The Birth of Jesus

The decree of Caesar that all the citizens of the Roman Empire should be taxed sent every person to his own city. This taxing was really an enrollment or a registering of all the people, perhaps something on the order of a census. Joseph, the husband of Mary, was of the lineage of David, and, as he was living in Nazareth of Galilee at that time, it became necessary for him to make the long journey southward to Judea and the city of Bethlehem. It was here in this vicinity that ,David, the son of Jesse, made his start in life and proved the faithfulness of God. And it was of this city that the prophet spoke when he prophesied that "out of thee shall he come forth unto me that is to be ruler in Israel: whose goings forth have been from of old, from everlasting."

It is very inspiring to visualize the setting of this wonderful account of the birth of Jesus, and just what it meant to those people. Mary was great with child, and a long trip of that sort was a very trying ordeal for her. But the decree had to be kept regardless. Human Evaluation Versus God's

I recall reading of a father who spoke of his little daughter as one whom people were attracted to. It seems that she met with a mishap one day and injured her mouth in such a manner as to make it appear that the injury was a natural deformity and not a temporary disfigurement. The father took the child to the store the next evening and noted the difference in the manner in which people reacted toward her, as compared to how they had before the accident. The greetings and smiles that usually came her way were replaced by rejection. In fact, she was simply ignored. This upset the father who saw the injustice of the situation. Why should a child suffer rejection for a circumstance over which she had no control?

Intellect and beauty are two things that many pride themselves on, never considering the fact that such qualities were inherited gifts, and not earned by the individuals possessing them. The capacity to acquire learning differs in individuals. Those less endowed at birth should no more receive blame for their lack of capability than others should receive glory for their greater potential. It is true, however, that some cultivate and make better use of what God has given them than others.

The difference between God's evaluation of an individual, and that of man, is aptly described in the Scripture that declares, "Man looketh on the outward appearance, but the Lord looketh on the heart." (1 Sam. 16:7). God's manner of judging worth is the standard which we should adopt.

The thoughtful and kind individual will show a friendly interest in all, not just the intelligent, the beautiful, or the influential. As one sign declared, "God loves the unlovely." It might be well to absorb the truth in this poem:

> "Beauty is only skin deep, But ugly is to the bone; Beauty always fades away, But ugly holds its own!"

A fairly recent publication of a popular family magazine contained the story of a heart attack victim's last hours. A friend who was well acquainted with the dying man told somebody nearby, "He made people feel good about themselves." There is food for thought in that statement. It is a product of Christian charity to be interested enough in someone else to make him feel valuable as a person. It is a trait which sets the matured Christian apart from the world, for the world lives to exalt self. Self demands pre-eminence, even at the expense of others. Perhaps you are acquainted with the type of individual who must have the last word in a conversation. He feels that he must stalk off the field of verbal battle having ungraciously subdued his opponent. He has forgotten that the real purpose of discussion is to arrive at the truth, not direct a blow at another's self esteem. Such a one may feel he has won the argument, but in actuality, he has lost a friend.

In a society which promotes the flesh and makes it of primary importance, God help us to inspect our motives and daily actions. We are vulnerable to the influences about us and our values can become perverted and tainted with the flesh. It is encouraging to know that with the aid of the Holy Spirit and a diligent and continual dependence upon God, He will help us to maintain a perspective and perception that aligns with His Word. —Mary Murphey

Humility, God's Way

In the fifth chapter of Matthew, we are presented with a series of nine inestimable beatitudes, each setting forth some feature of spiritual condition or character wherein men are blessed. Another noteworthy beatitude has strayed and we pick it up in the eleventh chapter, sixth verse, where it reads: "And blessed is he, whosoever shall not be offended in me." It will brighten the light some if I render the quotation from Weymouth, as, "And blessed is every one who does not stumble and fall because of my claims."

In view of the fact that since we are considering man's eternal salvation, the paramount question here would seem to be, "Why should anyone be offended in Christ Jesus?" What was there about Jesus that should repel anyone? Truthfully, His earthly blessings were manifold: He healed the sick, He fed the hungry multitudes, He blessed and comforted in sorrow and in death, He showed compassion on all who were the unfortunate victims of circumstances, and He offered solace and comfort to the heavy laden and burdened (Matt. 11:28). But Jesus declared, by inference, that there would be those to whom He would be offensive and repellent, and give an occasion for stumbling. One thing Jesus knew would repel many, in the Jewish national structure, is that He would not justify their expectations and hopes to restore the Davidic kingdom. As disappointing as that was to those who, through the misinterpretation of Old Testament prophecies, had built up their high anticipation that when the Messiah came He would bring about the refurbishment and restoration of their national kingdom, and, I may add, to those also among modernist religionists who, today, are hopefully looking for the same thing, Jesus had a far more excellent plan. He was to become the Mediator of a "better covenant, which was established upon better promises" (Heb. 8:6). His would be the kingdom of the spirit (significantly as: "I, John, who also am your brother, and companion in tribulation, and in the kingdom and patience of Jesus Christ" Rev. 1:9). He would show that all men are precisely in the same condemnation; and likewise, to each and all, the gospel of Christ offers precisely the same salvation. with precisely the same eternal consequence for all who refuse it. He would show that there is no favoritism in the gospel for, "Christ is no respecter of persons" (Acts 10:34).

Another thing is: His gospel demands humility. His gospel repels and offends the world. In the ancient world, we are told, humility was considered a humiliating vice, and is still the evaluation of the world today. The spirit of the world is to pamper sin and pride, to play up to selfishness, to demand one's "rights," to serve self and to win for self regardless of the adverse effects on others. But Jesus sheds a warning light on this worldly attitude thus: "And whosoever shall exalt himself shall be abased; and he that shall humble himself shall be exalted" (Matt. 23:12). The beloved apostle Paul testified to both Jews and Greeks that he had been among them at all seasons, "serving the Lord with all humility of mind, and with many tears" (Acts 20:19), the perfect example of salvation.

Christian redemption is based on faith which involves renouncing all human redemptive powers and plans. Men like to feel that by education and moral discipline they can correct the ills of the individual and of the world. Indeed, the necessity for faith as the basis of salvation is repellent and offensive to the modernist with his perverted conception of the "innate deity" and to the humanistic religionist. Yes, the popularly approved rationalism is offensive to and repelled by Jesus' teaching. His fervent prayer is: "I thank thee, O Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because thou hast hid these things from the wise and prudent, and hast revealed them unto babes" (Matt. 11:25), because, "Whosoever shall not receive the kingdom as a little child, he shall not enter therein" (Mark 10:15).

Again, Christ's sacrificial standard of consecration and service offends and repels an age of ease and comfort. This generation has become used to having everything smoothed out-no ravels or complications. Sin has graduated to nice names and has become a mere psychosis or imprudent mistake. The name "Christian" has lost its distinctive quality and has become a conventionalized term, applying to anyone who belongs to a civilized community; that is, he is not a "savage" (barbaric), he is a "Christian." Jesus' requirement to "take up thy cross" repels a pleasure-loving world. "Seek ye first the kingdom of God" repels and offends the carnal human heart that would first serve self. "Treasures in heaven" seem foolish to one without any spiritual understanding or vision. Depravity has eaten deeply into the heart of humanity; revenge is the norm of the world. But God's way is, "Put on there, as the elect of God, holy and beloved, bowels of mercies, kindness, humbleness of mind, meekness, longsuffering, forbearing one another, and forgiving one another. . . ." (Col. 3:12, 13).

Jesus Christ's moral standard seems harsh and unrelenting in the light of today's liberal attitudes. His demand for honesty, sincerity, righteousness, purity, mercifulness, and open dealings with our fellow men repels a world of loose moral standards. Again, let us notice God's way: "Likewise, ye younger, submit yourselves unto the elder. Yea, all of you be subject one to another and be clothed with humility: for God resisteth the proud, and giveth grace to the humble. Humble yourselves therefore under the mighty hand of God, that he may exalt you in due time" (1 Pet. 5:5, 6). Yea, a world that is unashamed to accept and declare the idea that "the end justifies the means" finds divine standards of righteousness repellent.

I conclude these few, simple remarks with, the only true happiness is found in being right with God. Let us praise Him for His beautiful beatitudes that teach humility, a sense of our unworthiness, our guilt as sinners, repentance, salvation, and reward in heaven. Blessed (happy, or not subject to fate) is the man who finds nothing repellent in Jesus Christ: humble, believing, sacrificial, righteous, merciful, and loving. Remember, Jesus Christ will not change His plans. His demands and His standards are constant and never optional. We must change or be changed, and when we are so transformed by His saving power, we find joy, peace, rest, and purpose in His will. Indeed, we find that place of blessing in Him where nothing about the Lord Jesus Christ offends or -Earl D. Langley repels us.

MISSIONARY REPORT OF MEXICO

Dear Sis. Maybelle: Time has certainly slipped away from me and it has been such a long time since I have written to you. I wonder if it is that way with you, too, and with others, also. It seems that there are always things a person has to do and there are just twenty-four hours in a day. However, I think that being busy is better than being unoccupied and this way time just goes so very fast.

We are grateful to say that we love the Lord and still have a burning desire to live for Him faithfully every day; to live in a way that the Lord might get glory from our lives and we somehow might touch souls with our influence of living for God. My heart is so burdened and heavy as I see the influence of the world on every side. I'm not burdened especially for me, but for the children who have to be under the influence of teachers, and children whose parents don't love the Lord and haven't taught them what is right, and who have scarcely any morals at all. It is just the influence of the home against the influence of the world and the children will have to choose.

Last weekend, we went to Mexicali and on down to where we used to live to be with the people a while. We also went to the gravesides of the children's mothers because Nov. 2 and 3 were decoration days in Mexico. The cemeteries in Mexico are so very different from those of the States but the people had cleaned the cemeteries up and had so very many wreaths and flowers, mostly of what they made themselves. The children made some, also.

One man whom we know so very well has quit drinking-going on two months now. We are so grateful, for he seemed to be almost too far gone to ever be normal again. He isn't saved, and we are praying that he will see his need of being saved so that he can have power in his life. We carry a heavy burden for those whom we lived with so many years in Ejido Patzcuaro, and who are so scattered now. It would be impossible to visit and be with them all in one weekend. When we go, we have services where we are invited, and we visit and pray or sing with others. Sometimes we feel encouraged, and other times we are pretty disheartened which gives us more of a burden. We haven't gone over to Ojos Negros or to Chapultepec for a few weeks now, but feel that soon we will be able to do so. Usually we go some time in November or before Christmas with some of the saints from Pomona, Pacoima, and Bakersfield. There is a great need for more workers in Mexico, and we are earnestly asking the Lord to talk to souls, for there are still hungry, searching souls along with some who have grown cold in their experience with the Lord. We want to see souls grow and prosper in the things of the Lord, and be able to carry a burden for souls themselves, that the work of God go forward

in Mexico. It could be that in the near future the government in Mexico will not permit the gospel to be preached. We need to be up and doing and taking advantage of every opportunity we have. Time is getting away from us and souls are steadily going on and on, closer to eternity without God. How sad.

I guess I will close for now, trusting that all is well with you and yours there at the Print Shop. We think and pray for you all very often, and we appreciate you and the great work there more than we can express.



Question: Please explain Matt. 6:13. Why would Jesus teach us to pray, "Lead us not into temptation"? He would never lead us into partaking of temptation and I did not think He would lead us into the presence of temptation. James 1:13, says, "God tempteth no man," and then we read where Jesus was led of the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted of the devil. I can't seem to get these Scriptures working together, so I would appreciate some explanation on them.

Answer: These Scriptures do indeed appear contradictory and baffling on the face of them and this question may be of importance to more people than just this questioner. These Scriptures are not contradictory when rightly divided and understood. The word "temptation" has a double meaning

which, when understood, will help us to understand the apparent contradiction here. One meaning is, "an inducement to evil." Another meaning is. "try, test. prove, probe." The text in James 1:13, "God cannot be tempted with evil; neither tempteth he any man," means that He does not tempt men with evil, or endeavor to induce them into evil. In Matt. 26:41, Jesus admonished His disciples to "Watch and pray that ye enter not into temptation." The strong temptation for evil was right at hand and lying just immediately ahead of them. It came upon them and Peter fell grossly into it to the point of denying the Lord Jesus with cursing and swearing. The others fell into it also in a lesser degree than Peter in that they forsook Him and fled. The only one of those twelve who stood with Him that memorable night was John the beloved disciple. This is what is meant by entering into temptation-partaking of it or being victimized by it. Then Jesus continued in the last part of Matt. 26:41, to say that "The spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak. Many who fail to recognize this important truth feel that if they are willing in their spirit to live for God and seek earnestly to please Him in their lives, that somehow God will overlook and consider the frailty of their flesh if they give way and are overcome in the time of temptation. This is not the case. When one is overcome in the time of temptation and victimized by it, and partakes of it, it requires repentance before he can be restored, regardless of how willing his spirit was to live for God. Peter went out and wept bitterly (bitter tears of repentance) when he was struck with the reality of what he had done. When one has a deep sense of the reality and truth of Jesus' words, "The spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak," he will be constantly and continuously seeking to build up himself on his most holy faith (Jude 20) and to be "strengthened with might by his spirit in the inner man" (Eph. 3:16). This way, when he is enthralled and enveloped with temptation strong and keen, the power of the spirit within will prevail over the weakness of the flesh without, and he will not fall a victim to the temptation. One great comfort that we have, and really the only one that we need, is, "Greater is he that is in you than he that is in the world" (1 John 4:4). As we

yield ourselves more and more to the workings of the Spirit of God in our lives, the truth of this statement will be more and more confirmed unto us.

The other meaning of the word which is "to try, test, prove, or probe," means that God tempts us all in this sense. Dan. 12:10, says, "Many shall be purified, and made white, and tried." God will surely have a tried and proven people to take to heaven. The reason for this is clearly apparent. God, in the beginning, created man in His own image and after His own likeness, which is declared to be "righteousness and true holiness." We all know how man (Adam) failed and committed sin, and as a result of that all his posterity, the whole human race, was plunged into sin (Rom. 5:12). We see all around us the appalling effects of this and the ruin of the race which has resulted from sin. Now, in approximately 6,000 years, the world has become almost an unbearable place for a righteous man to live. If this degree of ruin and devastation has been wrought by sin in 6,000 years, pray tell me if you can, the extent of the havoc which would be wrought in that eternal world without an end if anything faulty or evil were to get there. Every person who enters those portals will first be tried to the limit that he may be thoroughly purged from every imperfection and impurity before he is accepted in that company. God is absolutely taking no chances this time.

All of this relates to the text to which the question relates: Matt. 6:13. In this text Jesus taught us to pray, "Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil." Adam Clarke says in his commentary on this text that the phrase interpreted here "Lead us not into temptation," means, in the translation from the original Greek text, "Bring us not into sore trial." He also says that several of the primitive Church fathers have added to this the phrase, "which we cannot bear." He further adds that "The word not only implies violent assaults by Satan, but also sorely afflictive circumstances, none of which we have, as yet, grace or fortitude sufficient to bear." Then he says that "Bring us not in," or "Lead us not in," is a "mere Hebraism; God is said to do a thing which He only permits or suffers to be done.'

A key text in this connection is found in 1 Pet. 1:6, where it says, "... though now for a season, if need be, ye are in heaviness through manifold tempt-ations." The key words are "if need be," and this refers to what has been said before about God testing, trying, purging, and purifying everyone to prepare them for heaven. One of our songs contains these words: "God is sweeping through the nation with an awful searching eye. Every spot of imperfection must be purged, or hope must die." God is the One who determines "if need be." He determines when one needs a trial and what kind of trial it should be. He sees every spot of imperfection about us; even the ones we do not see and realize ourselves. He has decreed that all these things must be purged and His method of purging them is through the trying, testing, proving, and probing experiences of life. He permits only those things in our lives which He sees will accomplish His desired end: the purging and purifying of the soul, and the perfecting of us in the image of His Son, Jesus.

He taught us to pray right along with, "But deliver us from evil." Some render this, "Deliver us

from the evil one." We can be sure that in all those trying experiences God sees necessary to subject us to in order to prepare us for heaven, the "evil one," Satan himself, will be on hand to attempt to take advantage of us in the trial and seek to persuade us to cast away our confidence in God or take a wrong attitude toward God, our circumstance, or people connected with our trial. The devil will try to hurt us in some way, but we can be assured that if we keep our trust in God and remain subject and submissive to Him that His grace will be sufficient, and the trial will never be too great for us to bear. This is spelled out in certain terms in 1 Cor. 10:13, which you may read as a conclusion.

One summer day I was resting in a park and meditating. People were continually moving along on a near-by path. Presently a mother and three children came along, and the mother sat on a bench a short distance from me. For a while the children rested on the bench also, asking many questions and receiving replies such as, "Don't ask so many questions," "Leave me alone for a minute," and "Run along and play."

"Play what?" I said to myself.

Finally, one by one the children left the such and the mother. I was interested and curious. I decided to observe further doings of these children and their mother. Presently the two older girls had their heads over a trash barrel, searching through it to see what they could find. A quick yell of, "Get out of there and quit doing that," put a stop to the search. The girls seemed at a loss as to what to do next, but soon all three of them were playing "skin the cat" over the back of a bench; but this was soon ended by a harsh command, "Quit that, you -----; you'll tear your clothes off you." Next the two smaller girls walked a short distance through the green grass when the mother screamed, "Come back here." Soon after they came back they began to pick up pieces of gravel and bits of sand and popsicle sticks. "Throw all that junk down and quit doing that. You'll get as dirty as pigs." They wandered around a little more, and finally found a paper with some pictures. They huddled together looking at the pictures in this paper. and when discovered were asked to throw the paper in the trash barrel and come sit by Mother. Dear little children, with active minds but without guidance and helpful direction! What kind of citizens will they become? Quite soon the little group of four left me.

Yes, I think, too, that the mother was tired and needed rest, but I do not think this kind of a trip to the park rested her nor helped her children.

It did not seem enough to me to sit there and observe this situation without trying to solve the problem. And since this is only one case among many in the lives of parents and children, I know it will do all of us good to think about it and to solve it together. Just now I can almost imagine I have a group of you mothers together. No doubt you are already thinking of the different things you could have done in this situation. But since we are here and there in our separate homes this afternoon, I will tell you what I decided I could have done.

I thought I would have tried the following. I might have asked the children to walk around under

the trees, finding and placing on a bench as many different kinds of leaves as they could see. Then I might have compared the leaves, with the children's help, and have them tell me which they liked best, and why. I would talk with them about God's world and the beauties of nature, various purposes of leaves, etc. I would have had them pick clovers, promising to show them how to make wreaths and chains. I would have asked them to search the trees for birds' nests, and to have counted the birds they saw. I could have shown them how to take tiny sticks and pin leaves together for a small rug or cover.

Many ideas have come to your mind, I know, and many things could have been done to guide and direct these active minds educationally. Our children are eagerly reaching out to learn, and yet we take advantage of very few opportunities for learning.

The other evening I was busy at my desk and my five-year-old daughter came near with her own little Testament in her hands. I was busy, but something said, "here is a good opportunity; take advantage of it." I pushed my work aside and asked her if she wanted me to read some stories from her Bible. "Yes, Mother," and her eyes sparkled. "Let me sit on your lap, too." Up she jumped, and I turned to such stories as I knew would interest her: "Jesus feeding the five thousand," "The sick man at the pool," "Jesus calling the children to Him," and several others. It was an interesting experience to watch her as I read these stories from her Bible. She had heard them in Sunday School, and no doubt could see the pictures in imagination as I read to her. I could tell it was wonderful to her that they were in her Bible, too. We had our prayer together, and off to bed she went.

Rather early one morning I was out in my kitchen, starting the day's work, and all at once I heard this little daughter coming, all excited, and when I understood her words she was saying, "Is it our house, Mother? Is it our house?" I wondered for a moment, then heard what she had been awakened by. A fire engine was sounding out its alarm on the way to a fire. "No, darling, it is not our house. Aren't you glad?" When she was fully satisfied, she slipped back into her bed.

Again I was impressed that here was an opportunity. I ceased my work in the kitchen and went to her room.

"Listen, dear," I said, "now would be a good time to thank the heavenly Father that our house is not burning, and that we do not have to hurry and throw our things out of doors. And too, we can pray for the people whose house is burning." You may know that this was a wonderful opportunity for us to experience the genuine atmosphere and value of prayer. Is it not sad that some parents laugh at such earnest remarks?

One day I went to visit a sister in our congregation, riding a bus. Before going, I had telephoned to my friend, inquiring where to get off the bus. When I reached the corner, stepped off the bus, and crossed the street, I saw three small girls, and one of them was my friend's six-year-old child. My first thought was that she was playing near this corner; then I thought perhaps she had come to the store for her mother and happened to be there. She skipped along ahead of me at times, then we would walk and talk together, and I kept wondering about it.

Quick as a flash, I was made conscious of what had really happened. I asked, "June, did you come over to the bus line to meet me and show me the way to your house?"

She smiled and nodded her head, and went skipping ahead again. When I reached her again, I said, "Well, June, I am so happy you came to show me the way, and I think you are a little helper and a good girl to do it." She gave no answer except a smile and a skip, and a satisfied expression that I had discovered what she had done. I do not know when I shall forget the sensation I had when she realized that I actually discovered that she came on purpose to meet me. "Greater is He"

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Here are a few headlines from one newspaper during one week's time: "Cocain Defendant Sentenced to Prison," "Homosexuals Threaten Public Health," "Unruly Crowds Clash with Law after KSU Win," "City Jury Sentences Killer-Rapist to Death plus 500 Years," "Drunk Driver Charged with Manslaughter." All of us will agree that there is evil in the world around us. We lock our doors at night, we lock our cars, and we are careful to safeguard against evil doers because there is plenty of evidence evil is nearby. We read about it, hear of it, see some of it, and know about it. We are living in the last days. Read 1 Tim. 3:1-9; Rom. 1:26-32. If the total percentage of people will agree and believe there is evil or crime, then why won't they agree and believe there is good and evidence of God?

First, we must realize that there are anti-Christ movements today. Secular humanism is one of them which is prevalent among our government officials. Humanism is a doctrine centered solely on human interests and values. "Man is supreme-there is no God," they say. They believe in the theory of evolution, a theory that is often presented as fact in many schools and textbooks. Humanists believe that everyone has a right to full sexual freedom. They believe that everyone, regardless of age or condition, has a right to determine the values and goals that affect their lives. They believe that everyone has the right to do his own thing, whatever it may be. Humanists admit there is crime. They believe in preventing it through their trained, devoted psychologists. In short, secular humanism is the Communist religion. How prevalant is humanism? Recently we had an avowed humanist running for President of the United States.

Not only is the devil busy roaring about, but he is also quietly nibbling at the minds of unsuspecting Christians. Day by day, bit by bit, the devil will work on the mind of a Christian. He knows that if he can work unbelief into the mind, then he will destroy the evidence and power of God working in man. Recently, over the radio, a minister was thanking God for forgiving him when he sinned, even when he deliberately sinned against God. This minister was announcing that Christians sin every day, but God forgives them of it. "Thou believest that there is one God; thou doest well; the devils also believe, and tremble. But wilt thou know, O vain man, that faith without works is dead?" (James 2:19, 20). This false idea will soon lead to unbelief. There is no evidence or fruit of a changed life. The Christians who follow this teaching will begin to realize that they are no better than they were before becoming Christians. Therefore, they will think that there is no power in salvation. Total unbelief then slips in quickly. To thousands of people in our sophisticated society, saying, "I am a Christian," merely means, "I am civilized."

People who don't believe God has keeping grace over sin will have a hard time believing God can work miracles. In a poll that was taken of the delegates in the National Council of Churches, 62% questioned miracles of God. The Lord cannot bring about miracles with unbelievers. Jesus met with unbelief, and He was even accused by the scribes of casting out devils with devils in Mark 3:22, 23. Nevertheless, Jesus continued to work marvelous miracles among those who believed. After Jesus arose from the tomb, He did not go to those who had accused Him, but He showed Himself to the believers. God, the Father, and Jesus, the Son, are real to those who believe. A believer's life will bring forth evidence that God has made a change in the heart and mind. Believing brings forth faith. "But without faith it is impos-sible brings forth faith. "But without faith it is impossible to please him; for he that cometh to God must believe that he is, and that he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek him." (Heb. 11:6). Faith in God gives one the privilege to trust in all the good promises of the Word of God.

Now, what are these promises? Here we come to a very serious problem. In 1978, a George Gallup poll found that 42% of the American population agree that "The Bible is the Word of God, and is not mistaken in its statements and teachings." However, the knowledge of the Scriptures was very poor. Only 40% could name even five of the Ten Commandments. A smaller percentage could not name the four Gospels. We need to know the Bible and the truth that it holds for true believing Christians. Jesus Himself said, "Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart; and ye shall find rest unto your souls." (Matt. 11:29). "Then said Jesus to those Jews which believed on him, If ye continue in my word, then are ye my disciples indeed; and ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free." (John 8:31, 32). Believe in God, let Him work in your life, and there will be more evidence of His goodness. "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." (2 Tim. 2:15).

Let us notice this: everyone will agree that crime and evil are around us today, but cannot agree on the goodness and power of God. Christians, take a fresh hold on the power of God so that there will be more evidence of God. Let us deepen down in the Scriptures so that we can refute the propaganda of the evil forces. Secular humanism and communism have brain-washing theories in order to bring about their results. Christians can find the answers for our freedom and crime prevention in the Bible. The Word of God, believed and practised, is the answer to any problem, whether it be individual, community, national, or international. We believers know this to be so. The Power of the Name

"The name of the Lord is a strong tower: the righteous runneth into it, and is safe." (Prov. 18:10).

I learned a wonderful lesson, years ago, from an old heathen named Mochuana in Bechuanaland—S. Africa. We were traveling and I climbed out of the wagon one day and walked toward a canteen. Of all the figures there I seemed to see only one: a poor old man with only a few filthy rags partially covering his equally filthy body, loathsome with sores; his loathsome face and bleared eyes so repulsive that one shrank from the sight.

The old man was just staggering toward the saloon to get another drink when I said, "Old man, I want to speak to you." He turned around stupidly and gave assent. I asked him why he was killing himself with this drink. "Why?" he answered. "Why, you know why, because I can't help it." I said, "You can help it—you need not go on drinking." "What," said he, "do you think any man would be so foolish as to go on taking that stuff if he could stop it? No, no! You English know that well enough, therefore you bring this stuff to us. You know when we once taste it, we can never be free again, never, never. For months after that canteen was opened I never went near it. I saw how it diseased my neighbors: how they went mad after they had been there; how they gave their cattle and their sheep to the white man there. And yet one day I let a mate take me over to taste the white man's magic. I thought I would only taste a little drop. That was five years ago; well you know how it is when you drink the white man's magic. You would never leave off again. I drank and drank. I drank that time till I drank all the money I had by me, then I went home and brought a goat to the canteen man. My wife cried when she saw that I had also come under the spell of the white man's stuff, but it was of no use. I could not stop. I drank out all my goats and sheep and oxen and my cows and wagon. He has them all, and now I am sick and half-blind with these sores and I only want to drink, drink."

"But how do you get the drink if you have no more things to sell?"

He chuckled. "Oh, I get it. When all my money is gone the canteen keeper gives me drink till I owe him a pound, then he won't give me any more, so then I get my brother-in-law to lend me his wagon, and weak as I am, I gather wood till I get a wagon load. Though I am sick, the longing for the drink makes me strong to collect the load. Then I go to Kimberley to sell it and I bring home sometimes three pounds to the canteen man here and I drink every day until I drink all the money out. Then he lets me drink after that for another pound, then I have to get more wood, so I live."

I plead with him, then asked him if he would not stop for the sake of his wife and children. He laughed a strange despairing laugh. "You ask, don't I want to get well? Don't I want to get well? Don't I want to give my poor wife something to buy food with? Of course I do. What man would not like to be well of this disease? Why do you talk so? You know as well as I do that there is no help for me—that there is no doctor on earth who can cure a man of this witchcraft." "There is, there is!" as it rushed over me: "They that be whole need not a physician, but they that are sick."

I told him of Jesus, that loving One who healed all the sick that came to Him. As I told him of one and another who had come to that Jesus and had been made whole, those bleared eyes seemed strained with eagerness and he broke in on me, breathless in excitement. "Is it true? Is it true? Are you telling me true? Where is this man? Tell me, tell me! Is He in Kimberley? Oh, take me to this Doctor. I will give Him all the money for the wood I gather till He has ten loads or even more, only take me to Him." I told him that the Doctor asked for no money. He wanted no pay, only for people to ask Him to make them well. But here came the difficulty to explain to him how he could ask the unseen Christ. He was quite a heathen, and knew nothing about God. I explained to him the coming of Christ to live and die for us here, and the saving power of that Christ. But he wanted to see Him. I got my Bible, and turning to Acts 3, told him word for word the story of that lame man to whom Peter and John brought the message, "In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk,' and of what came to pass-how that helpless man got that perfect soundness in the presence of them all. I told him that the same Jesus was with us now and would heal him if he asked for it. The blessed Spirit carried the message home. That darkened mind drank it in. At last he said, "Tell me the name." I told him. Then he said, "How must I ask Him?" I said, "Just here, we can ask Him." We both knelt and prayed. In a few broken words I asked that God would glorify His Son Jesus and show His almighty healing power in this poor life. Then this poor old drunken heathen said himself, "Great Doctor, make me well." He rose and asked me again, "What is His name?" "Jesus," I said. "Jesus, Jesus"-he went away murmuring to himself.

After a few days a woman approached me. "Mister," she said, "is it you who spoke to my husband last week? Oh, what did you do that he is cured of that drink?" "Why," I said, "did he not tell you?" "No, he said he did not know if he might speak of it, but oh, Mister, he is cured! He has never been to that canteen again, though he has money in his handkerchief still. Yesterday I was afraid he was going. One of his drinking mates came to him to go to the saloon. He had half a crown and begged my husband to go with him. He took hold of his arm and they went half-way to the place. Oh, my heart was sore, but all at once my husband turned around and pulled his arm loose and came back. Oh! He is cured, he is cured!" Here the man came up. Such a transformed face and with tears of joy he said, "It is all true, Mister, all true, what you told me. My wife wants to know, but I did not know if I might tell her." He seemed to feel so wondrous a power might be too sacred to speak of. "Oh, yes," I said, "you may tell all." "Then, wife," he said in an awed whisper, "It's a name, just a name." Then, turning to me, "May I tell the name?" As I nodded my head, he softly spoke the word, "Jesus." It is impossible to convey in words what was borne in my soul then. It has come to me in hours of greatest darkness and brought victory. It has given me hope for the most helplessly lost lives. Thousands of drink and dope and tobacco slaves have been set free by telling them of that record in the third chapter of Acts.

Brothers, sisters, enslaved by drink, or any other evil habit or passion—"Take the name;" it has untold power. That old heathen Mochuana found it able to save, able to deliver, able to give perfect soundness to his poor diseased body, his helpless will-power, and his degraded soul. "Jesus, just Jesus, a name," so he described it to his wife. He told us that all he had done after leaving me, was to say that name to himself and the crave of drink went away from him, and he felt just like before he had ever tasted the stuff. He said his "mouth felt clean like a little child's," and his body was well and strong.

On the day when he allowed his companion to get him to go toward the canteen, he said, "When I was going, all at once the old disease came back—I felt it burn in me. I wanted the drink. The sickness was on me again, and I was so frightened, but just as I was half-way to the canteen, there by that bush, I called out softly three times: 'Jesus! Jesus!' and the disease just left me at once and my body felt cool and I turned back. So you see it's just a name."

Oh, blessed be God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, that name stands eternal in its saving power. It is for you and for me to lay hold of it. There is no habit, no disease, no need, no fear that this name is not "more than conqueror" over, and we can say with the old African, "It is all true, all true. I am healed through the name." "Wherefore God also hath highly exalted him and given him a name which is above every name: that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of things in heaven, and things in earth, and things under the earth."
