Recollections of a Trying Experience

While reminiscing on some important and memorable events in my past experience of serving the Lord, my mind drifted to an occasion back in 1922 while attending Bible school. A few of the students had encouraged me to join a prayer band to hold cottage services in a certain neighborhood on one evening of each week. I was glad to enlist as I felt that this would provide an opportunity to help me develop my potential as an up-and-coming young minister, and, also, it would provide the means to start spreading the gospel. The plan was to solicit homes that would welcome this type of service, and it was agreed that each member of the band would take his or her turn in conducting the whole service. The response to our work of solicitation was excellent and many homes opened their doors to us, and, to His everlasting praise, a number of people were saved in these meetings.

It finally came my turn to conduct the service and bring the message. I had already been preparing for this eventuality and had filed away in my mind a number of things I wished to say. My heart was thrilled with the message I felt the Lord had given me for I had been painstaking and much in prayer in preparing myself for this first venture in the preaching ministry. I even strolled down the old railroad track preaching this inspiring sermon to myself. I was all set. The evening for putting into execution the transaction for delivery of this grand theme arrived, and I stood forth to give my message when, to my utter consternation, my animation all seemed to evaporate. My message left me. Recalling, however, a few points I had hoped to make, I stumbled on and talked for a while. Then it occurred to me to just give my testimony—how the Lord wooed me, won me to Him and saved me. This I did, although I do not remember now what all I might have said. At the close of this presentation, two chairs were set out and an invitation given for any who wished to be saved to kneel in prayer. No one moved and the meeting was closed.

To say that I was dejected doesn't nearly meet the requirement at all. I was nearly prostrate with disappointment and a sense of abject failure which had a way of goading me for weeks and monthseven years. Then in 1936 (fourteen years later) I returned to attend camp meeting. While walking along a cement walk on the campground, I heard my name being called, "Brother Langley, Brother Langley." I turned to see two beaming faces hurrying toward me to catch up: "You probably don't remember us, Brother Langley, but you will recall holding a cottage meeting in our home years ago. Both husband and I were miserable with conviction that night, but when we were invited to kneel in prayer it seemed the devil had riveted us to our seats. When the service had closed and we were alone, I looked at my husband and Husband looked at me, and, in silent agreement, we went to our bedroom, and, kneeling beside our bed, gave our hearts to Jesus, and we have been faithfully following Him since."

Words are feeble things in such moments of the soul's exaltation. As the hour of that trying experience came forcefully back to me in clear vividness, my heart leaped with joy and praises to Him who understands all predicaments and who holds all contingencies in the palm of His hand. "O the depth of the riches both of the wisdom and knowledge of God! How unsearchable are his judgments, and his ways past finding out!" Right then and there, the Lord rebuked me: "O thou of little faith, wherefore didst thou doubt?" Had I forgotten that, "... Whatsoever ye shall ask the Father in my name, he will give it you"? John 16:23.

Over the years I have learned many valuable lessons, but none more important than the one I learned then, namely, NEVER SELL THE HOLY SPIRIT SHORT. We need ever to bear in mind that Christians—vital Christians—pray and exercise faith on the merit vested in them through Jesus Christ. There is a partnership here that must be taken into account, and His part is always of far greater significance and consequence than that of the human instrument which I had, in my youth and ignorance, over-valuated. So let us be confident, bold and daring as we come to the throne of grace to make our requests known, for the blessed Holy Spirit can always be depended upon to perform His part if we do ours.

Satan Attacks Through Ordinary Things

It is not merely in seeking the baptism of the Spirit that people are beguiled of Satan, but in ordinary affairs of life. A great deal of lethargy with respect to mind and will abounds among the Lord's people. Many seem to think that when they are saved, God will decide things for them instead of giving them the ability to see for themselves what is right and wrong and what is wise and unwise.

"Understanding what the will of the Lord is" might never have been written, judging by the way some people conduct their lives and homes. Some of them will do anything rather than get into the place of a responsible person endowed with the wisdom and decision of "the new man in Christ." There are those who are always asking for signs and indications in circumstances, forgetting that the devil can easily manipulate circumstances. I wonder that more of them do not ask for signs and tokens as to when and what they are to eat and drink. (I knew of one terrible case of the devil's dictating when to eat and drink, and the man nearly lost his life. Through prayer and then personal resistance he was delivered.) But most of them cut their lives into two departments—one natural and the other spiritual. In the former they use their brain and will, but in the latter they just drift along. You never know what they are going to do in the spiritual realm, for their guidance is enveloped in some vaporous mysticism which nobody understands.

"Be sober." Use your mind. Your brain has been redeemed as much as your heart. "Be renewed in the spirit of your mind" (Eph. 4:23; Col. 3:10; Rom. 12:2). Let the light of God create for you a new intelligence department—"UNDERSTAND what the will of the Lord is." Say, "I must get to understand the will of the Lord." This will call for faith and patience, but persist in coming to know God's will for yourself by regular searching of His Word. If you will do that, you will guard yourself against falling into many a snare of Satan. In addition, you will become increasingly efficient in the Lord's service as His fellowworker (2 Cor. 6:1). A word of caution is needed here, however. There are some things that for the time being are designedly veiled from our eyes, and the recognition of this sometimes places faith in its best setting to mature (John 13:7). -F. J. HOME LIFE

Love is proverbially blind, therefore it is hard for parents to take an unbiased view of their children. To have them criticized by others is painful in the extreme. There is scarcely a mother who has not felt that sore, harrowed feeling that comes from a discussion of her child's faults with a criticizing friend or neighbor. How to meet these criticisms and make them steppingstones instead of hindrances is a problem to many a perplexed parent.

When tales are brought to us about our children, there are two extremes that should be avoided. There is a tendency to become irritated at the accuser and refuse to listen to his charge, or, if the child denies the charge, to take the word of the child against that

of the accuser. The other extreme is to take for granted that the child is guilty and to accept the accusation against him no matter how firmly he denies the charge.

The first extreme is dangerous in that it gives the child a feeling of security in his mischief and encourages him in untruthfulness also. Many parents think their children will not tell untruths, but such children are scarce—very scarce. Self-protection is one of the first laws of our being, and the child will defend himself even if he must do so by denying the truth. This temptation is strong, and the flesh is weak; it is foolish for any parent to be too sure that his child will not be guilty. If the accusation is brought by a responsible person or is of enough importance to justify the effort, it should be thoroughly looked into. If the child is telling the truth, investigation will not hurt him; but if he is lying, the sooner the parents know it the better.

The second extreme is unfair in that it gives the child no chance. It is possible for any person to be mistaken. If the accuser is not mistaken, investigation will not hurt his position; while if he should be mistaken, it would be a great injustice to the child to deal out correction for an act of which he is not guilty.

One father received such an accusation against his little son whom he had carefully taught against the sin of lying. The boy denied the charge, but the father believed the one who brought the accusation and dealt with the boy not only for the offense but for untruthfulness also. He punished the boy severely, but the little fellow persisted that he was not guilty, though he lay under the stigma of a lie for days. At last the father became alarmed lest he had been unfair to his little son, and said no more about it. Months afterward he learned that the boy was not guilty. This man was a good father and made up for his mistake to the boy to the best of his ability, otherwise he would have lost the respect and confidence of his son. It was a bitter lesson to the father and one to be remembered and heeded.

Every parent comes in contact with well-meaning people who have little understanding of child-nature, and who are constantly overestimating the faults of the children. It is very hard on the dispositions of our children to have them exposed to the criticisms of friends or relatives. While we should be ready to receive an accusation if our children have been ill-behaved, there is no parent that has not the right to take a firm and decided stand against constant nagging at his children.

As the children grow older, it is harder still to keep them with a kindly feeling toward those who "tell" on them. There is nothing more natural than that our children should resent even the best-intentioned accusation against them. The proper attitude of the parent will help the child to see things right. If the parent, with a careful and unbiased mind, investigates the matter and deals with it as a fault and not as an accusation, he will stand a far better chance of keeping the child in a humble attitude than if he either shields the child or embraces the accusation.

"And if it seem evil unto you to serve the Lord, choose you this day whom ye will serve; . . . but as

for me and my house, we will serve the Lord." Joshua 24:15

Joshua realized that there was nothing that he could do to persuade people to serve the living God. God gives every individual a free will, and the ultimate decision is theirs. However, it was in his hands as to whom his house served. We survey things around us and are tempted to straighten things out, but many times this is not our responsibility. Our responsibility lies at home with ourselves and our families. With this in mind, it is our desire that this column be of encouragement and help to those who are shaping their family. Question and Answer Column

By Ostis B Wilson

Question: What is the Biblical explanation of 1 Tim. 2:11, and 1 Cor. 14:35?

Answer: 1 Tim. 2:11, says, "Let the woman learn in silence with all subjection." Verses 12-15 need to be included here to establish the context and complete the thought. These verses read thus: "But I suffer not a woman to teach, nor to usurp authority over the man, but to be in silence. For Adam was first formed, then Eve. And Adam was not deceived, but the woman being deceived was in the transgression. Notwithstanding she shall be saved in childbearing, if they continue in faith and charity and holiness with sobriety."

In his book What the Bible Teaches, F. G. Smith observes on this passage that it refers to a woman's proper relationship with her own husband, and is not related to the other texts concerning the official position of women in the Church. Adam Clarke sets forth the same thing in his commentary at this place. F. G. Smith further says that this is evidenced by the example given—Adam and Eve—and its connection with childbearing. Adam Clarke inserts a quote from Dr. Macknight which reads thus: "However, though Eve was first in the transgression, and brought death on herself, her husband, and all her posterity, the female sex shall be saved (equally with the male) through childbearing—through bringing forth the Saviour", etc.

Hence it is evident that this entire passage has reference to a woman with her husband and not to any public relationship. In the proper domestic relationship the wife is to recognize her own husband as her head and be subject to him (Eph. 5:23 and numerous other texts). However, in spiritual things, the woman's husband is not her head. She is a separate, distinct individual before God and is personally responsible to Him the same as is her husband. To make the wife subject to her husband and him her head in spiritual things would fix it so a woman with an unsaved husband could not live a saved life. The answer of Peter to the magistrates who had commanded them to teach no more in the name of Jesus (Acts. 5:29 "We ought to obey God rather than men")

is applicable to any case where one is required to be subject to and obedient to another. Consequently, we conclude that a married woman is to obey God rather than man even if that man is her husband. It is therefore evident that a husband is not given to be the head of his wife in spiritual things but only in domestic and temporal things.

The reference to the woman learning in silence in verse 11 I would not interpret as meaning that the woman has no voice at all in the affairs of the home, business affairs, and plans for the future and welfare of the family. I feel there should be a generous and free exchange of views between a husband and wife on all important matters, but in the final analysis the decision is in the hands of the husband, and the wife is to accept it without contention, argument, or back talk.

1 Cor. 14:35, says, "And if they will learn any thing, let them ask their husbands at home: for it is a shame for women to speak in the church."

The position of women in the church is an ageold issue and has never been settled to the complete satisfaction of all. I have no idea at all that what I say here will satisfy the minds of all who read it. But the question is a persistent one and keeps popping up, so we have to keep dealing with it.

First, I would say that any Scripture on any subject must be interpreted according to the rule of the unanimity of faith. What this means is that any Scripture on any subject must be interpreted to harmonize with every other text in the entire New Testament on the same subject. Therefore, if this were the only Scripture in the New Testament we would just have to accept it as the norm. Then we could allow women to attend church services but require them to be silent and say nothing while there. But it is not the only Scripture on the subject, and I say we would surely lose a lot of fine talent to enforce it that way.

In What the Bible Teaches, F. G. Smith says that the idea of male superiority and female inferiority in the human race has its roots in paganism. Christianity is the only religion in the world that recognizes the equality of men and women. Paganism regards women as greatly inferior to men, and they have very little part in religion. Among the Jews, even under the law, special provisions were made for women and they were honored and respected. Some of them even rose to positions of prominence. Deborah was a prophetess and a judge in Israel (Judges. 4:4). In her position as judge she would have been her husband's judge, too, if she were a married woman. Barak refused to go to battle with Sisera unless Deborah went with him (Judges 4:8). She went with him, and God gave them a great victory.

In John 4, Jesus delivered one of His greatest sermons to a lone woman of Samaria. Then the woman took the message to the men in the town and many of them became believers. Paul recognized the equality of men and women in Christ in Gal. 3:28—"There is . . . neither male nor female: for ye are all one in Christ Jesus." In Acts 21:9, it is recorded that Phillip had four daughters which did prophesy. In the second chapter of Acts where the initial outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon the Church is recorded, Peter said in verses 14-18 that this was what was prophesied by Joel (Joel 2:28-29). And he said in

verses 17, 18, "... I will pour out of my Spirit upon all flesh: and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy... and on my servants and on my handmaidens I will pour out in those days of my Spirit; and they shall prophesy."

Prophecy or to prophesy primarily means to speak forth, to tell out the mysteries of God. It is to proclaim the mysteries and knowledge of God. Paul declares that redemption itself is a mystery (1 Cor. 2:7-14). To preach the gospel of Christ, under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, is to proclaim the mysteries, the hidden wisdom of God—to prophesy. Both men and women participated in this according to the above Scriptures.

This is the general teaching of the New Testament Scriptures; other cases could be cited if space permitted. But there were necessary exceptions to this because of the different customs of the gentile people among whom Paul labored, and 1 Cor. 14:35 is such a case.

The following quote is from F. G. Smith in What the Bible Teaches. "Paul was the Apostle to the Gentiles and, as such, was engaged in planting the gospel among various nations and peoples with different customs and social conditions. He found it necessary to identify with them in many of these respects in order to gain them. This is shown in his own writing in 1 Cor. 9:20-23. Paul said in some of his instructions to this Corinthian Church in 1 Cor. 7:26. 'I suppose therefore that this is good for the present distress.' In such cases, those instructions would not be a standard for all people and for all time. This would be true concerning women's silence in the Church because to interpret it otherwise would create a contradiction in the Scriptures which cannot be. The Corinthian Church was in a heathen environment so all he could do was accommodate himself to their custom."

The Smile of God

"Who will show us any good?" Psa. 4:6. The world is asking this question of the saint. The saint finds the answer in the words of the remainder of the text. "Lord, lift thou up the light of thy countenance upon us." The smile of God is the chief good. Nothing in all this world is good except it has God's good pleasure upon it. Let that alone, dear soul, upon which God will not smile. It is heaven upon earth to stand continually in the smile of God. That is the essential good. Pluck no rose that does not have the radiance of light from the countenance of God upon it. It will prick you if you do. Nothing will take God's place in man's life. Men have tried to manufacture artificial sunlight, but they have not yet succeeded in inventing something that will melt the snows of winter, paint the flowers with beautiful colors, mantle the fields with coverings of green, and shoot life through all nature. It is only God that can bring light, peace, and health to the soul. The pleasures and riches of the world will never do it. You may have the applause of the world, its riches, and its pleasures if you wish them, but let me stand in the light of God's countenance. God's smile will bring a bright spot into life's darkest hours. -C. E. Orr (Taken from Helps to Holy Living)
