

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Russian Missionary Trip Report

Dear ones:
We are s

We are so very grateful to you for your prayers during our trip, Oct. 14-25, to Moscow, Russia. Everywhere we went God took good care of us and provided us with someone

who spoke English and Russian who knew how to get around in that big city of 9.5 million. We never were afraid. Thank the Lord! I'm sure that during the most difficult times God gave you a burden to pray for us and that is why everything went so smoothly. God knew better than we did how much we needed Him. If I had to sum up our trip in a few words, it would be John 4:35, "... Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest." "Righteousness exalteth a nation: but sin is a reproach to any people." Prov. 14:34. We found a peoplewho realize why their country is in such chaos and they are calling for the gospel and workers who can teach them.

It is legal to own a Bible in Russia now. We had no trouble in customs getting Bibles into the country. The Faith Publishing House donated 60 Bibles, the young people bought us 20 New Testaments, the Four Corners congregation sent a bunch of adult Sunday school Bible Lessons, and the Shreveport children sent some gifts and tracts to give to the young people. They were all well received and some of the older people wept and trembled to get a Bible. We were so thankful to get the Bibles and tracts in the Russian language.

We were hosted by Mr. Yuri Shamilov, Deputy Director of the Moscow International Comparative Educational Committee. We stayed about 20 miles west of Moscow in what used to be a Young Pioneer camp. We paid \$3.00 perday for our room and board. There was also a group of teachers from Siberia at the camp, studying new forms of education. Olga, a secondary English teacher, got saved the first evening we were there. Therefore, for the rest of the week we had an interpreter who was also eager to learn about the Lord. None of the other Russian people at the camp understood English, so we were so thankful for how the Lord helped Olga to be there and also for saving her.

We asked the Lord to direct us to some of His people who stayed true during the time of great persecution. Praise the Lord! A miracle followed. The Lord directed a young woman, Veronica, to us who was an English/Russian interpreter by profession. She had gotten saved about a month before when she was interpreting for

some other missionaries. God had made such a change in her life. She said, "It has made such a difference in my life. I don't worry any more. Even though the lack of food and other problems are still there. I know that God is taking care of me. God has supplied my needs in unusual ways." We really felt bonded to her. She has a very gentle and quiet spirit and is very eager to know the truth. She told us of a church who met in different homes around Moscow. We asked her to take us to visit it, but she had other obligations on Sunday. However, she did give us the address but strongly discouraged us from trying it, because we might get lost. It was two hours traveling time from where we were staying and very difficult to find. However, James felt the Lord wanted us to at least try, so on Sunday morning, we ventured out with our interpreter, Olga, and her friend, Marina, who had also just gotten saved the first night at the camp. We walked a mile, then boarded a bus and traveled to the subway and paid 1/3 of a cent or 15 Kopeks to get on. Then while riding along, we noticed a young man, Kirill, reading his Bible. James walked over and said, "Good Book," then motioned for him to come sit by Olga. After a short inquiry, she said, "This is fantastic! He is going to the same service we are hoping to find." We began praising God and crying with joy for this was no small miracle.

We got off the subway then onto a train that took us to a far southeast suburb of Moscow.

Soon we were being ushered into an apartment house where approximately 85 very fervent souls were gathered singing acapella. Our tears mingled with theirs for the joy of meeting the saints on the other side of the world. The service lasted 4-5 hours. The

people were happy, holy, and humble looking folks. The ministers preached messages on sacrifice, purity, complete dedication and selflessness. The pastor asked James to share the Word with them. He preached on "Hearing the Shepherd's Voice." This church is not licensed by the government so they

have suffered persecution. The pastor was in house arrest for two years in 1984. They plan to continue worshiping in the homes during the winter and in the woods during the summer because they fear that this present freedom of religion won't last long, and strong persecutions from the Orthodox church will follow in a few years. The service had lasted so long that Olga and Marina had to leave; but the Lord impressed a Spanish-speaking woman to ask me if I spoke Spanish. After the service, we visited through Elena, the Spanish-speaking sister, in the pastor's home. They served us beets, potatoes, bread and Spam for lunch. Here we met his wife and his ten children, who were not in the service, because of the lack of space in the 15' x 17' room. They were so gracious and showed us so much love, which was also very evident in their actions toward each other. The six daughters' names are Evangeline, Esther, Ruth, Leah, Hannah, and Miriam. His sons' names are Chris, Mark, Emmanuel, and Joel. The pastor's name is Richard and his wife's Hope. We visited with them for three hours. Other young people were singing and praying in other rooms of the house. The saints there asked us to pray for their church that it would not cool down or become lax during this time of freedom. We enjoyed our visit with them so much and had to leave sooner than what we wished. We had to meet the rest of the Americans in our group at a registered First Baptist Church but which we didn't know how to find; but thank the Lord, Sister Hope said, "I can take you right to it." Praise the Lord! He always had someone present to show us the way to get around in this huge and strange city.

The Soviets outlawed the Bible in their country and in their schools for 70 years, but now they are begging Christian people to come start Bible-based education all over the union. The government has accredited the ACE (Accelerated Christian Education) school and invited its educators to administer one in every public school in Russia. They are even donating the buildings rent free. We had the opportunity to visit an American family of six who are living in Moscow and teaching in the Christian school. In the mornings they work together with a bilingual Russian teacher who aids in helping the children understand English. In the afternoon the classes are in the Russian Literature. The children take home the gospel that they learned in school, in turn, the parents become inter-

ested in the truth and ask questions. This teacher said, "If I were a preacher, I could stay busy night and day preaching to these hungry souls. I already have more Bible studies than what I can handle." We asked him what it was like to live in Moscow; he told us that they live comfortably for under \$300.00 a month; they travel on the subway just like everybody else. His four children have adjusted well and are learning the language. Nobody has washers and dryers so they wear their clothes all week then wash by hand on Saturdays. They have a "food man" who shops for them because the lines are so long in some places. It is a very time consuming job. He said all the people are so eager to learn the Bible and its principles of truth. Other Russian teachers told us, "We want a new form of education that teaches truth and life." We met a Russian physicist who told us, "We want our daughter to learn the Bible. In our school days we were denied it, but we don't want our children to grow up with our ignorance of God." We visited with him about the shortage of food in their country and about the interest that our government may have in helping them through this crisis; to which he responded, "We don't need your meat and bread. Just give us the Word of God." Several Russian people invited us back to teach them the Bible. The day before we left, a college student asked me, "Where do we go to learn about Jesus after you leave?" The hunger for spiritual food was evident in almost everyone we talked to.

The Soviet Union is in great confusion. The laws have been changing so rapidly that nobody really knows which are in effect and which ones have been changed. The search for food grows tiresome. Some families have not seen eggs and milk in a year. Divorce is common and alcoholism in the men is rampant. They are hopeless without God. Many Russians with families have only one or two children. The family structure is almost non-existent. Because families are divided with the parents both working and the children in day care centers and in schools for nine hours everyday, they don't have the opportunity to be together. Teenagers leave home as soon as they are of age. They all must serve two year in the military, and many go to the university five years. The Russian people are educated highly in their minds but not in their hearts. They have been oppressed for several generations. We witnessed at least five deaths on the

We have to intimate with an exceeding great joy that we are influencing circumstances now, having passed through the Lord's Academy of Faith. It melts away difficulties and disappointments which are bound to arise in our ordinary life by having them treated as inevitable. Saints are gathering around Him to learn more of Him, and admirably availing themselves in a variety of subjects of cardinal importance and priceless worth. The Lord is an instructor of no compare. Question and Answer by Ostis B. Wilson

Note: This is the fourth article in a series of articles on the subject of sin, both inherited and committed, and how each of these affects the process of redemption; how it was accomplished; our deliverance from sin and how it is brought about; the two steps involved in our salvation known as justification and sanctification and what is contained in each; why two steps are required and what each does; etc.

Answer: The article in the November paper closed with several Scriptures introduced by Jesus showing that sin in the individual is rated by the light and understanding the person has, and that Christ's coming into the world was to declare what God expected of each person! The way of salvation was proclaimed in the power of the Holy Spirit, showing up sin, its power and effects, as had never been done before.

After Jesus' time of temptation from the Devil, the Scripture says that He returned in the power of the Spirit into Galilee. (Luke 4:14). Jesus was baptized with the Holy Spirit at His baptism, then went through His temptation, and then returned in the "power of the Spirit" and began to preach in the "power of the Spirit." The word He preached was accompanied by the Spirit and brought conviction of sin to the hearts of the hearers. When Jesus returned to heaven after His resurrection, He sent the Holy Spirit to dwell in the hearts of all believers, and to direct and supervise the operation of the Church He had built. The ministers of the Jerusalem Church preached the gospel of Christ in the "power of the Spirit," as Jesus Himself had done, and it produced the same effect. It was said of Stephen in Acts 6:10 that they were not able to resist the wisdom and spirit with which He spoke.

In John 16:8, Jesus, speaking of the Holy Spirit, said, "And when he is come, he will reprove, convince, or convict the world of sin." It takes a work of the Holy Spirit in a person's heart to really convince and convict him of sin to the extent he can genuinely repent of sin and believe in Christ to the saving of his soul. Before the Holy Spirit came into the world and into men's hearts as He does now in this Holy Spiritdispensation, men could not actually see sin in its true color. Old Testament saints did not see the depths of sin as we can see it in this age of time. The Holy Spirit gives us a new way of seeing things, with which we can see spiritual things where all has been darkness before. This is the age of spiritual light because the Holy Spirit is in the world and dealing with men's hearts.

Just as the dust in a room rises or appears when the sunlight is let in; so when the light of God's law (the gospel of Jesus Christ) enters the heart accompanied by the Holy Spirit, it causes sin to appear as sin. The apostle Paul said in Romans 7:13, "... But sin, that it might appear sin, ... "It took an operation of the Holy Spirit in the heart to cause this to happen. Then we see in sin that which we had never seen in it before. We see sin in its true colors; defiling, deforming, the breaking of a righteous law, affronting an awful majesty, and profaning a sovereign crown by casting it to the ground. We see sin in its consequences with death at its heels. "The wages of sin is death," (Rom. 6:23); and "The soul that sinneth, it shall die." (Ezek. 18:4). Thus sin revives and we die, or lose our innocence before God in which we have lived up until then, and become guilty before Him and condemned in our conscience. There is nothing about which the natural man is more blind than about inherent corruption, concerning which the understanding is altogether in the dark until the Holy Spirit by the Word of God—the gospel of Christ—reveals it and makes it known.

Now, let us return to Romans 5:12 and look at it a little further. It is said in the Scripture, "... so death passed upon all men, for that all have sinned." There would surely be no question in any of our minds about all dying. All our ancestors have died and gone on and we see people around us dying every day, and we all accept the fact that we will die. But in the text the fact that all die is predicated on the fact that all have sinned. Why can we not as readily accept that statement as the one preceding it?

Notwithstanding, there may be some question in the minds of some as to how this could be and whether it includes children (before the age of accountability), etc. I feel it the safest policy to accept the statement as it is in God's Word whether we may be able to explain every feature of it or not, and especially when a statement that we all do accept without question is predicated upon this statement.

It is my persuasion that small children do sin. They do unrighteous things and "All unrighteousness is sin." (I John 5:17). Very small children do things that are not right. They do things that they could not do and remain in innocency before God if they were older and more mature in judgment. They deceive their parents, fuss and fight over their toys, strike each other, bite, scratch, and pull hair when another child has a toy they want. They throw temper tantrums when they can't have their own way and many other things that are not right and is therefore sin in the strictest sense of the word. All of this indicates something in that child's nature that is selfish. It also indicates something in the child's nature to want his own way and to rebel when he can't have it.

The question has been asked, "What makes a child cry?" Ordinary crying could be for many ordinary causes. But when a child throws a temper tantrum because he cannot have his or her own way, that goes deeper and indicates that something is in his nature to want his own way. His actions show rebellion inside of him against not being able to have his own way. I have seen some real small children throw themselves on the floor, scream, yell and cry because they could not have something done their own way. You may say, "My child doesn't have those kind of spells. I just won't allow it and he knows just what he would get for trying something like that. Well, that is real wonderful and you ought not to allow your child to act that way. But if you have your child under better control than that, it does not mean that he does not have the same thing in his nature as the child who does act that way. He just knows he could not get by with it. But you just let him alone and exercise no control over him and he will be just as bad as that other child who is not under proper control. Take a whole lot of children and just leave them all to themselves and they will all be bad that way because it is in their nature to be selfish, to want their own way and to rebel when they can't have it.

Let us compare the moral man who doesn't lie, steal, cheat, drink, gamble, commit adultery, etc., with the man who does these things. We would all agree that he needs salvation just as much as the man who does those evil, immoral things and will be lost the same as he, if he isn't born again. Jesus said, "... Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God." John 3:5. He has the same root of sin (sin nature) in him that the other man has but he has exercised better control over his life perhaps through the influence, teaching and prayers of godly parents, and that root just has not developed that far and borne that much fruit. But he will still be lost if he fails to be born again and obtain salvation through faith in the all-atoning blood of Jesus Christ.
