A Tailored Call

Christ called His disciples one by one. Each received a personal call which was tailored to that particular person's needs. So He calls each of us today on an individual, personal basis, as it were, adapting Himself to our need. St. John spoke of this manner of Christ's calling in the first chapter of St. John.

John the Baptist was preaching by the Jordan River when some Pharisees inquired about John's credentials. John knew he had all the credentials he needed to be qualified to preach, yet he also knew people are curious about others and he needed to pacify them. He told the Pharisees that he was not Elias, nor the prophet, nor the Messiah. John took the attitude of complete humility and plainly said he was not the one for which they were looking. In fact, he said that Christ was probably standing among them and they didn't even know Him nor had they recognized Him.

Often when the Scriptures refer to "seeing," it does not necessarily mean "seeing with the natural eye," but also seeing beyond the natural to the spiritual; dual vision. In the 34th verse, John the Baptist said, "I saw, and bare record that this is the Son of God." He saw the "Spirit of God descending," as God told him what to look for, and he saw, or knew spiritually, that Christ was the Son of God because of what he saw visually.

Because John saw with a dual vision, it cost him something. Two of his disciples, one being Andrew, followed Christ from that time. I envision John the Baptist yearning to follow Christ himself. He knew he had to complete his primary mission of getting people to repent and be baptized so they could also have the dual vision and be ready to follow Christ.

Later John and his disciples saw Christ walking. Have you ever beheld someone's mannerism of walking that struck you as being humble and holy? I think that John recognized this quality in Christ by His walk. John's manner of speech was one of awe and reverence when he said: "Behold the Lamb of God!"

After these incidents, Christ began calling people to Him. Simon's calling by Christ was quite special, for he received the surname of Peter which meant stone. To me a stone or rock represents steadfastness; which we notice repeatedly about Simon Peter at different times, particularly when he said, "To whom would we go, you have the words of eternal life." And his steadfastness was demonstrated with holy boldness after the day of Pentecost when he preached to the people who had witnessed Christ's crucifixion.

Only two other apostles will be mentioned. Philip, who resided in Bethsaida, as did Peter and Andrew, and may have known them, received a personal call from Christ to follow Him. After spending a short time with Christ, maybe a day or two, he was eager to evangelize by inviting Nathanael to come see the Christ he had found. Now Nathanael probably had certain qualities which Philip realized would undoubtedly cause him to listen to Christ. Because Philip and Nathanael were such good friends, Nathanael dared to ask, "Has any good thing ever come out of Nazareth?" Philip, in essence, told him to be his own judge on the matter, once he heard Christ.

The next incident has always intrigued me, for we find Nathanael only coming toward Christ when Christ greets him by stating, "Behold an Israelite in whom is no guile!" Nathanael wonders how Christ knows this about him and Christ replies, "I saw thee under the fig tree before Philip called thee." Then Nathanael replied with deep heartfelt response: "Rabbi, thou art the Son of God; thou art the King of Israel." Although Christ was not attired as a king, yet Nathanael saw with a dual vision the role which Christ would fulfill. Then Christ stated: "Believest thou? ye shall see heaven open, and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of Man."

We do not have any sure record of Nathanael seeing those angels ascending and descending upon Christ. We know angels ministered to Christ in the garden prior to His crucifixion. When Christ ascended to the Father, the crowd on the hill watching the ascension numbered over 500, and there's a sure possibility that Nathanael was in that crowd.

To each of these men, Christ's call was definite and fit the needs of each individual. So it is with us today. Christ's calling to us fulfills our needs and "fits" us to follow Him. For us to be totally satisfied, let our answer to Him be an unqualified, "Yes!"

Vitamins By Connie Sorrell

"What you eat is what you are." Have you ever heard this saying before? In other words, chemicals existing in the eaten food bond with the chemicals in the body to continue that person's life. We live in such a fast-paced society that most of our meals are sandwiched between duties and obligations. Therefore, if we aren't careful, we can be tempted to pop anything in our mouth just so we don't feel hungry for a while. Before we eat a bite of food, we need to consider: "Is this healthy?" Nourishing food is vital for the body just as spiritual meditation is essential for the soul. What are the spiritual vitamins and minerals we need for a holy life?

Every person must have minerals in their diet. When a person begins to feel tired and rundown, he or she may be anemic and need more iron. Iron is needed to build red blood cells which circulate throughout the entire body, giving it life. Spiritually speaking, when a person becomes tired and rundown with sin, he or she needs to drink from the Rock of salvation. which is Christ Jesus. (I Cor. 10:4.) His cleansing blood will wash away sin and give new life to the soul. Every Christian must have Christ in the heart in order to live for Him and have strength to do what is right. Jesus will put faith and courage in the heart which will circulate through the soul and fight against the attacks of the devil.

As a newborn baby must have milk first, so it is the sincere milk of the Word which will strengthen the growth of a newborn Christian. (I Pet. 2:2.) Natural milk has calcium which builds strong bones. Steady BIBLE reading will give a Christian the skeletal structure needed to stand upon the Rock. Study the scriptures. Memorize them. Remember Jesus used the Word of God to resist the devil when He was tempted to change a stone into bread. It is important to build on the Word of God.

However, no one can exist as a mere skeleton, but there must be flesh upon the bones. When Jesus died and then arose unto heaven, He sent the Holy Spirit to talk to mankind. (John 14:26.) The Holy Spirit always agrees with the Word of God and gives meaning to the passages which otherwise may not be understandable. The indwelling Holy Spirit will also apply the scriptures to the personal needs of each individual. A Christian with the Holy Spirit, dining daily on Heavenly Manna will eat the good of the land. He will enjoy the good fruits of love, peace, joy, contentment, and all other sweet blessings.

Then we also know that too much food with a lot of sugar content tends to weaken parts of the body and spoil the taste buds for healthier food. Besides other things, sugar attacks the tooth enamel and can bring about cavities and decay. That's why wise parents tell their children, "You can only have one piece of candy," or "No dessert until you finish the good food on your plate." God is also a wise parent. He knows that His children must have strong meat to survive spiritually. He does not want them to be unskillful in the Word, but "by reason of use have their senses exercised to discern both good and evil." (Heb. 5:12-14.) Troubles and trials are sent as strong meat to mature Christians. When in trouble, we pray more, read more of God's Word, and depend more on Him because we need His help. This is how we grow fatter in faith and learn when the Lord whispers or the devil tempts.

When Jesus was talking to His disciples before He was to leave them, He ate with them. He gave them of the cup and unleavened bread and tried to explain to them that He would die for their sins and the sins of the world. He knew they would be offended at Him (Mark 14:27) so He fed them the Truth and Reason before His crucifixion. At one time, Jesus told them: "Except a corn of wheat fall into the ground and die, it abideth alone: but if it die, it bringeth forth much fruit." He was speaking in part about His crucifixion and also in part about the "death of self" they would have to die. This was "strong meat" that belonged only to those of full age in the Lord.

We read how the disciples struggled emotionally and spiritually during and briefly after the crucifixion. They had been with Him when He changed water into wine, ate with repentant publicans, and fed the hungry five thousand with five barley loaves and two small fish. They had feasted too many times with the Lord to turn away from His teachings, yet they could not understand the death of the corn of wheat. Their "self-nature" hindered them from absorbing the full blessing of the crucifixion. Some of them were so discouraged, they returned to their fishing.

Their faith was renewed again when Jesus, after His resurrection, called them to come and dine on the seashore where He had fish laid upon hot coals. (John 21:9.) As Jesus fed them, He questioned their love. He told them: "Feed my sheep." They had feasted with Him and now He wanted the disciples to feed others. They were spiritually healthy and had the power to do so.

What are the spiritual vitamins and minerals we need to live a holy life? We need Jesus, His blood, and His Word. We need the Holy Spirit; the correcting and guiding power. Then we must die to self so we can absorb all the blessings in every situation. After we are fat and flourishing, we need to feed others.

Directions for Singing

(Taken from John Wesley's preface to Sacred Melody, 1761)

Learn these tunes before you learn any others; afterwards learn as many as you please.

Sing them exactly as they are printed here, without altering or mending them at all; and if you have learned to sing them otherwise, unlearn it as soon as you can.

Sing lustily and with a good courage. Beware of singing as if you were half-dead, or halfasleep, but lift up your voice with strength. Be no more afraid of your voice now, nor more ashamed of its being heard, than when you sung the songs of Satan.

Sing modestly. Do not bawl, so as to be heard above or distinct from the rest of the congregation, that you may not destroy the harmony, but strive to unite your voices together, so as to make one clear sound.

Sing in time. Whatever time is sung, be sure to keep with it. Do not run before nor stay behind it, but attend closely to the leading voices, and move therewith as exactly as you can, and take care not to sing too slow. This drawling way naturally steals on all who are lazy, and it is high time to drive it out from us, and sing all our tunes just as quick as we did at first.

Above all, sing spiritually. Have an eye to God in every word you sing. Aim at pleasing Him more than yourself, or any other creature. In order to do this, attend strictly to the sense of what you sing, and see that your heart is not carried away with the sound, but offered to God continually; so shall your singing be such as the Lord will approve here, and reward you when He cometh in the clouds of heaven.

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Editorials

"This is a true saying, If a man desire the office of a bishop, he desireth a good work. A bishop then must be blameless, the husband of one wife, vigilant, sober, of good behaviour, given to hospitality, apt to teach; Not given to wine, no striker, not greedy of filthy lucre; but patient, not a brawler, not covetous; One that ruleth well his own house, having his children in subjection with all gravity; (For if a man know not how to rule his own house, how shall he take care of the church of God?) Not a novice, lest being lifted up with pride he fall into the condemnation of the devil. Moreover he must have a good report of them which are without; lest he fall into reproach and the snare of the devil. Likewise must the deacons be grave, not doubletongued, not given to much wine, not greedy of filthy lucre." I Tim. 3:1-8.

The apostle Paul spells out in crystal-clear language, the qualifications for church leaders. Certainly it is a list that we should take seriously. As we look at the list, we need to remember that every Christian is a leader in his own area of activity, however small it may be, so the admonition here should be of interest to everyone.

Before we can be used of God we must have the supreme desire to do so. "If a man desire the office of a bishop,..." It must be a deeper desire than the one to get a new dress or different tires for the car. To be used of God should rank right up there with being ready to meet Him. The apostle Paul said, "...woe is unto me, if I preach not the gospel!" I Cor. 9:16.

Have you ever noticed that others are able to, and many times will, evaluate your effectiveness and spirit with uncanny accuracy? Of course there will be times when anyone can be misunderstood and motives misinterpreted, but generally a person, by the life he lives, gives an indication to others of his calling. It is as one person said of another in the gospel work, "They are not sent. They just went." If you are fair and compassionate, that shows up. Likewise, if you are quick-tempered and mean-spirited, that is noticed. If you are careless or immoral, the consequences of those traits will follow you.

The qualifications the apostle Paul listed are down-to-earth, right living. They aren't complicated or hard to attain. It is possible to miss the mark in our emphasis of the Gospel. A recent clear-cut example is the tragedy created in Waco, TX by David Koresh. His behavior may seem remote to us, yet there is something in it to be learned. It is like the mother of little Johnny who was talking with his school teacher. She told the teacher, "If Johnny misbehaves, just hit the pupil next to him and Johnny will straighten up." Although we don't wish God's judgment or sad consequences on anyone, we would do well to take heed when we see it happen. If the reports are true, David Koresh clearly stepped out of the bounds of Bible morality and the qualifications that are listed, yet he had a strong drawing power because of his interpretations of Revelation. There is a blessing pronounced upon those who read and apply themselves to this often abused writing, (Rev. 1:3) but there is also a curse pronounced upon those who mishandle its prophecies. (Rev. 22:18.) Unless we first stress the truths of the four Gospels, we are not qualified to try interpreting Revelation. We will be deceived and mislead if we do so, for it takes the spirit of God dwelling in a pure heart to gain proper insight into its complex meanings.

The apostle Paul was wise in the qualifications he wrote. If we will measure to them, our testimony will not be muted. and our understanding will be sharpened.

The last week of May is an eventful time for the staff of the Print Shop. We have the *Faith and Victory* to put together and print, which is being done just prior to the Oklahoma State Campmeeting here in Guthrie. We also have begun work on the 3rd quarter "Beautiful Way" and "Bible Lessons," which are due to be in the mail by June 15. Also, the last day of May is the end of our fiscal year, so we must take inventory and prepare our financial books for year-end posting. Each of these activities, by God's help, will be diligently accomplished, and we will trust God that all the effort will not be in vain.

It was a pleasure to have Sis. Margaret Dunn and her daughter, Sis. Elaine, from North Carolina, pay us a week-long visit the last of April and first of May. As many of our readers may remember, Sis. Dunn recently lost her husband after a lengthy illness. God has graciously upheld her and Sis. Elaine in this loss. Sis. Elaine took an active part in caring for her father, which has been a drain on her health. I know they both would appreciate you remembering them in prayer. In last month's editorials, we brought to our reader's attention the need we had for archiving computer data. We felt blessed to be able to obtain what is called a "floptical drive" which will meet our needs. We thank everyone who helped us in this need with your prayers and offerings.

On May 10, Michael Smith, the son of my sister, Patsy Smith, became a part of the Print Shop family. Plans are for him to learn to operate the press which is used to print books. His burden to work for the Lord has certainly made a place for him here, and we heartily welcome his positive zeal to this Gospel endeavor.

In the early morning hours of May 9, the water of the Cottonwood Creek which runs through Guthrie, came out of its banks due to heavy rains experienced on May 8. At 7:40 on that Sunday morning, the waters crested at 29.60 feet, making it officially the worst flood that Guthrie has experienced. Much damage was done to buildings in the path of the fastmoving currents. One person's house was completely swept away, leaving a clean foundation. Several businesses on Noble Street have yet to recover enough to be operational. Of course the saint's chapel and dining hall are close to the river and in the worst part of the flooding. The dining hall had 57 1/2 inches of water in it, while the water in the chapel reached a depth of 44 1/2 inches. The heavy pews floated around in the chapel, causing damage which has taken a lot of work to repair. Although the songbooks were put in a place where they were thought to be safe, the water moved things around so that



approximately 50 of them received damage. The silt, smell and dampness that are left behind after a flood, even though things are immediately cleaned, damage a building and its contents and have long-lasting effects.

In the rain and rising water, about 1:30 Sunday morning, several of the Print Shop workers helped in sandbagging the Print Shop doors and the doors of Sis. Janie Woodruff's residence. When the water finally crested, it was 9 1/2 inches above the inside floor level on the front door. We felt it was a definite act of God that only spots of the floor were covered with water. If the water had risen to 9 1/2 inches on the inside of the building, immeasurable damage to machinery and materials would have occurred, rendering us inoperable for a lengthy amount of time. There were two houses and two garages which required extensive cleaning after the water receded.

We want to give special thanks to those who were aware of our peril and prayed for us during the hours of that night. The petitions were not in vain. —Wayne Murphey


YET ANOTHER NOTICE

The Family—A School of Religion

Taken from, *Our Children*, By Atticus Hayood.

Transmission from parent to child is God's first and chosen plan for the perpetuation and extension of religion in the earth. We do not, in saying this, forget the institution of a public, Christian ministry, nor do we in any wise undervalue the office of a true preacher of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. The Christian ministry is also a Divine institution—the true preacher is one "called of God." To those who hear he also is "one sent from God."

Let us reverence this holy office as it becomes us to do; and let preachers so walk as to deserve reverence. But the father was a priest before there was a priestly order, as he was a king before there was a nation. Richard Watson's observations on this subject are judicious: "In ancient times the heads of families were their priests; of Abraham the Almighty said, 'I know him, that he will command his children and his household after him, and they shall keep the way of the Lord, to do justice and judgment; that the Lord may bring upon Abraham that which he hath spoken of him.' Nor did parents cease, in a very important sense, to be the priests in their families, after the establishment of the Levitical priesthood. 'David returned' religiously 'to bless his household.' In this respect, no change has taken place under the Christian dispensation. In the Christian Church there is the public ministry; but the head of every family is still its prophet and its priest, daily to offer spiritual sacrifices. And from this we come to a conclusion, which every wise and pious person will carefully remember, that, if he is at the head of a family, he is, in fact, a sacred person, and has a sacred office.

Yes, that is it; the parent is "a sacred person, and has a sacred office." The father is generally named first as the responsible head of the family, but the obligations of parenthood rest equally upon the mother. When God delivers a solemn charge to a father to bring up his children "in the nurture and admonition of the Lord," it is to the mother also and equally. As it seems to us, it is indispensable to recognize and accept as unalterable two things: 1. The father is the representative and responsible head of the house. 2. The mother is equally responsible for the duties of her place. Astronomers tell us of certain double stars that revolve about a common center, and in some way are necessary to each other. So, in the family life, there is a common center of interest and responsibility, affection and duty; they are two, yet one, and each is necessary to the other.

The inspired record says; "So God created man in his own image." This is the first statement, showing that the first man is the essential unit and representative of the race. But the historian of creation does not complete his sentence without adding this other word: "male and female created he them." In a sense the woman was created in the man, but the man himself was not perfect until woman-the wifeman, his complement-was formed. Perfection of humanity is found in the union of the two; the harmony of the family in the adjustment of their resemblances and their differences. And surely, if we are to study and understand aright the fatherhood of God, we must understand the true meaning of human parenthood-not mere fatherhood, or mere motherhood, but perfect and entire parenthood, for both motherhood and fatherhood are necessary to complete the image of the Divine fatherhood. Whatever is good and precious in our earthly parents-in our mothers as well as in our fathers—is but a reflection of the perfections of Him of whom it is said in one place, "As a father pitieth his children, so the Lord pitieth them that fear him;" and in another, "As one whom his mother comforteth, so will I comfort you; and ye shall be comforted in Jerusalem."

Let it be insisted on with all possible emphasis that parenthood is fatherhood and motherhood. In this complicated, yet simple relation, the Bible and nature alike make the father the responsible head, and yet, in no sense, is he more essential to the perfection of the family life than the mother. Whatever duties, therefore, we shall find enjoined in the word of God upon the father in the instruction and discipline of his children, these are the mother's duties also.

When Moses, the man of God, gave the second statement of the law as it is recorded in the book of Deuteronomy, he laid down very completely and unmistakably the duty of parents as to the religious instruction of their children. After stating the obligation to love the one God supremely, Moses, speaking under divine direction, says: "And these words, which I command thee this day, shall be in thine heart: and thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up."

After further warnings and exhortations this additional injunction is recorded: "And when thy son asketh thee in time to come, saying,

What mean the testimonies, and the statutes, and the judgments, which the Lord our God hath commanded vou? Then thou shalt say unto thy son, We were Pharaoh's bondmen in Egypt; and the Lord brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand: and the Lord showed signs and wonders, great and sore, upon Egypt, upon Pha-

raoh, and upon all his household, before our eyes: and he brought us out from thence, that he might bring us in, to give us the land which he sware unto our fathers. And the Lord commanded us to do all these statutes, to fear the Lord our God, for our good always, that he might preserve us alive, as it is at this day. And it shall be our righteousness, if we observe to do all these commandments before the Lord our God, as he hath commanded us."

"The priest's lips should keep knowledge," and the people should "seek the law at his mouth," and yet it pleased God to lay upon parents the chief duty, and, at once, the most important and difficult work, in preserving a saving knowledge of divine Providence and statutes in the world. They were to "teach diligently" his commandments and ordinances; they were to recite in the hearing of their children the marvelous providential history of Israel, and to impress upon their young hearts a solemn sense of their relation to God and of their obligations to love and to obey him.

The Seventy-eighth Psalm is a deeply interesting poetic description of the leading events in Jewish history. Its date and author are not definitely known, but the preface contains a very striking recognition and statement of the divine purpose in laying upon parents the responsibility of the religious education of their children. It sets forth also, in stirring language, the admirable wisdom of the divine method. The Psalmist thus introduces his recital of the history of his people:—

"Give ear, O my people, to my law: incline your ears to the words of my mouth....I will open my mouth in a parable: I will utter dark sayings of old: which we have heard and known, and our fathers have told us. We will not hide them from

their children, showing to the generation to come the praises of the Lord, and his strength, and his wonderful works that he hath done. For he established a testimony in Jacob, and appointed a law in Israel, which he commanded our fathers, that they should make them known to their children: that the gen-

eration to come might know them, even the children which should be born; who should arise and declare them to their children: that they might set their hope in God, and not forget the works of God, but keep his commandments: and might not be as their fathers, a stubborn and rebellious generation; a generation that set not their heart aright, and whose spirit was not steadfast with God."

Words cannot be plainer. God's dealings with his people were to be known by all the generations of Israel. To secure this great result, God lays upon parents the duty of telling these things to their children, that they might tell it to their children, and so on and on to the last, that all "the generations to come might know them." The grand purpose of these parental instructions is that "the children which shall be born" who, in turn, were to "arise and declare them to their children"—"may set their hope in God, and not forget the works of God." It was not only designed to teach them God's ways, but, in teaching them the statutes and providences of God, to save them from the blunders and crimes of their fathers, and thus secure that noblest hope of our race—a course of improvement and development from age to age!


The father, the mother, the parent, is a "sacred person." By no possibility can any other do the work of the parent. The duty inheres in the relation. The responsibility cannot be abridged, or laid down, or avoided. The work of the parent, in the religious education of his children, cannot be done by proxy. Even if another could do it better, it would not relieve the parent of his peculiar obligation. The voice that calls to this duty is imperative-it must be obeyed. But no other can do the parent's work as well as the parent himself. He has the true vantage ground; no other created being can get as close to the child's heart as he ought to be able to do. The parent holds a mystic key that no other hand can fit to the wards of its locks. If the parent does not do his work it is forever undone. So left undone, the parent is guilty and the child wronged. The child, in spite of parental delinquency, may, in the great mercy of God, be saved at last; but, if he has failed to receive proper parental instruction in the things of God, and to come under salutary parental influences during the formative period of his life, he has suffered a real loss that no blessings, advantages, culture, successes in other departments and through other instrumentalities can ever fully regain.

Truly and eloquently does Harris in his "Patriarchy" say: "Well might the mind be haunted age after age with a social ideal never yet realized! Life, a sacred thing. Every child a divine promise. Every family beginning the race anew from a higher point. Brothers and sisters ministering angels to each other's purity and benefice. Every addition a new element of happiness. Education the rearing of a living temple. The father the representative of God; feeding them, as a prophet, with more than angel's food; as a priest, standing at the portico of the temple to guard it from pollution, or ministering at its holy altar, and finding his spirit purified and refreshed by the service; swaving like a king, a divine scepter, and tasting the Godlike blessedness of seeing his subjects find happiness and freedom in obedience. The mother, the earliest to enter the infant heart, and to take possession in the name of God; radiating on her children the light and life of her own intense affection, and invested in addition with the delegated and solemn reverence of paternal authority. Home, the home of the affections; where law is superseded by love; where the lowliest act is consecrated and ennobled by the highest motive; and where separate individual interests are forgotten in the aim of each for the good of all. The family, sending forth its youthful members-each with a heritage of happy recollections and holy habits, impressed with the sanctity and high responsibilities of the domestic constitution, studiously trained and qualified to enter on them, and determined to raise still higher, if possible, in his own circle, the standard of his early home. The aged patriarch, happy in the consciousness of having linked his mind for good with all his own immediate offspring, and cheered by the prospect of transmitting, through them, the happiest influence to others through an ever-enlarging circle.

The generation, conscious of rising, and aspiring to rise still higher; recognizing in its present blessedness the proof that God is its *paterfamilias*; and valuing the future chiefly as the means of perpetual approximation to the only perfect home in the bosom of God. Such are the capabilities of the family, and the sunny visions at which it hints."

Surely since the wreck of Eden there has appeared among the children of men no picture so fair, so noble, so inspiring and so full of hope for both worlds, as a well-ordered and truly Christian family. Here indeed are repeated, from day to day, the miracles of Providence and the wonders of grace. Here, in a most precious and peculiar sense, the Lord is "Emmanuel," "Which being interpreted is, God with us." Here is seen the pillar of cloud by day and of fire by night. Around this habitation manna descends, "every morning new." Guthrie Campground Relocation Progress Report

It has been requested by some that a progress report be given to the saints concerning the new chapel and dining hall currently under construction. Due to the recent record flooding of our old facility, many are anxious to see the new facility completed and ready to occupy. Not the least of these is the building committee which meets monthly to chart the course for completion of this project.

How fast we progress is primarily determined by finances made available by free-will offerings. The trustees do not feel it would be wise to indebt the saints with a loan large enough to complete a project of this magnitude. To date everything has been done on a cash basis and we believe the Lord would have us to continue operating this way until the project is finished.

We estimate that the building is about seventy percent completed. At present all the ceiling grid in the building has been installed. Fluorescent lights have been purchased and set in place where required. Electricians are currently running overhead wiring to them.

A partial list of the jobs yet to be completed include the following: building the rostrum and


stairs to the baptistry, cabinet work for the kitchen, bathroom and nursery, installation of plumbing fixtures, passage doors and jambs, curtain wall and accordion door room dividers, ceiling tile and attic insulation, bathroom privacy partitions, floor covering, P.A. system and a number of other partially completed jobs.

Once the structure is finished there will be dining hall furniture and appliances to purchase as well as pews for the sanctuary. Work outside the building will include pouring sidewalks, building two retaining walls and a parking lot. Completing the building is our primary objective right now.

While it may appear that there is much left to do, we are so thankful to be as far along as we are. Our thanks go out to all those that have shared an interest in seeing this project through.

We urge all those who are able to attend the Guthrie Camp meeting to make a special effort to tour the new building while you are there.
