The Basis of Thanksgiving

Why are we thankful? Why do the people meet together to give thanks to God? Is it a mere form? Is it only a matter of entertainment or of pretense? Or is there back of thanksgiving a substantial basis of reality? In other words, is there some good reason why we should be thankful and why we should manifest our thankfulness? Is the proclamation of our President and the Governors of the states merely the following of a custom which has no more reason than some of the customs we are following today that have come down to us from the past and which we can not tell why we observe? No, there is a reason for our thankfulness, a substantial reason, and one that should stir our hearts to real thankfulness so that our words should not be merely words without meaning, but words filled with the deepest sentiment of the soul.

There is a reason to be thankful to God. The reason is that we are dependent upon Him, and that of ourselves we are helpless. Our very lives depend upon His blessings. Our happiness all has its root in Him. Some people do not realize this. A man once spoke to another man of his duty to give thanks to God for his prosperity. His answer was, "I plowed the ground; I planted and cultivated the crops, and I harvested them. I have no one to be thankful to but myself." He had forgotten who put the fertility in the soil and the germinating power into the seed. He had forgotten who had sent the sunshine and the rain. So he thought he had only himself to thank.

Too often we forget God's part in our blessings. We labor and then reap what seems to be the fruit of our labor. We toil and then eat the products of our toil. But how many forget to look beyond their own labor and beyond the satisfaction of their own desires! Back of every blessing is the Blesser. Back of every creation is the Creator. Back of every product of life is the Author of life. "In Him we live, and move, and have our being." He gives life and breath and all things. We are wholly dependent upon Him. We can not make one grain of wheat grow. We can not make one luscious apple. Were it not for God working with us, our tables today would not be covered with good things, our bodies would not be clothed with comfortable clothingin fact, we should have no homes, no comforts.

All things come from Him, and to Him is due the praise for all. And as we render to Him that praise on Thanksgiving Day, shall we see to it that our tribute is not mere lip service, and that the day is not merely a day for human enjoyment or for the pleasure of the sense, but that higher than our pleasure in eating and drinking is our joy in God, and deeper than the satisfaction that comes from temporal things is the satisfaction of being in harmony with God and of lifting up our hearts to Him and giving to Him His due for our blessings.

Thanksgiving is based on appreciation. One of those terrible indictments that Paul brings against mankind is that they were not thankful. And one of the things that was to mark the days of falling away was that man should be unthankful. Appreciation is one thing that we need to cultivate, and the reason that we do not more keenly appreciate God's blessings is because appreciation comes from consideration, and too often we take the blessings from His hand without a second thought. We take them as a matter of course. We receive them as belonging to us, and not as the gifts of God.

We ought to receive nothing from His hand as

a matter of course or as justly due to us. They are His gift. We ought to cultivate the habit of considering these things in their true relation. If we would "count our blessings" over as the song says, if we would stop to consider them "one by one," our hearts could not fail to appreciate the kindness of God to us, we would see a multitude of blessings every day. So many people spend their time complaining, worrying, wondering about the future, envying others, and bringing sorrow and discord into their lives instead of the joy and sweetness that might come to them if they would spend their

time looking at God's blessings and the good and beautiful things that He sends into their lives.

The story is told of a man who on Thanksgiving morning sent his two sons out through the city with instructions to see what they could see, and then come back and tell him what they had to be thankful for. The first went his way, made his rounds, and returning, said to his father. "I do not see that I have anything to be thankful for." Then he went on to tell of those who were more fortunate than he. He told of the rich in their luxury, of the fortunate, and the famous. Then he spoke of how little he himself had and declared that he could see nothing for which to be thankful. The other son returned with his eyes shining and began to tell of the many things he had to be thankful for. "There is crippled John," he said, "who has to go on crutches; I saw him at the first corner, and I was thankful that I had two good limbs. And there is old Mother Gray, who had no relatives and is so



poor. I was thankful that I had such a pleasant home and such a kind father and mother and other relatives. I saw the poor newsboys in their rags, and I was thankful that I had good clothes. I saw poor little Johnny Gates who has to sit in a wheelchair all the time, and Oh Father! I saw so many that do not have things as good as we do, and I just thought. 'How many, many things we have to be thankful for.'" Which one of these boys have you been like during the past year?

As before stated, thanksgiving is based on appreciation, and appreciation comes from consideration. If we will but open our eyes and look about us we shall find plenty of things for which to be thankful. Some things may be different from what we should like them to be. Perhaps we can think of many things that we should like to have different, but if we spend our time looking at these

> things, we shall forget the good that we have, and our lives will seem impoverished. But if we will look away from these things that we should like to have different to the things that are as we like them, we can find many things for which to be thankful, and the expression of our thankfulness to God will bring His blessing upon us. For when we praise the Lord from appreciative hearts, it opens the fountain of joyfulness, and our souls are watered with heavenly blessings.

It is true that prices are high, but wages are also high, and the people are living in luxury. Across the sea millions of hungry people would be glad beyond our dreams of gladness if they could have what we have. Peace has come again to the wartorn nations, and for this blessing there should come into our hearts and then go out to God the deepest thanksgiving. Our nation is prosperous, and we are sharing in that prosperity.

We should be thankful for our friends, our brethren and sisters in the Lord, the literature we have to read, and our homes, though they may be humble.

Again, we have the church and the fellowship of God's saints. How different our situation might be if we were in a heathen land 'surrounded by the temples of idol worshipers! If what the church means to us were taken out of our lives, how much would be left? Then there are the blessings of

Editorials

"And when he [Jehu] was departed thence, he lighted on Jehonadab the son of Rechab coming to meet him: and he saluted him, and said to him, Is thine heart right, as my heart is with thy heart? And Jehonadab answered, It is. If it be, give me thine hand. And he gave him his hand; ..." II Kings 10:15.

The offering of one's hand to another holds a particular and deep significance. In our Western civilization it is easy to take this act for granted.

The bond that Jehu cemented with Jehonadab through the clasping of hands was only contingent upon having a common goal. This was also the motivation recorded in Galatians 2:9. "And when James, Cephas and John, who seemed to be pillars, perceived the grace that was given unto me, they gave to me and Barnabas the right hands of fellowship; that we should go unto the heathen, and they unto the circumcision." This is the thought that C. W. Naylor essayed to impart when he penned, "We reach our hand in fellowship to every blood-washed one." The main question we should ask is that of Jehu, "Is thine heart right, as my heart is with thy heart?" This is an attitude that will reach the highest level of honesty before God on the part of both participants in an alliance of confidence.

A handshake is an expression of fellowship. In the business world it is often practiced as a show of having something in common. How much more should the saints be able to freely enter into it.

The handshake is a show of partnership. A pact is many times cemented with a clasping of hands. A common human goal falls far short of the entwining of hearts by Christians. God's love makes us one body and we all hold heaven as a mutual endeavor.

Offering the hand is a symbol of willingness to help. Our commitment to God pledges our strength to help all others make a successful ending of this life. Then surely a handshake among the saints is not only proper but significant.

In the past there have been those who have championed certain causes with the symbol of the clenched fist. This is just the opposite of the clasped hand. The clenched fist shows a militant attitude, and one of accomplishing a means by their own power. There is much more power in the unity of togetherness, and love will accomplish much more than a threatening posture.

A salutation among the armed forces is the salute. This shows respect, but it also signifies rank. Among Christians, we are all brothers, therefore the handshake is more befitting.

If this outward act so closely mirrors an in-

ward value, let us make sure our spirit is virtuous in bespeaking partnership, and our soul is strengthened in extending a helping hand.



Hundreds of thousands of people suffered much by the eruption of Mount Pinatubo. Their source of living was lost, and many are dying in evacuation areas caused by epidemic. Herschell Henry Hargrave was born April 4, 1940 to Benson D. and Helen Elizabeth Hargrave in Xenia, OH, the third of 11 children, and passed from this life on Oct. 6 1991. He graduated from Xenia High School in 1958 and enlisted in the United States Air Force where he was trained as an aircraft mechanic and began a love affair with airplanes. His duty took him to many parts of the world: Okinawa, Japan, Turkey, Italy, the Philippines, and Vietnam. He was saved in 1964 and was discharged as a conscientious objector in 1967.

Bro. Hargrave found his sweetheart in Goulds, FL while stationed at Homestead, FL, and wed Miss Mary Ellen Plair, March 31, 1963. To this union were born eight children. His father and two children, Mark and Faith preceded him in death.

He graduated with a degree in accounting from Charron Williams Business College and earned credits at Miami Dade Jr. College in several counseling courses. Question and Answer by Ostis B. Wilson

Note: This is article three of a series of articles on the subject of salvation from sin, including justification and sanctification, the need of sanctification and why it requires a second and separate work of Divine grace to accomplish it, etc.

Answer: We have had two articles teaching on the matter of inherited sin, sometimes referred to as "native depravity," "depraved nature," "sin principle," etc. We will now enter into the discussion of actual, willful sin which produces guilt and condemnation in the conscience, and why every individual experiences this condition.

When a child reaches the age of accountability before God and falls into willful disobedience to His law, becomes guilty of sin and a partaker of the sinful life, this is more than just the nature of sin, which in itself is not productive of guilt, but is the fruit of that nature, or the projection of it, into a way of life of actual sins committed. This is what brings guilt and condemnation on the soul. This, then, takes him a second step lower than the plane on which man was created. However, we must not confuse the hereditary sin, or seed of sin, or principle of sin, with sin acquired or committed. Some find the idea of our inheriting the seed of sin objectionable on the grounds that they cannot conceive of an infant child just born into the world being a guilty sinner. What these folks are doing is confusing sin inherited with sin acquired or committed.

Inherited sin is never productive of guilt. Even though the infant child possesses within him the seed of sin from his first parent, Adam, he remains in a state of perfect innocence before God until he reaches an age of accountability to know right from wrong, and by an act of his own free will does the wrong thing.

This is covered by the principle laid down in Romans 7:9-11. "For I was alive in a state of innocence before Godl without the law once: but when the commandment came, sin revived, and I died llost my innocence and became guilty before God]. And the commandment, which was ordained to life. I found to be unto death. For sin. taking occasion by the commandment, deceived me, and by it slew me." Also in I John 3:4 we read, "Whosoever committeth sin transgresseth also the law: for sin is the transgression of the law." Again in Romans 4:15 it is said, "Because the law worketh wrath: for where no law is, there is no transgression." Romans 5:13 says, "(For until the law sin was in the world: but sin is not imputed where there is no law." James 4:17 says, "Therefore to him that knoweth to do good, and doeth it not, to him it is sin."

All of the above Scriptures sum up to the fact that a person must have knowledge of the law or will of God, and know what is right to do and then fail to do it before it is imputed to him as sin, or charged against him as such, and he becomes guilty before God. What is sometimes called "sin inherited" is only a nature and is not productive of guilt. There must be a willful, knowing transgression of God's law to make one guilty of sin before God. This principle would be applicable to all, beginning with the infant who had no knowledge of moral principles on through persons of all ages who were innocently ignorant of God's will on any point and had not yet received light or knowledge on a given point. Romans. 4:6-8 says, "Even as David also describeth the blessedness of the man. unto whom God imputeth righteousness without works, Saying, Blessed are they whose iniquities are forgiven, and whose sins are covered. Blessed is the man to whom the Lord will not impute sin."

I John 5:17 says, "All unrighteousness is sin: and there is a sin not unto death." I have already referred to Romans 7:9-11 but I wish to refer to it again here to pick up another point or two. In Romans 7:8-9 it says, "But sin, taking occasion by the commandment, wrought in me all manner of concupiscence. For without the law sin was dead. For I was alive without the law once: but when the commandment came, sin revived, and I died." Here we have a reference to a sin that spawned sin. worked sin, wrought sin, produced sin. A tree can only grow on the root from which it sprang and can only live in the life which was in the seed that gave it its being. There must be a source from which any thing and every thing springs. Sin has a source from which it springs also and it is in this seed of sin, this native depravity or sin principle which has passed from Adam on down through all of his posterity. This is the sin within Paul which rose up and slew him and he died (spiritually) when he came to accountability before God through a knowledge of God's law. We need to understand the potentials of sin and its enormity. Sin is capable of immense expansion and evolution. In the most mild sin exists the potential of the most vicious sin which can be imagined. The fundamental principle of evolution is that that which is evolved must first have been involved. Hence, in some mysterious way all the properties of the fully developed, full grown oak tree existed in the acorn from which that tree grew. This is true of every thing which has life in it. It is also true of the principles of sin and righteousness.

The apparently mild sin of which Adam and Eve were guilty blossomed out in the murder of one of their children by his own brother not far down the line. Within 1500 to 1600 years, sin had ruined the entire race and the world that then was, was ready for destruction. Every hideous sin that is even beyond our imagination in the world of today, is all springing from the properties which existed in that inherent seed of sin. Although in itself it is not productive of guilt, it is blossoming out into the entire endless chain of sins which are engulfing the world in our time. This is what Paul referred to in Romans 7:8-9.

That sinful nature which is inherent in all of Adam's race lies dead or dormant-without power to produce guilt and condemnation-until the individual comes face to face with the commandment of God and a knowledge of God's will (receives light). Then that corrupt nature, indwelling sin, seed or principle of sin revives, becomes active to cause us to fall into willful acts of sin and produces guilt and condemnation of conscience because now the knowledge of the law has come to us. The following Scriptures confirm this fact. "And this is the condemnation, that light is come into the world, and men loved darkness rather than light, because their deeds were evil." John 3:19. "Jesus said unto them, If ye were blind, ye should have no sin: but now ye say, We see; therefore your sin remaineth." John 9:41. "If I

[Jesus] had not come and spoken unto them, they had not had sin: but now they have no cloke for their sin, He that hateth me hateth my Father also. If I had not done among them the works which none other man did, they had not had sin; but now have they both seen and hated both me and my Father." John 15:22-24.

5. The Children's Rights Treaty

Article 14, freedom of thought, conscience, and religion; article 15, freedom of association; article 16, the right to privacy; article 17, the right of access to the media, or any of the other provisions in this treaty, could be interpreted by the authorities, to mean biblical child-rearing practices are a violation of the law.

6. P-A-T Parents as Teachers The same people who helped remove prayer

(Home-based program for preschool children)

from the classroom. and are now choosing textbooks that restrict the mention of God's role in the development of the greatness of this nation, are now working to come into homes with child development information available from libraries. Their approach leaves parents feeling inadequate and ignorant. Although they may tell you to consider them your friends, they are instructed to call the child abuse hot-line if state approved childrearing policies are not followed, or any other "problems" are observed.

There are many worthy causes Christians should support in prayers and deeds. However, be sure to earnestly seek God for guidance in all areas of life. An innocent movement can be taken over by forces working to put souls in bondage. They may propose laws to assist in accomplishing this very thing. Remember II Corinthians 3:17, "... Where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is liberty." We should never forget to pray for all who are in authority, that we might live a quiet and peaceable life. (I Tim. 2:1-2).


