at all?" The Word tells us that God is not the author of confusion (1 Cor. 14:33), so we must conclude that if a church is bogged down in and manifesting confusion, it is not the true Church or Body of Christ.

The devil is sharp and cunning. He has a church made to order for every type of person except those who want the truth. The devil was, and still is, a murderer from the beginning, never abode in the truth, is a liar and the father of lies (John 8:44). He cannot create a pure and holy church. Only one of purity and holiness himself can produce seed that will bring forth purity, holiness, and godliness. We can find that only in Jesus Christ, the Son of God, "Who did no sin, neither was guile [deceit] found in his mouth." 1 Pet. 2:22.

How then is one who is honestly seeking the truth and the visible body of Christ to know which way to go and in what group to put confidence? How is one to know when he or she has found the truth? The answer lies in the Word of God: In John 8:32, "And ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free", I believe Jesus himself answers the question. We have here a testimony from Jesus as to what the truth will do in a person's life when one accepts and lives up to it, ". . . and the truth shall make you free." Praise God! If any church or religious organization professing Christ as their shepherd and having the truth is not free, then we must also conclude that it is not of the truth.

From what does the truth free us? First and most important is sin. Jesus came to "... save His people from their sins." Matt. 1:21. If a church still believes you must sin and cannot help but sin, then that church is not of the truth. "Whosoever abideth in him sinneth not: whosoever sinneth hath not seen him, neither known him." 1 John 3:6. If a church says it expects its members to follow their way in sin and see the Lord, then that is not of the truth, "Follow peace with all men, and holiness [sinlessness], without which no man shall see the Lord." Heb. 12:14.

If a church professes holiness, and yet worldliness is in its members' lives, in their dress, speaking, homes, entertainment, and it is hard, if not impossible to distinguish them from those churches which do not profess holiness, then the truth is not there. "Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world. If any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him." 1 John 2:15.

Jesus came to free us from the carnal life—that which is the root of the problem. John the Baptist said, "And now also the ax is laid unto the root of the trees: . . ." Matt. 3:10. Those fleshly appetites must be mortified by the Spirit for us to be free (Rom. 8:13). Then if a church does not teach dying out to self and fleshly appetites, and persists in the idea of serving God and self at the same time, it is not of the truth. "So then they that are in the flesh cannot please God." Rom. 8:8.

The truth will free from pride, anger, lust, envy, hatred, jealousy, backbiting, worldliness, lies, seeking preeminence, filthy habits of the flesh, immodesty, selfishness, and any other thing that violates the purity of Christ and is not of His Spirit and Word. The truth, and only the pure, unabridged truth, will be able to stand at the judgment without guilt. Jesus said, "... I am ... the truth ... no man

cometh unto the Father, but by me." John 14:6.

If any church professes to be in the truth, yet its members are not manifesting the fruit you would expect to find in and manifested by Christ, then it is safe to say there is no seed of Christ in that church. "Wherefore by their fruits ye shall know them." Matt. 7:20

The true Church that Jesus established is that Jerusalem that is from above and is free (Gal. 4:26—free from manrule and man's carnality. In the true body of Christ, Christ himself is the head (Eph. 5:23), not man, not a board, nor a committee, but Christ.

"If the Son therefore shall make you free, ye shall be free indeed." John 8:36. Indeed means: certainly; truly; admittedly; often used to give emphasis. The emphasis of the true Church then is freedom from sin, self (or carnality), manrule, Satan, anything and anyone that would hinder us from worshipping God ". . . in Spirit and in truth." John 4:24.

If what you are in is not free indeed, wholly and completely, and teaching the pure, true gospel of freedom in Christ Jesus, then the cry goes out, "Wherefore come out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing; and I will receive you." 2 Cor. 6:17.

Thank God for the truth! Thank God for freedom!

Thank God for a Church that not only teaches the truth, but one that lives the truth—The Church of God!

"Will Ye Also Go Away?"

In the sixth chapter of John, we find where Jesus was being followed by a large multitude. They had been observing the miracles that Jesus performed on those who were diseased, etc., and now they were following Him. Notice the reason they were following Jesus: "And a great multitude followed him, because they saw his miracles. . . . " John 6:2. In verses 5-13 of this same chapter, we have the account of yet another miracle—the feeding of the five thousand. It seemed that in the eyes of the people this miracle just put the crowning touch, so to speak, on all that Jesus had done before them. Many of them affirmed, "This is of a truth that prophet that should come into the world." When Jesus perceived that the people were ready to take Him by force and make Him their king. he departed from them and went alone up into the mountain. That night Jesus and His disciples crossed the sea of Galilee and entered Capernaum.

The next day the people perceived that Jesus was not there, so they also crossed over to Capernaum and there found Jesus. From outward appearance it seemed that these people were really zealous in following Christ. No doubt many exerted much effort to cross the sea of Galilee and find Jesus, but what was the reason for their pursuit after Christ? Was it for spiritual benefits or for their own personal satisfaction and well-being? In verse 26, "Jesus answered them and said, Verily, verily, I say unto you, Ye seek me, not because ye saw the miracles, but because ye did eat of the loaves, and were filled."

Christ began to instruct the people according to their spiritual needs, and not to labor for the meat that perisheth, but for that which endureth unto everlasting life; to become partakers of Him, the Living Bread, that Bread which satisfieth that deep, inner hunger for something other than natural food—the craving of the spirit. But the people became offended at the teachings of Jesus; they could not and would not understand what He was trying to teach them. Their hearts were set on earthly things; they wanted a sign, something they could see with their literal eyes, something they could feel with their hands, and taste in their mouths. Then we find in verse 66, "From that time many of his disciples went back, and walked no more with him." Oh, what a sad picture is painted before us here. What have these people done? They have turned from the only source of true wealth, happiness, and satisfaction. If there is only one source through which something may be obtained, and if that one source is rejected, what hope is there?

This was, no doubt, very grievous to Jesus. No doubt His heart was torn as He saw the people slowly walking away. I would like to imagine that Christ, when He had finished speaking to the multitude, just began to observe the people, waiting to see how they would respond to His words. We see the people begin to talk among themselves, and then we see two or three over here start to walk away, then three or four over there are leaving, and finally a great number have left until there are just a few left with Jesus and His twelve disciples. Then in deep sorrow Jesus turns to His disciples and asks, "Will ye also go away?"

Dear saints, this same question is being asked to us today. There have always been people who, after following Christ for awhile, become unwilling to continue on. I can think of quite a number with whom I have been acquainted in my short life time, who had once tasted of the good things of God, and some that once broke the Bread of Life and gave it out to others, who have gone back and walk no more with Him. What have they gone back to? What is there to go back to? Nothing but the temporary, perishable, fleeting, trifling things of the world. Maybe it's for prestige, the honor of men, worldly pleasure, or tobacco, a television, etc. Is it worth it? These things will have absolutely no value to us when we stand before God at the Judgment, but if they stand between us and God, they will be as a mountain.

I have been reading of late in Fox's Book of Martyrs of the sufferings and tortures that thousands of the early Christians went through because of their faith in God and refusal to bow and worship the pagan gods, or to accept the teachings and practice of Catholicism. What courage and valour these saints manifested as they were tortured and killed! How steadfast and unmoveable they were from their faith and trust in God! We are not being faced today with physical abuse, tortures, etc. but we are faced with something just as deadly, or even more so, and that is compromise. Physical abuse and torture cannot

separate us from God; but compromise can. Abuse and torture cannot harm the soul; but compromise can. Abuse and torture are only temporary, but the effects of compromise can be eternal.

In our minds, let's picture a large circle. At the very center of this circle is Christ, the Light that lighteth the world. His light is illuminating in all directions—it is reaching out to all the world. We see people coming from all directions; their eyes and their affections are centered on Christ. They have nothing else in view but Christ and His will; they enter the circle of His love; they are in the fold. But, wait! Something else has attracted someone's attention. He is looking to the left; his attention has been drawn from Christ, and now he is walking in the direction of what his eyes are on. He is no longer moving towards the center of the circle, but is, slowly but surely, headed toward the edge of the circle. Oh, I see someone else has turned completely around! Something behind him has somehow attracted his attention. Behold, his own shadow has now cast darkness on his pathway! Oh, how sad. Dear reader, do you get the picture? We see one who has just turned slightly to one side, but is his entire life being flooded with the light of Christ? What if something else attracts His attention that is still a little farther to the left, and on and on, until he has completely turned to where his back is to Christ just like the other person? See the danger of allowing some little thing to draw our attention? Where will it end?

"Then Simon Peter answered him, Lord, to whom shall we go? thou hast the words of eternal life." John 6:68. Saints, there is no other one who has "the words of eternal life." There is only one Light. If we turn our backs on it, what will our end be? Oh, dear ones, my heart is burdened to see the Church move forward—not to the right nor to the left, nor backwards, but forward—straight forward. The Church of God is pure and spotless. It is not tainted by the world, but is separate. Of what is the Church composed? It is of human beings. Therefore, if we are a part of God's Church, we must be holy, without spot or wrinkle. Though we are in the world, we cannot be part of the world; we are separate and we must remain separate. "Thus saith the Lord, Stand ye in the ways, and see, and ask for the old paths, where is the good way, and walk therein, and ye shall find rest for your souls." Jer. 6:16.

Dear ones, be encouraged to continue in the old paths. Seek after them and follow them with your whole heart. Time is swiftly passing and eternity is looming in sight. A crown of life is promised to the true and faithful—those not having spot or wrinkle or any such thing (Eph. 5:27). Praise God for those who will not go away!

Editorials



"Wherefore say unto the children of Israel, I am the Lord, and I will bring you out from under the burdens of the Egyptians, and I will rid you out of their bondage, and I will redeem you with a stretched out arm, and with great judgments." Exodus 6:6.

If you are reading these words and are not saved, let this be an encouragement to you. Just as God delivered the Israelites from Egyptian bondage, He can deliver you. Another Scripture says that "God's hand is not shortened that it cannot save." It doesn't matter what you are entangled in or how far from God you may be, He can give you a complete deliverance.

Notice that God delivered the Israelites only after they became weary of their bondage. Many people make a start toward God, but soon find themselves back in their old sinful condition. Often, the reason is that they never were sick and tired enough of the life of sin for God to give them complete deliverance. We cannot bring about this deliverance ourselves, but we must be totally willing to allow God to free us from sin.

The first step toward God is to realize that you are a sinner. Modern Christianity has been of great detriment to many souls. It offers an excuse for almost any sin that an individual can commit. No longer is sin identified as sin. Once President Lincoln, in addressing a group of people, asked them, "How many legs would a sheep have if you called its tail a leg?" The group promptly replied that it would have five. "No," said Lincoln, "it would not. It would have only four. Calling its tail a leg doesn't make it one." Sin is sin, no matter what softer names people may call it

Recognize that you are a sinner, allow God to deal with your heart, get sick and tired of the way you are living, and God will certainly be faithful to deliver you.

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Wondrously Healed of Heart Trouble

Calif.—Dear saints of God: Greetings of heavenly love in the Name that opened mercy's door and the fount of cleansing for every soul. In view of recent events in my life, I felt indebted to the Lord and His people to write a testimony of the Lord's gracious dealings with our soul and of His merciful kindness to the children of men. The condescension of the Prince of glory to favor us with His eternal plan of redemption causes us to feel our unworthiness; however, when we consider the many benefits that accompany salvation, we are made to more keenly feel a greater depth of love and gratitude to the Sweet Rose of Sharon, my Prophet, my Priest, and my King.

Perhaps two years ago, it pleased the Lord to bruise us with the hand of affliction. The symptoms of the affliction resembled heart trouble very much, although we were careful not to claim it. There was also every indication of low blood pressure, and in fact, the Lord did reveal that truth to us, and an effort to eat those foods to build up the blood was made. Every so often we would become so overcome with pains in the chest, stomach, and back, and with vomiting, that we had to go to bed. On one occasion, we were unable to carry on our duties for three weeks. During this particular illness, which was in Sept., 1982, the Lord allowed us to hear a conversation of two voices which He identified as two imps of the devil. It seems that we were the subject of the conversation which ended with these words: "I know we can't keep her out of heaven, but at least she'll be out of the way." The Lord then began to deal with my heart as to how the devil would be pleased to get all of God's people to give up the fight in affliction before the Lord is finished with them in this life. After that time we endeavored to rest and eat as regularly as possible; also, we were left with a shortness of breath and were easily tired.

On Tuesday, April 12, 1983, we started the day feeling very weak, tired, and our breath was quite short. That night we began to have severe pains in our chest and right arm more often than ever, which appeared to be very typical of what we had been experiencing. However, the Lord gave us the understanding that our sickness had reached a point where it was unto death, and that I needed to inform my family that it was, and to make it a public request. From all evidence we had a heart attack. This left us very weak and without the use of both arms—especially the right arm. The saints were very kind and patient in caring for us, and held on in earnest prayer.

It may be well to note how important our initial consecration to God is as we present our bodies a "living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." Romans 12:1. How much it grieves the great heart of God for us to take ourselves off the altar that sanctifies us in the time of our affliction, and put our bodies in the hands of the "arm of flesh." Surely, the arm of flesh will fail you, and you dare not trust your own. It is also equally important that those who care for the sick be just as consecrated to the eternal will of God concerning the divine healing that their every utterance is an inspiration of faith and confidence in God. We must recommend those who cared for us as being unshaken in faith in spite of every evidence of impending death.

During the next week we experienced two more attacks, one of which seemed to be destined as fatal. It was on Wednesday night, April 20, that those attacks were accompanied by severe pains in the chest and arms, and also there was a feeling of fading out. At this point I have to tell what was told me, as I was not always fully conscious of my state. We can say, however, that my interest in this time world

became a great effort. My speech left me, and my body seemed to lose its normal functions. The saints were called in for prayer, and they labored for about an hour as we tried to rally to live as much as we were consciously able to do so. Every breath seemed to be the very last, as breathing became a great struggle. It seemed it would have been much easier not to struggle against what seemed to be death. We understand that we took on the look of death as the throat began to make what was called a death rattle. As prayer was offered, the Lord would give a touch and we would seem to be coming back to life, only to go through the same struggle again. Finally, the Lord gave a very definite touch so that we could sit up with help, and join in the praises around our bed. That attack left me unable to walk, and the next day I had to be nourished through a straw. That afternoon there was another like attack and the fading away; however, the Lord heard prayer immediately, and it lasted only for a short while. It was not as severe as the night before. That night, the saints began to gather in the living room for prayer, as we were very weak and nervous with pain often in our body. As they were praying we began to have an attack which seemed to have a greater force than the night before. The same symptoms appeared, and also other signs of a definite passing, during which time there were long periods of unconsciousness and very short periods of alertness. The pains seemed unbearable in my chest and arms, and breathing again seemed an impossibility.

As earnest prayer was made around our bedside and death seemed inevitable, the Lord always witnessed to our hearts that He was very near. At one point of consciousness, as my eyes were focused toward the middle of the ceiling. I saw Jesus standing and telling me "to fight on." He didn't look like the pictures we commonly see, and was accompanied by the figure of one I never was able to make out. After about two hours of battling the enemy, as saints were called across the nation, the Lord gave a touch such as witnessed to our heart that the battle was won. We were still weak, but the Lord gave us strength to lift up holy hands for VICTORY. As we began to sing, the Lord's presence was manifest, but the pain in my chest and right arm began to throb. We were at this point anointed and prayed for, and the Lord witnessed to our hearts once more that the work was done. The sisters assisted me with putting my robe on, and as soon as my feet touched the floor

a surge of virtue from Heaven went through my body! It seemed that I couldn't stop leaping and shouting praises to the High Priest who is touched with the feeling of our infirmities. Most of the congregation who were not already present, gathered in to join in the singing and rejoicing which lasted well past midnight. How the Lord's handmaiden did glorify the Lord for His miracle working power which He manifested to each one present, and to each one of His servants across the country that helped to bear the burden of our affliction. The Lord is so real and His

saints are so dear! We trust this account will encourage and strengthen the trust of every one of the saints of God in the Shepherd and Bishop of our souls. As the Lord has favored life for us once more, it is our earnest desire that we not take one selfish breath and that we labor faithfully until our life's work is ended.

"Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it." Prov. 22:6.

I used to wonder how anyone could be so sure that their children would live for the Lord when they became adults. After I had a family of my own and I began to seek the Lord earnestly for wisdom to train my children in "The Way," I began to understand. Because each of us have to make our own decision whether or not we want to choose the way of the Lord, there is never any full assurance our children will be saved. But from observing my own family, other saints' children, and the world, I have come to some conclusions.

If parents teach their children to believe in the Bible, trust in the Lord, and back it by the example of their own lives, that "Way" will never be forgotten by those children. I have noticed children of dedicated Christian parents. Even though the children do not live Christian lives themselves, they are often quick to uphold their background or former teachings. As long as they live, they are never able to completely "depart from it."

But what has impressed me most are those children who have been instructed in the "nurture and admonition of the Lord," and who have followed the godly example of their parents. They have grown to be strong men and women in the Lord. I have been made aware from observing these lives of how much the influences of one's young life have to do in the decisions of one's adult life.

I have thanked the Lord so often for the sound doctrine and strong dependence on the Lord that my parents worked so diligently to instill in me. Those teachings are the reasons I am living for God today, I'm sure. So often, as I was growing up, I was tempted to do so many things all young people are tempted to do. By knowing the genuine love and concern my parents had for me, and being convinced of their understanding by discussing problems with them, their praying with and for me, I kept a real fear of displeasing God and doing wrong. Down through the years I have been thankful for what I have been saved from because I did fear the Lord. As years went on, I experienced my own experience of salvation and the power of God to keep us from sin. But I still contribute very much to my strong Christian background.

I have often seen people get saved who haven't had a good background. Sometimes these people have such struggles in their Christian lives because they have been allowed in their earlier years to indulge in so many unholy things. I have watched them be up and down for so long, unable to acquire any real strong foundation, simply because they have never had to be strong before.

We parents sometimes become weary of watching for the children, pulling them out of disagreements, restoring peace, and instructing them the saw way over and over again. But this training is a constant "workout." There is so much you have to watch for in that child: their influences, their reading, their playmates, talk, attitude toward others, etc. There is so much to do to shape the growth of that tender, little life. If it is left without constant training, it will be sure to loose the race.

When we are trying to train an animal for something, we have to spend a lot of time with it. If it was left to itself, it would either never get done or the animal would become too old to train. It is the same way with our children. It is impossible for them to train themselves. That is why God would like for every child to have godly parents to train them. That is not to say God cannot take someone who has not been "trained" in the truth, save, and use them as adults, but God can use good parents as a tool in early life to train and develop that heart for many more years of the Lord's use.

It is a full-time job; a job which many young parents are not willing to take on. Sad to say, they are pursuing their own pleasures and careers. If we have children, we are duty-bound by God and His Word to spend as much time as we can "training" that child. It is not always easy.

I think often of the things the world offers to our youth of today. It is intended to and will attract them unless we fill our children's time with something to replace what the world has to offer. Work and duties of the home are good, but they will not fill all the void. They also need some type of pure, clean recreation. It is up to us as parents to fill their idle time with something they will enjoy and benefit from. If they are left to find their own entertainment, you can be sure it will lead to sorrow.

Above all, the best example for our children is the godly life of their parents. If they can see something

in their mother's and daddy's lives that is working, they will be more apt to try it. If they see their parents acknowledging God in all their ways, they will be more apt to learn how to do that, also.

May God help us as parents to let go of our own pursuits or pleasures, and dedicate our time and our minds to "training" up our children in "the way." When they are older, we will feel good because we have done all we could, fulfilled God's plan for us, and with the Lord's help, may we see fruits of our sacrifices.

Question and Answer Column By Ostis B. Wilson

Question: I am confused as to the meaning of the following Scriptures: 1 Peter 3:19-20; Jude 6; and 2 Pet. 2:4. As I look up cross references, I find nothing that is real explanatory. I had always thought that heaven or the angels' abode was completely holy and there would be nothing to tempt angels. Also, that anyone dying in sin was lost; so I can't understand Jesus preaching to spirits in prison. Nothing in the gospels seems to mention any such or else I've missed it.

Answer: 1 Pet. 3:19-20, reads: "By which also he went and preached unto the spirits in prison; which sometime were disobedient, when once the longsuffering of God waited in the days of Noah, while the ark was a preparing, wherein few, that is, eight souls were saved by water."

The thought really begins in verse 18, and this verse holds part of the key to interpreting the other verses. Verse 18 reads, "For Christ also hath once suffered for sins, the just for the unjust, that he might bring us to God, being put to death in the flesh, but quickened by the Spirit:" The "S" in the word "Spirit" here is capitalized, indicating that it is the Holy Spirit, the third person of the triune God-head that is meant here. It was through the power of the Holy Spirit that Christ was raised from the dead. Then verse 19 says, "BY WHICH he went and preached unto the spirits in prison." Then it was through the power and operation that He preached unto the spirits in prison. Then verse 20 tells when it was—"When once the long suffering of God waited in the days of Noah, while the ark was a preparing, . . ."

The preaching to the spirits in prison here was done in the days while Noah was building the ark and all the while preaching righteousness unto them—the people in the prison house of sin. Peter said in 2 Pet. 1:21, "For the prophecy came not in old time by the will of man: but holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost." It was the same Holy Spirit that raised Christ from the dead that preached through Noah in his day warning the people to turn from their wickedness and flee from the wrath of God which was to come. It was the same Holy Spirit then in Noah, or preaching through Noah, as in Holy Spirit filled ministers today through whom Christ is preaching His gospel of salvation and warning sinners to repent of sin, believe the gospel, and thus flee from the wrath of God which is to come.

These spirits are called "spirits in prison," and rightly so. Prison is a place where one's liberties are taken away. Spirits who have yielded themselves to the devil forfeit their liberties and become slaves to Satan and the power of sin. Those souls in Noah's day who had their imaginations of the thoughts of their hearts only evil continually were whipped and lashed by a relentless, tyrannical master (the devil), and had no power or liberty of their own. Jesus Himself said in John 8:34, that he that "committeth sin is the servant [slave] of sin." But Jesus again said in John 8:32, that you "shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free." It takes the power of the gospel of Christ to free men from sin. Paul said in Romans 6:17, 18, "But God be thanked, that ye were the servants of sin, but ye have obeyed from the heart that form of doctrine which was delivered you. Being then made free from sin, ye became the servants of righteousness." Any person who will obey the gospel and believe in the merits of the blood of Christ to redeem them from sin shall be made free from sin. Being a servant of righteousness is much different from being a servant of sin, because when one is a servant of righteousness, he is living according to the nature God placed in man in the beginning, which is liberty and freedom in the fullest degree. Sinful man has had a sinful, fallen, corrupt nature imposed upon his true nature. This nature tends to rebellion against God and right, and consequently robs him of all his liberty and freedom. This is what Jesus came to free men from by His sacrifice and the power of His blood, and to restore him back to his true nature (the divine nature) in the image and likeness of God and thus to full freedom and deliverance.

The prophet Isaiah, in Isa. 42:7, said that one of the particular functions of the ministry of Jesus was "... to bring out the prisoners from the prison, and them that sit in darkness out of the prison house." Even those in solitary confinement or the dungeon—even the worst of them were to be brought out also. Again, Isa, 61:1, says, "The Spirit of the Lord God is upon me; because the Lord hath anointed me . . . to proclaim . . . the opening of the prison to them that are bound." In Luke 4:18-19, Jesus read this very prophecy in Isa. 61:1, concerning Himself and then said to them in verse 21, "This day is this scripture fulfilled in your ears." Jesus, the great liberator, had come to open the prison houses of sin and let the prisoners come out free men. Eph. 4:8, says that when He ascended up on high "He led captivity captive." The margin here says, "A multitude of captives." Jesus led a great multitude which no man could number out of the kingdom of darkness and sin, and translated them into the kingdom of God's dear Son through the abundance of His grace and the power of His blood.

This does not mean that He opened up the prison and penitentiaries and turned the criminals loose on society. No, not at all. But the psalmist said in Psalms 142:7, "Bring my soul out of prison." So we see that souls can get in prison the same as bodies and men can be imprisoned spiritually as well as physically. And it was to those who were imprisoned spiritually that Jesus in Spirit preached to through Noah, and it is to those who are imprisoned spiritually today to whom He preach-

es in His Holy Spirit filled ministers, and to whom He opens the prison doors to liberate them when they obey from the heart that form of doctrine delivered unto them.

Jude 6 says: "And the angels which kept not their first estate, but left their own habitation, he hath reserved in everlasting chains under darkness unto the judgment of the great day."

I have mulled over this and wrestled around with it at different times, but never came up with anything that was satisfactory even to myself. Finally, I came across Bro. C. E. Orr's interpretation of this text. He said that the angels referred to in this text were Adam and Eve. That seemed plausible and correct to me when I considered that they were created beings just like the angels, and designed for everlasting life just like the angels so long as they ate of the tree of life. Before they sinned they were holy just as the angels. When they sinned, they lost their righteous estate (kept not their first estate), and were driven from the garden (left their own habitation). This is the best I have to offer on this text as of now.

"The Steps of a Good Man"

Psalms 37:23

Life and time are so structured that no one may remain long in one place. Time and life move, requiring us to move, as there is no way for each succeeding day to remain as the one before it. Conditions change, circumstances change, and our reactions to these change, so each day and its experiences are different from all the others.

Our dear Lord has counseled us to order our steps as we travel this path of life so that our conduct will be proper and acceptable when measured against the standard of holiness prescribed for men to follow. Our first step, then, would be to recognize the value of such conduct. Experience has taught us that we are unable to achieve that plane alone, so our next step is toward the One who is able and willing to help us.

And so begins our life's walk with the dear Lord—step by step, test by test, victory by victory until at last we have completed our life's journey and meet Him face to face.
