

"In Every Thing Give Thanks" By Bro. Arlynn Sorrell

I Thessalonians 5:18 says, "In every thing give thanks: for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you." I am sure all of us consider ourselves to be reasonable people, and we consider that if someone shows us kindness, that we would respond in a manner that is appropriate and that shows gratitude for that kindness. It is normal for us to think that way about ourselves. In fact, just about everyone in the world thinks of himself that way. Paul is not accusing the Thessalonians of being unthankful, unreasonable people, but rather, he is exhorting them to a higher plane of living than perhaps they have yet reached. The fact is that while we are reasonable people, we are also human, and we have a human tendency to take things for granted that we should not. Yes, we're thankful and we show gratitude when things are done for us, and when things are going our way, but Paul is here giving a secret for successful living which is, "In every thing give thanks."

I read a plaque one time that said, "If you lost everything you had right now, and then got it all back, just think how happy you would be!" This helped to illustrate to me that the amount of victory and happiness we experience in life depends to a large degree on our perspective and our attitude. A person may desire a promotion on his job, and because it does not come, he feels discouraged and depressed; doesn't see how he can put up with his present job any longer. Then, the person loses his job and now he feels that if only he could get the job back, he wouldn't care about the promotion. Next, the person loses his health, and then he feels that if only he had his health back, he would be ever so happy. He could always find another job.

I was once on a job that I enjoyed until I saw an opening in another department that would have been a promotion from the position I was in. There was quite a delay before the position was filled and it was not at all certain that I would get it, but I distinctly remember the change in my attitude toward my old job as I began to imagine myself in the new position. Routine assignments that I had not minded before became drudgery. Finally, I was granted the promotion, and I began to carry out my new duties with alacrity. About 6 weeks later. I was informed that the company was having a layoff, and that my position had been done away with. All of a sudden, the new job lost all of its appeal and I wished I had stayed in my old job where I had more seniority, rather than taking the new one where I was exposed as the junior member. As it happened, the company offered to return me to my old position, which I gladly accepted. I took up my old duties with new appreciation.

Another story helps to illustrate my point. I read about a man who flew as a member of a B-17 bomber crew during World War II. He was based in England and had to fly missions over Germany and occupied Europe. Each crew had to complete 25 combat missions, and then could be reassigned to less hazardous duty, such as training new pilots back in the States. This man began active combat duty during 1943, at a time when the Air Force was losing 3 out of 4 airmen in combat. On every mission, he saw planes shot down and men lost. Sometimes men on his own plane were hit by shrapnel or machine gun fire. This man made some observations about life during this time. He said, "When the continuity of life is threatened, there are many things which seemed important before, that no longer seem so, and things once overlooked take on new meaning and importance." He had been a salesman before the war. but now he said he couldn't imagine how he could ever have been concerned with such trivial things as meeting a sales quota or paying his bills. On the other hand, he now began to notice small, everyday things, such as trees and

grass and, especially, children playing near the air field.

Abraham Lincoln said, "I have decided that people are about as happy as they choose to be." Only Christians can know true happiness, but the point is that we have a role to

play. Much depends on how we view our circumstances; our perspective. The scripture I read in I Thess 5:18 teaches us that if we have a proper view of our present circumstances, and if we see them in proper perspective, there will be an outpouring of thankfulness from our hearts to the Lord, whatever the condition we are in at the time. The scripture gives us the grounds for such an outlook. It says, "In every thing give thanks: for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you." When we put our lives into the Lord's hands, He takes responsibility for our welfare. There is nothing that can touch our lives, but that He has allowed it. When we are fully consecrated to the Lord, we can be confident that the things that touch our lives are the will of God concerning us.

Romans 8:28 says, "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose." What is God's purpose for us? The next verse, verse 29, tells us that it is "...to be conformed to the image of his Son,..." That should also be our purpose in life, our highest aim. If our greatest desire in life is to be conformed to the image of His Son, and the Scripture tells us that everything that the Lord allows to touch our lives is designed to do just that, then we can give thanks in everything.

Corrie Ten Boom tells of an incident that occurred while she and her sister were in a German concentration camp during World War II. They were placed in a cell block which was infested with fleas. They resolved to give thanks in this situation, and soon discovered why the Lord had allowed them to be put there. It happened that the guards would not come near the area because of the fleas, so Corrie and her sister were free to work with the other prisoners to teach them about the Lord.

Paul says in Phil 4:11, "...I have learned, in whatsoever state I am, therewith to be content." C.W. Naylor, in his book, "The Secret of the Singing Heart," tells how he learned to give thanks in everything. The Lord is endeavoring to teach each of us the same secret, through the

things that He allows to touch our lives.

In I Peter 1:6, we read, "Wherein ye greatly rejoice, though now for a season, if need be, ye are in heaviness through manifold temptations." It says, "if need be,"

and who determines what we need in terms of trials? If we chose our own trials, we wouldn't have any. But the Lord chooses. He knows what we need to help us conform to His image. When we face a trial, we can be thankful that the Lord didn't allow something worse to come our way. We can be thankful because we have hope that things will get better. And we can be thankful because we know that this will work together with other things to help us to conform to His image. The scripture doesn't say, "for every thing," but, "in everything." Sometimes we may suffer because of someone's wrongdoing, and we are not thankful that they did wrong, but we are thankful that the God we serve is able to turn that which seems to harm us into everlasting joy.

A thankful heart is a strong defense against discouragement. Nehemiah 8:10 says "...the joy of the Lord is your strength." As long as people are happy in the Lord, and keep an attitude of thankfulness in everything, the enemy cannot discourage them. A person who gets discour-

"A thankful heart is a strong defense against discouragement." aged always has something that he is not thankful for; someone mistreated him, or perhaps things haven't worked out the way he thought they should have. Revelation 12:11 reads, "And they overcame him by the blood of the Lamb, and by the word of their testimony;..." When people stand up and testify in prayermeeting, the first thing they usually say is, "I'm thankful," or, "I thank the Lord." If we keep a strong testimony of thankfulness in every situation of our lives the enemy will be unable to discourage us or to get us to complain.

I heard a story told that goes like this. A saint was going through a trial and the devil told one of his imps to discourage the saint. So the imp jumped on the saint's shoulder and said, "You're discouraged." The saint replied, "I'm not discouraged." The imp replied, "Oh yes you are. You're discouraged." Again the saint replied, "I'm not discouraged." A third time, the imp said, "You are discouraged." The saint replied very emphatically the third time, "I AM NOT DISCOURAGED!" So, the imp jumped down and went back to the devil. The devil asked, "What happened?" The imp said, "I tried to discourage him but he was so emphatic that he discouraged me." This saint knew that whatever he was facing in life was meant for his good, therefore the enemy was unable to discourage him.

May the Lord help us all to understand better that the things that touch our lives have not slipped in without the Lord's permission, and that we will be able to give thanks in everything, knowing that "this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you."

A Beautiful Love Story

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Editorials

We are living in an age when sin is prevalent, justice is misconstrued, and morals are subordinate to greed. Due to the effectiveness of the news media in bringing many of these things to the forefront, every honest-hearted person faces the temptation that has plagued other generations, and Solomon addressed when he wrote, "Fret not thyself because of evil men, neither be thou envious at the wicked." Proverbs 24:19.

This advice at times seems rather trite in the face of atrocities. The automatic rejoinder is, "But it is so unjust. How is it that someone can injure, and at times even take the life of another, because of envy, race prejudice, vengeance or greed, and then be turned back into society as the victim of the circumstance?" If dwelt upon, this raises doubt as to the presence, the power, or the justice of God.

"For I was envious at the foolish, when I saw the prosperity of the wicked." Ps. 73:3. Power attends prosperity and is where the injustice is seen and felt. Thus great resources are at the prosperous person's disposal. Despots of history have enslaved whole continents, and contrived genocide against entire races. Even in civilized countries there are rulers that hold life in low esteem and have the authority to make murder legal, and we wonder where justice for the innocent is.

One author has written these thoughts, "The triumph of bad men gives them exceptional opportunities for spreading the infectious malaria of their sin. When a bad man prospers, he contaminates his trade, lowers the character of business generally, and tempts his employees to do wrong on a scale that is proportionate to his enterprises."

Still, in view of all these things, we should not let our peace be ruffled by the prosperity of the wicked. Always keep in mind that the rewards of prosperity are highly inferior to the blessings of moral character. The eternal question is not what a man has, and how much sway he can exert in this life, but how rich he feels in his soul. Therefore, to envy the wicked is in effect putting stock in things that are subservient to the rewards of the righteous.

The gain of the wicked is a short-lived illusion. It is possible to be full of the baser satisfactions of life, and still starving for fulfillment. It is like the thirsty who drown their appetite with salt water and are plunged into a madness for more water. The only way to find any contentment in sin is by deadening the higher nature that the soul craves. And follow the path of those who stray, and see if justice is not truly meted out. The poet, Ralph Emerson, once explained it this way. "The dice of God are always loaded. Every secret is told, every crime is punished, every virtue rewarded, every wrong redressed, in silence and certainty. The thief steals from himself. The swindler swindles himself." If the errant triumphs in one point, there are many ways in which he is frustrated, and it is only the godly who find the true meaning of life and the power to overcome adversity with peace.

Our eyes are also many times beholden when we consider the plight of the innocent on which an evil is perpetrated. Our sympathies are not misplaced upon them, yet we must realize that God's love for them will make a way for their eternal happiness if they so choose.

It is vital for us, in the face of the prosperity of the wicked, to put our hope in God, pray for them, and continue on in the service of a victorious Christ. He won the battle at Calvary where He fought every power the devil could muster, and He will continue to scatter the forces of evil right up to the day of that final and climactic day of retribution.

It is a testimony to the power and goodness of God, as well as to the liberality of the saints, that this issue marks the beginning of our 72nd year of publication. Many rough places have been traversed through the years, and many blessings have been obtained. We still face the same challenges that were fought in the Print Shop's formative years; albeit in perhaps a little different setting. The need for the Gospel is greater today than it has ever been, and we seek the continued interest of the saints so that more can be accomplished in the days ahead.



True Wisdom Is From Above

Wisdom is of God. This world operates on values related to "wisdom" from below.

"If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not; and it shall be given him." James 1:5.

"Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, and cometh down from the Father of lights, with whom is no variableness, neither shadow of turning." James 1:17.

This wisdom and love that comes down from above brings us to repentance before an almighty God, and then molds our spirit to serve God and our fellowman. The power that comes from above will "flatten" us down and extend us horizontally to others around us. Christ gave us the pattern, that He might bring salvation to the world. "And being found in fashion as a man, he humbled himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross." Phil. 2:8.

Christ said that He that would be great must be a servant, which is very much in contrast to the "wisdom" that comes from the other direction. The "wisdom" from beneath is also a power, but not the power of light and love, but the power of darkness and pride. The direction of the power from beneath is pushing up. The "wisdom" from below gives people a "high" on fame, wealth, lust; or the most deceiving high is on religion. The "wisdom" from beneath will destroy man—body, soul, mind and spirit.

Look around you today and at the history of the world recorded in the Bible and other books of history to understand the influence of the "wisdom" from below.

"And Solomon loved the Lord, walking in the statutes of David his father: only he sacrificed and burnt incense in high places." I Kings 3:3.

"For they also built them high places, and images, and groves, on every high hill, and under every green tree." I Kings 14:23.

"And he walked in all the ways of Asa his father; he turned not aside from it, doing that which was right in the eyes of the Lord: nevertheless the high places were not taken away; for the people offered and burnt incense yet in the high places." I Kings 22:43.

"But the high places were not taken away: the people still sacrificed and burnt incense in the high places." II Kings 12:3.

"He removed the high places, and brake the

images, and cut down the groves, and brake in pieces the brasen serpent that Moses had made: for unto those days the children of Israel did burn incense to it: and he called it Nehushtan." II Kings 18:4.

"And he put down the idolatrous priests, whom the kings of Judah had ordained to burn incense in the high places in the cities of Judah, and in the places round about Jerusalem; them also that burned incense unto Baal, to the sun, and to the moon, and to the planets, and to all the host of heaven." II Kings 23:5.

"Nevertheless the priests of the high places came not up to the altar of the Lord in Jerusalem, but they did eat of the unleavened bread among their brethren." II Kings 23:9.

"Moreover the altar that was at Bethel, and the high place which Jeroboam the son of Nebat, who made Israel to sin, had made, both that altar and the high place he brake down, and burned the high place, and stamped it small to powder, and burned the grove." II Kings 23:15.

"And all the houses also of the high places that were in the cities of Samaria, which the kings of Israel had made to provoke the Lord to anger, Josiah took away, and did to them according to all the acts that he had done in Bethel." II Kings 23:19.

"Yet they tempted and provoked the most high God, and kept not his testimonies." Psalms 78:56.

"For they provoked him to anger with their high places, and moved him to jealousy with their graven images." Psalms 78:58.

The history of man is full of men making their own religion of self-exultation. You see the examples in the Old Testament of the chosen people worshipping false gods on their high places. God caused them to be humbled down many times by their enemies. Yet man still today climbs to the high places to give sacrilege to his god. "Wisdom" and power from below gives earthly man great pleasure and satisfaction that he can be raised up higher so he can look down on those below him. Also the massive temples of religion make one stand or fall in awe and reverence to god, but what god, or what wisdom, or power? It is plain to see that it is the power from below that motivates carnal man to build a "high place."

"The lofty looks of man shall be humbled, and the haughtiness of men shall be bowed down, and the Lord alone shall be exalted in that day." Isaiah 2:11.

"For thus saith the high and lofty One that inhabiteth eternity, whose name is Holy; I dwell in the high and holy place, with him also that is of a contrite and humble spirit, to revive the spirit of the humble, and to revive the heart of the contrite ones." Isaiah 57:15.

"For all those things hath mine hand made, and those things have been, saith the Lord: but to this man will I look, even to him that is poor and of a contrite spirit, and trembleth at my word." Isaiah 66:2.

A basic question of life is: "Are we climbing up to fall down or are we falling down to go up?" When all is said and done do we want to be on the way up or on the way down?

The devil knows where he is going, he said so: "And the Lord said unto Satan, Whence comest thou? Then Satan answered the Lord, and said, From going to and fro in the earth, and from walking up and down in it." Job 1:7.

Down through the generations, millions fell to the villain's hypnotizing sway, but not her, the King's chosen bride. Sometimes she fled to caves, was killed by the sword, or thrown into prison where she spent weary years. She triumphed in victory in times when she prayed and fire fell from heaven to burn up the sacrifice (I Kings 18:38) or when she prayed and hungry lions cowered at her feet. (Dan. 6:22.) These were the days when the bride of the King fed by the light of moon.

"Until the day break, and the shadows flee away, come with me to the mountain of myrrh," said he to her. "Find safety in the cleft of the rock where my hand will cover you there." (Song of Sol. 4:6, 2:14.) Reserved for His promise, she kept herself true and faithful to Him. Then He arose and called her blessed. He clothed her with the sun. With twelve stars He crowned her head. (Rev. 12:1-12.) And the King brought His beloved to the banqueting house, and his banner over her was love. (Song of Sol. 2:4) Her songs echoed in the valley and rang upon the mountains.

"I am my beloved's, and his desire is toward me. The mandrakes give a smell, and at our gates are all manner of pleasant fruits, new and old, which I have laid up for thee, O my beloved." (Song of Sol. 7:13.)

She feasted on the fruits of salvation, and though the villain re-trained his foxes, they could not spoil this fruit for it was preserved in sanctification. Neither could the villain enchant her to worship Caesar's idols.

Then the villain, that old dragon, was so envious of their love! He sought to steal their newborn man-child and kill the mother, too, but the King had prepared a place of safety for His beloved where He protected her from evil. For one thousand two hundred and sixty years she hid in the wilderness scarcely breathing at all. (Rev. 12:6.)

"I will choke her, burn her, and leave her dead!" screamed the villain in the disguise of the pope. But not even he could quench her love which passes all knowledge. The king heard her testify of His love and His heart bled for her. On the wings of an eagle he carried her away and though the day was cloudy (Zech. 14:6-7) she sang with all her might: "My beloved is...the chiefest among ten thousand.... Yea, he is altogether lovely. This is my beloved, and this is my friend." Song of Sol. 5:10-16.

Then came the evening. The King took her by the hand and he lead her to a beautiful place where she stood upon a sea of glass mingled with fire. (Rev. 15:2.) Reflected in the glass was the image of the King and the beauty of His Beloved. And she sang: "Great and marvellous are thy works, Lord God Almighty; just and true are thy ways, thou King of saints." Rev. 15:3.

Many have been the troubles and trials this relationship has endured yet their love is really sweeter than it was in the beginning. Theirs is a lasting love, a model that every couple should copy. (Eph. 5:25-33.) For if every husband loved his wife as much as the Lord loves His church, and if every wife respected her husband as the Church honors the Lord, then this earth would indeed be just as heaven.



Excerpts Taken From March, 1944 Faith and Victory

When I was a young man, scouting around over the country, I took a job of milking cows in the Puget Sound country of Washington State. I was to sleep in a room where a Swiss milker slept. He had an alarm clock fastened to the sill on the side of the wall with a cord to it that ran to the ceiling of the room, and then out to the middle of the top of the room.
