The Birth of Jesus Christ

Why is the birth of Jesus Christ most glorious and profound, notably revered and sublime? How could such immortal birth as His stand the test of time? Several hundred years before His birth, Isaiah, the prophet, made this remarkable prophetic announcement: "For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given: and the government shall be upon his shoulders: and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counselor, the Mighty God, the Everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace." As long as Christianity exists, the birth of Christ stands to be honored and will forever endure. He left His heavenly abode to live with, and to redeem the transgressions of this sinful world.

The Son of God incarnate was born to a virgin mother, for He was conceived by Mary through the Holy Ghost. However, to the perverted, unregenerate human mind and thinking, it is seemingly impossible to happen. But Jeremiah, the prophet, said of God: "I am the Lord of all flesh: is there anything hard for me?" He came to earth in the form of a human being, true God and man.

The Lord and Savior of mankind, Jesus Christ, the Messiah, as revealed in the Scriptures, has neither a beginning nor an ending. The Holy Writ further says that he is the alpha and omega, the first and the last, the only beloved begotten Son of the Almighty God. This is marvelously the spiritual side of Christ's life. The Son of Man, as Jesus called Himself. while here on earth suffered the most excruciating, painful bleeding heart and intolerable, dismal agony of soul. He came to his own creation, but the people did not receive Him. His unspeakable bitter trials and temptations coming as they did from His arch enemy, Satan, were incredibly ignominious and inhuman. He was reviled and mocked, humiliated and blasphemed in the most unprintable curse of men. Yet He remained silent, meek and humble till death, amidst those ominous, contemptible, and unfounded virulent accusations. He was like a lamb brought to the slaughter, but He opened not His mouth. He was thrust into the dark abyss of human hate and malice by His disgraceful, wicked countrymen. However, from His wonderful love and abiding, bountiful mercy toward His enemies, even in His last fleeting breath at Calvary's cross, came these heartening, gracious, placable words of life: "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do." What impressive exceptional humility and immortal divine forgiveness coming as it were from the lips of the only loving, eternal Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, with whom is our everlasting peace and salvation. Peter, the apostle, said of Him, "For even hereunto were ye called: because Christ also suffered for us, leaving us an example, that ye should follow his steps: who did no sin, neither was guile found in his mouth." —C. Teasing

(Excerpts taken from a message of Bro. Ed Wilson, Loranger, LA. 4-21-91.)

Is there a place in the life of saints for humor? And if so, where and when is the point that it grieves the Lord? The Bible has some instructions on that subject and we want to talk about it, by the Lord's help. Paul said that our leaders are to be grave. A grave person is a serious person and solemn in what he's undertaking to do.

Proverbs 17:22 says, "A merry heart doeth good like a medicine: but a broken spirit drieth the bones." Another scripture in Proverbs 15:15b says "... he that is of a merry heart hath a continual feast." Now, I take the position in my understanding of the Scriptures, that those about being grave and sober refer to our ability to make the sound decisions that govern our lives. There's no room in that for unsettled, deviant, unstable behavior. The scripture said "For God hath not given us the spirit of fear; but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind." (II Tim. 1:7.) Having a sound mind will make one sober. We ought to think soberly about our soul, eternity, and spiritual things. If I go elsewhere when I could have gone to meeting, that would not be a grave decision. Solomon compared that kind of behavior to one who's asleep at the top of a mast called the "crow's nest." Let's say that the man is asleep when a storm comes up. He has no concern for his life, no regard that the deck's a hundred feet below and any little roll could send him over the edge. Now that could be compared to me disregarding the things having to do with my soul; that I'd allow any trivial little thing that the world has to offer to distract me from taking time to attend to the matters of my soul. When it comes evening time, if instead of taking time to have a little worship. I allow the cares of life to distract me from doing that, that's not grave thinking. People can be merry, cheerful, enjoy life, have a smile, laugh a lot and yet make grave, sober and sound decisions in the way they handle themselves. And there are advantages in being able to smile, and to laugh. Nearly everybody would rather be around someone that's cheerful, than around someone who's gloomy all the time. If you have in mind, and I hope we all do, to help people, you'll find you do it better with a cheerful countenance than you do with a sad one. So, this scripture said a merry heart doeth good like a medicine.

Pneumonia is caused by a germ. You can take the pneumonia organism and culture it out on a little cup, put a little drop of penicillin on the edge of it, and watch it filter across and kill

all those organisms. Well, penicillin is a medicine. This scripture says "a merry heart doeth good like a medicine." Have a heart that's full of good cheer, smiling, encouraged and lifted up.

Don't be afraid to enter into places where there's trouble, with people cast down, gloomy and feeling bad. Take a merry heart with you, because it does good like a medicine. The world's in trouble, folks, and I'm trying to help them. I want to have something that will reach to where their needs are, by the Lord's help, in a way that's easy for them to accept; but "a broken spirit drieth the bones."

Ephesians 5:1,2 says, "Be ye therefore followers of God, as dear children; And walk in love, as Christ also hath loved us, and hath given himself for us an offering and a sacrifice to God for a sweetsmelling savour." I understand that. The next verse says, "But fornication, and all uncleanness, or covetousness, let it not be once named among you, as becometh saints." The catalog of things listed here is pretty awful. It will behoove us to study this scripture well and understand what it means. Fornication,leave that alone! Uncleanness is involved in thoughts, in conversation and in a spirit that people of the world get under. So often, it prompts them to take pleasure in carnal excesses, having to do with the things that surround the passions of fornication. Paul booked them all in the same category-fornication,

uncleanness and covetousness. "Let it not be once named among you as becometh saints." Not only don't you do these things, but if you know somebody that's doing them, draw a line on them. Don't fellowship that kind of spirit by accepting their testimony, allowing them to fulfill a role in your congregations as somebody that's accepted in confidence and respect. If these things are named among you, it will lower your testimony of being called saints.

The next verse says, "Neither filthiness, nor foolish talking, nor jesting, which are not convenient..." (Eph. 5:4.) This is an inner filthiness and uncleanness. Jesting is translated from a Greek word, "eutrepelia", and that word means ribaldry or double entente. I'll give you an example of what a double entente is. Twentyfive years ago, if you said somebody was a gay

> young man, you meant he was a happy young man. You could say that same thing today, but it carries a double meaning. It has a ribald meaning to it. That's what this scripture's referring to;

things that carry that connotation of uncleanness and impurity. The world delights in these kind of things. You'll see it driving down the highway on bumper stickers. There's a spirit that goes along with that. That's why this word, jesting, which actually means ribaldry or double entente, is included in a list that involves fornication, filthiness and uncleanness. That's why the Bible is condemning. And it condemns it in very strong language. The scripture goes on down to say, "For this ye know, that no whoremonger, nor unclean person, nor covetous man, who is an idolater, hath any inheritance in the kingdom of Christ and of God." That's about as serious as a scripture can be. This is talking about people who are not saved. The Lord intended His people to be free from those kind of spirits. To the pure, He said, all things are pure. When you read the Bible, you'll read some pretty coarse language in there, in reference to some pretty coarse things, but they're only made impure when people are impure on the inside. To the pure, all things are pure, with no double meaning. The Bible spells out what they are, and they're clean and holy. The Lord is teaching us to conduct our conver-

Surely, we have a need for more laborers.

We departed here September 4 and flew to La Ceiba, on the mainland of Honduras. We had a weekend meeting with the new saints we have met there. We were all welcomed and made comfortable by the several households of faith in that city. The Lord blessed, and folks sought help for both soul and body. We were glad to become better acquainted with the James family, and the two Burkes families. We also visited

there enroute to the States in November.

We arrived in the Island of Roatan on Monday and spent the first three weeks trying to organize building plans for the proposed chapel, and also completing the little dwelling there for us to live in. I became very ill the first week, but thank the Lord, He raised me up. My wife, Jeanie, suffered from a gall bladder attack, also, but the Lord brought her through. We are so thankful the Lord kept our children well for two months.

The Church of God van arrived in the third week. This was much appreciated, as it had been so hard to get building materials delivered. sation with people in just that very same way.

Now I want to turn to the twenty-sixth chapter of Proverbs and read a scripture there. This is another interesting and powerful scripture. Solomon said, "As a mad man who casteth firebrands, arrows, and death, so is the man that deceiveth his neighbour, and saith, Am not I in sport?" We use "mad" in our language sometimes, when more properly, we should say "angry." The madness referred to here is not anger, but a mental incapacity of someone who has lost their faculty to understand and to weigh things rightly.

People will say things in the guise of teasing one another that they'd never say to your face, seriously, and that can cut to the very quick. They're like a mad man throwing firebrands, arrows, and death, and then saying, "Isn't it a game? Why are you so upset? Aren't I just playing with you?" Teasing can be one of the cruelest forms of communication there is: laughing at somebody to hurt. It's not wrong to laugh with people, but it's so painful to laugh at somebody. And there's a world of difference. It'll destroy close friendships, do damage to the hearts of those we love and will separate between chief friends. One of the reasons it cuts so deep is because there's a grain of truth in it. The truth is that you really feel. You wouldn't tell me "Your nose is too big for your face," but you might tease about it. You might say, "Aw, here comes ole' funny nose again," and everybody laughs about it. It's supposed to be a joke, but it cuts. The Bible is against that, folks. It's like a mad man throwing firebrands and arrows and death. The Lord would have us, with our merry hearts, to be gentle in everything that we do. "Kind and loving," the song writer said, "to each other, Gentle words to all we meet-Thus we follow Christ our Savior, Proving all his service sweet." That's the way the Lord would have us to live our lives while we walk along through this world, showing gentleness, patience and kindness to one another, guarding our words. Laugh with people when you have the chance,—but be careful about laughing at people.

Spirits

I think about how Jesus dealt with different kinds of spirits in His day. He used authority in dealing with those things, didn't He? He had authority and power over the spirits of the devil. We can have that. It is nothing uncommon to the people of God. There is something that He gives us as a monitor to detect when things are wrong. He wants us to be able to do that.

Jesus said that in the last days it would be as in the days of Noah, there would be people marrying and giving in marriage. Call it an adulterous generation. We are in an adulterous generation. People have adulterous spirits. They are rampant in the land. Guard yourself. Be very careful. Adulterous spirits are lurking around, and come right among us many times. What are we going to do? If I told you to just set back and relax, I would be failing your soul. I am telling you to beware. They take no respect for anyone, or anybody. Listen, God has designed our souls to be full. He has designed our spirits to be satisfied in Him. When we are not and our spirit dwindles and withers, pretty soon there is a vacuum. When that vacuum is created, don't think for one minute that Satan is not aware of it. I am saying, if you give an adulterous, or lustful spirit, any room in your life, that thing will get ahold of you.

There are several things that I would like to mention; to put a tag on the devil. If we could clothe him tonight and you could see him better, I believe you would know better how to fight him. Young people, I want to warn you. You be careful what you get your hands on and what you see with your eyes. Many homes are wrecked by people, by young boys, getting ahold of the wrong material. It will filter right in through our campground gates. It will get right in among us, in our congregations. It will get right in your

home. Be careful. Oh, be careful! You don't know what that will do to you. There are many people tonight who are struggling. I know some who are far away from God because they started going to the movies when they were little and started looking at things they shouldn't have seen. Somebody passed something to them and they saw it and it influenced them. I want to tell you, that spirit is a damaging, damnable thing. God help your soul to shun everything that looks like wrong which you may even see lying on the street. It is everywhere. I was appalled when I went to Russia and saw stands set up where they were openly selling pornography, with English words on it. There are wicked people in this world exploiting women and young children, and they will go to every length, every description of evil. Be careful that your mind doesn't get polluted with that. It will cause you trouble. May God help us to keep our eyes on the Lord; to not let our eyes be wandering, to not let our mind be wandering and allow an old lustful spirit to get hold of us. I can't overestimate the power of a lustful spirit. If you have things in your home; if you have something tucked away under the bed and you are hiding something, you are going to have trouble getting victory with God. You get rid of that thing. Get it out of your life, out of your house, wherever it's at.

The spirit of pride is out of line. When Paul was commending Timothy, he said, "There was something in your grandmother and there was something in your mother and it's in you also." Isn't that wonderful? But you know that the opposite can take place and very often does. "That was in your grandmother or your grandfather. That was in your dad or your mom and that's the reason it's in you."

I have such a burden on my heart that the Lord would help us to realize where a lot of our problems are coming from and to deal with those things. We can come to an altar and be delivered, and the Lord will do a work in our heart if we can identify a proud spirit. They are around; don't think they're not. They can get in preachers too. We have something to fight against. Our young people have something to fight against. If they don't see such things conquered in us, they are going to have a big struggle down the line. Proud spirits—we can feed that thing. If you feed it, you are going to have something on your hands; a huge monster that you are not going to know how to handle.

I want to tell you something that I believe

with all my heart. There are pipelines which feed spirits. There are things that feed spirits. What are we doing to nurture and feed a proud spirit, a lustful spirit, and an adulterous spirit? Didn't Jesus deal with this thing? He said, "If thy right eye offend thee, pluck it out, and if thy hand offend thee, cut it off." It wouldn't do me any good to pull out my knife and to cut my eyeball out and lay it out here on the table, if I had an old lustful and adulterous spirit. It wouldn't do me a bit of good. Nor would it do me any good to roll up my sleeve, get a saw, and just go to sawing on my hand and say, "Shame on that old thing; it got me into all this trouble." There is something that feeds a bad spirit, and it is your job and mine to cut the thing off. Wherever the food source is coming from, stop it. Cut it off.

There is a spiritual surgery that God can do to help you and me to cut off the avenues and the inlets that are letting those things come into our lives. The Lord wants us to help Him do this. If your hand is the means of communication, or the traveler or the vehicle, you stop that thing. Get yourself in control to the point that you don't go by those things, and you don't look at them, and you don't do those things anymore. You must stop the line to it. What happens when you cut off the food source to something? It dies.

Many times we wonder, "Oh Lord, why can't I get victory over this old thing? It just keeps bothering me and hounding me." It's because you are feeding it. You say, "You're wrong. I don't have one of those type of spirits." Well, maybe you have an envious spirit. Maybe you have a jealous spirit. Those things are spirits too. Don't think they're not; they will cause you trouble.

When I was a boy growing up, we had some neighbors who lived across the street from us. We bought an air conditioner for our house, and then they bought an air conditioner. Well, I'm not sure just who purchased a car first, but soon the other one bought a car; a little better one. Then one bought an air conditioner cover. It wasn't enough just to have an air conditioner; "Let's get a cover for it." This thing was going back and forth. We boys would look and say; "Look what they got. Look at that car." We would compare back and forth and wonder what would happen next. You see what happens when you let an old jealous spirit get in? Jealous spirits will work havoc.

You can look at a preacher and say, "Oh, I wish I could preach like him." You can get a

jealous spirit. May God help us. We can get jealous of one another and say, "Oh, if I just had it like them." I want to tell you, if you did, you probably couldn't stand it. You don't know all the things they have to bear. Jealousy is as cruel as the grave. You are going to have problems in your life if you feed an old jealous spirit. Listen, that thing will sap every bit of spiritual life out of you. We can't harbor those things in our lives and expect to have the blessings of the Lord flood our souls.

I would like to talk just a little bit about a stubborn spirit. There is an old stubborn spirit that comes around. If we feed that stubborn spirit and buck up against truth; if somebody tries to tell us something and we have resistance there, let me tell you, that old stubborn spirit will take his hold.

Have you ever read much about a badger? They are vicious creatures. I wouldn't want to get hold of one of them for anything. If you get an old badger down in a hole and stick your hand in to get him, and he latches on to you, my friend, you are in deep trouble. You may not get out of there alive. Those things will clamp onto your hand and wedge their feet against the sides of the wall. I was reading not long ago about badgers, and it said that unless there is another man who can help get you out, that thing will stay there until you die. It is dangerous. It is dangerous to be stubborn, too. When the Spirit of the Lord can't come into your life and mine and show us things, we've got problems. And those problems are breeding other problems. We must willingly fall down and lay everything we have at the feet of Jesus, and submit our ideas and our thinking and everything about us to Him.

The thing about this spirit world is that it wants to reproduce. It will reproduce in your children. It will reproduce in them an old stubborn spirit. They will walk out and slam the door during meeting. They want to let you know they walked out. They want to let you know that they don't want anything to do with what you're saying. With an old stubborn spirit; it's hard to get anything across.

I want to make heaven my home, and you do too. We can't do it by having an old stubborn spirit. We can't think we are going to make it and have victory with God and not get along with our brother, and not be willing to submit some of our ideas and some of our thinking. I'm not talking about compromise. I'm just talking about

ideas. We get to thinking those are doctrine. May the Lord help us.

I met up with a man in Russia who said, "I don't find that in the Bible." If we can't find it in the Bible, we better be very careful. Be willing to submit your ideas. A stubborn spirit won't go; it won't fly. It will never get off the ground. Your experience and mine will never work with an old stubborn spirit. Be willing to cut the pipeline off that's feeding it. Be willing to cut off its food source, and you will find yourself being able to submit to God and humble yourself.

A self-righteous spirit is a tough one to deal with. Jesus dealt with self-righteous people in His time, didn't He? He dealt with folks who thought they had it all. They were the very ones who killed Him. A self-righteous spirit has no place in the body of Christ. It is out of line; it is out of balance and it is causing you trouble. It is causing you to have a defeated life. That's because self-righteousness can cause us to think we are something. "I have the monopoly on this thing. I'm just a little bit more spiritual than you are. Don't touch me; I'm holier than thou." Self-righteous spirits will cause much trouble. Among ministers, it will work havoc. It is a terrible spirit to deal with. "They've been telling me this all these years, and well, I'm not going to change. I've thought this all along. I see it this way. I think I'm just a little bit better than you are." They won't tell you that, but in so many words that is what they are saying. Beware of self-righteousness. Cut the pipeline off that feeds it. Submit yourself to God. Be willing to give the thing up.

What do we read in I John? "Beloved, believe not every spirit, but try the spirits whether they are of God." A self-righteous spirit seeks to exalt itself. You will notice every time that it is just about a notch above everybody else. It has more light, more understanding, more wisdom, more of everything. The Lord can take a needle and let that out of the thing.

There are also several other spirits in the world. I Timothy 4:1, "Now the spirit speaketh expressly..." (That means very clearly, very distinctly), "that in the latter times some shall depart from the faith, giving heed to seducing spirits, and doctrines of devils." There are many spirits out there. There are seducing spirits; there are unclean spirits. I was reading in the book of Mark of how many different unclean spirits Jesus cast out of people. Let me tell you, there are still unclean spirits in the world;

seducing spirits. There are all manner of things.

If you have been around Missouri you have probably seen a billboard that advertises Coors, and has a nearly naked lady on it. One day I drove by and I saw that, and it was just like behind it, there was a devil with a spear. I saw something further than the lustful thing that was there on the billboard. It was the devil, and everyone falling into his clutches is going to be caught. He is saying to you, "Look at this, lust after it and I'll get a hold on you. I'll gig you with my fork. I'll get a spirit in you which you won't be able to handle."

How do spirits convey? Where are they? They are in people and they are also in the air. There are many things, many spirits, in the unseen world. God help us to stay clear, to keep our spirits in line.

Let me read in I Peter four. He says in the eighteenth verse, "And if the righteous scarcely be saved, where shall the ungodly and the sinner appear?" Did you ever think about who the ungodly are? I learned something while I was in Russia. The ungodly are those, they call it, who are loosed from God; people who once knew God, once were associated closely with God, but now are loose from God. "If the righteous scarcely be saved, where shall the ungodly and the sinner appear?" The ungodly can be those, I believe, who once had an experience with the Lord.

We have to be careful that we stay in tune with the Maker; that we can detect when something is out of line. A religious spirit can come in all kinds of clothing. The devil doesn't take preference who he works through either. He can work through any vehicle that gives him room.

A friend of mine, who worked with me, had been over in Vietnam. They were having trouble losing a soldier, on guard, every night. They thought that the guards were going to sleep, catching a little nap. Finally, the next fellow that was on guard duty looked out and saw an old pig rooting around in the dirt. He noticed there was something not quite right about it. As he watched the old thing rooting around, it got up closer and closer to him. Underneath that garb was the enemy. It wasn't a pig at all. A lot of things can deceive you and me if we are not careful. It may look ever so good. "Beloved, believe not every spirit, but try the spirits."

Religious spirits, dear ones, can work havoc among us. In the book of John, the eighth chapter, and the thirty-third verse, it says, "And they answered him, We be Abraham's seed, and were never in bondage to any man: how sayest thou, Ye shall be made free? Jesus answered them, Verily, verily, I say unto you, Whosoever committeth sin is the servant of sin. And the servant abideth not in the house for ever; but the Son abideth ever. If the Son therefore shall make you free, ye shall be free indeed." Now isn't that wonderful? Look here what He said to the righteous people, the professors of those times. "I know that you are Abraham's seed. I know that you are of that lineage. I know that you have this in you. But ye seek to kill me, because my word hath no place in you." These folks had a high profession. They were supposed to be religious leaders of the world in those times, and they were.

What does our profession mean? Think about it for a minute. Would you be willing to give up your profession if it was something that was contrary to the Word of God and it was wrong? This was what Jesus faced in His day. They were carrying on a name but had nothing inside. These are some of the things we are facing.

The Lord wants to help us to be true with ourselves. If we are out of line with the Spirit of God, the Lord wants to line us up. He wants to help keep us in line, and if we are willing, He will do just that.

Question and Answer by Ostis B. Wilson

This is article number fourteen in this ongoing series of articles of full salvation; justification and sanctification.

QUESTION: It is taught and believed that the two compartments or rooms, the holy place and the most holy place, are typical of two parts of our salvation. If that be the case, and the holy place would be typical of the first part of our salvation, or justification, and the holiest of all, or most holy place, would be typical of the second part of our salvation, or sanctification, and if one still possessed the depraved nature in his justified state, would that mean there was corruption in the holy place? If not, why not, since the justified person was in that place and still had his depraved or corrupt nature?

ANSWER: This is a valid question and I shall endeavor to give it a valid answer to the best of my ability and understanding.

The thought (that the two compartments in the tabernacle are typical of two parts of our salvation, or two degrees of grace,) has already been dealt with in a previous article in this series. The first compartment is typical of the first experience of divine grace, which in the Scriptures is called justification, conversion, the new birth and regeneration. That is what we are dealing with now, and all the conditions for it; repentance, confession and restitution. This all has reference to the way we have been living and the things we have actually done. (The sins we have committed.) It does not deal with the inward condition of inherent depravity with which we were born. Therefore, that depravity of nature is not dealt with in this experience.

However, as we have seen, a person is made a partaker of the Christ-life in this experience, and that life is holy. He is saved from all sin and receives deliverance from the power of sinful habits, thus enabling him to live a life free from sin. When we lay the pattern down on his experience and understand that that holy place covers his actual life, and not his inward, there is not corruption there. That life must be kept free from sin with no corruption in it for one to retain his justified relationship with God and be free from condemnation. If corruption and sin get into that life, it cancels his relationship with God and puts him clear outside the tabernacle.

Perhaps right in this area is one of the most common stumbling blocks to understanding the two parts of man's salvation. Some do not discern the difference between a holy life and holiness, or purity of heart. But it is clearly taught in the Holy Scriptures. In II Cor. 7:1, "holy life" refers to the manner of life; "perfect holiness" to the state or condition of the heart. The term, perfecting holiness, is a superlative describing an advanced degree of holiness. We all were born with a depravity of nature, for which we are not accountable, and therefore we could not repent of. When we came to be saved, (justified) we came repenting and seeking forgiveness for the sins we had committed, and for which condemnation was bearing heavy on our conscience. We wanted liberation from that condemnation and wanted peace with God. But this depravity of nature we could not repent of because we did not commit it. We were conscious of it's existence only through teaching. This deprayed nature is a very deceptive thing. It is only in our efforts to maintain a holy life according to New Testament standards that we become conscious of a power deep within us rising up and asserting itself, and contesting our efforts to live a holy life and maintain victory in our experience. Unless a person has been well instructed in this truth, when this begins to happen in his life he may be thrown into confusion and wonderment, and will become victim of accusation and be found returning to the altar time after time seeking the cause of this conflict. But he needs to understand that it is "the foe in the temple not subject to God." (the carnal nature) and begin to seek God to purge his heart from that native depravity by the blood of Jesus, and to fill him with a perfect love of God.

This is that most holy place, or that second compartment of the tabernacle which we enter and abide therein after we have "presented our bodies a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." We have consecrated and dedicated our lives to Him without any reservation for ourselves, on the golden altar before the second vail, and He fills us with His Holy Spirit and admits us into that most holy place to abide in His presence continually. There the purging process starts which purges us from the imperfections which God sees in us, but we had not yet seen. In this advanced state of grace we do not only do good things, but we are good from the heart out. We do not only commit holy acts but we are holy from the heart out.

I was thinking recently of how God gave His Son as a sacrifice for our sins, of His humiliations, insults, shames and reproaches, and His unspeakable sufferings and agonies at Calvary, until He actually felt forsaken even of His father. My thought was this. God did not permit all this because He did not love His Son, but because He did love us and realized it would take such a sacrifice as that to break our hard hearts and bring us to repentance. Then I thought just this afternoon of some of the injustices, reproaches and persecutions that I have seen some of God's holy and innocent saints suffer. Why did He allow it to happen? It was not because He did not love the one who was suffering, but He did love his adversary, and saw that for him to see the clear image of Christ being manifest in the suffering child of God was the only way He could reach him. This is a right God reserves to Himself, in dealing with us when He admits us into that sacred sanctified relationship with Him. But, alas, some are not able to sing the song, "In the heated furnace, Father, let me stay; Precious gold refining, purge the dross away: Till thy glorious image is reflected there; "Till the costly jewels of thy grace I wear." So they mar in the making and have to come out being less than what God by His grace is able to make them. The good news I bring to all of you today is that you do not have to settle that way. God has already generated sufficient grace to enable every one of us to come to the fulness of the measure of the fulness of Christ in every area and phase of our lives, if we will only consecrate and dedicate our lives to Him to that depth.

URGENT PRAYER REQUEST

Just before going to press with this issue, the following letter was received from Bro. Josiah Pah of Monrovia, Liberia.

November 13—Dear Bro. Wayne and saints: I am writing to you all this day from my place of refuge. My family and I, including some of the saints, have been displaced for four (4) weeks now.

War has again started in this country, and the fighting is very tough as compared to the first war. Several thousands are dying day and night from the fighting.

The city of Monrovia is completely out of food and drinking water. Rice, our staple food, is now costing \$500 per bag. We are completely out of food here. Hunger is defeating us.

My older son, Josiah K. Pah, Jr. is dead due to the lack of food and strong hunger.

Bro. Wayne, we are at present stopping at an old hospital building, and at the same time, sleeping on the bare floor. Our international telephones and telexes are all down, and so I can't call you. Our condition is very sorrowful here.

My wife, Joetta, (Bro. Josiah's young daughter) and other saints are ill here. We will not return to our homes for a month. All foreign missionaries are out of Monrovia....
