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The Bread Of Life

We find recorded in the 6th chapter of John a most wonderful lesson and truth portrayed in the days when Jesus Christ, our Master, was on earth. A great host of people was gathered together to hear His teachings. Jesus expressed His desire to feed the multitude which numbered about 5,000 men beside the women and children. With only five barley loaves and two small fishes to start with, (taken from a young lad), Jesus fed and satisfied the multitude. His disciples gathered up the fragments that were left over and filled twelve baskets.

"Then those men, when they had seen the miracle that Jesus did, said, This is of a truth that prophet that should come into the world. When Jesus therefore perceived that they would come and take him by force, to make him a king, he departed again into a mountain himself alone." Verses 14-15. These people were so elated and overjoyed at the easily produced food that had filled their stomachs and satisfied their mortal hunger. They wanted Christ to be their king. Why? It was because He had fed them literal food. They figured that if He would be

their king they would never have to be hungry or have any problem with food again. People back in that time were poor and it was a big thing to have sufficient food on the table. So to have One in their midst who could produce food in such a wonderful manner was about the greatest blessing they could imagine.

But Jesus desired to impress them concerning more important food. The next day a bunch of these people came seeking for Jesus in Capernaum, on the opposite shore of the Sea of Galilee. When they had found Him, Jesus said to them: "... Verily, verily, I say unto you, Ye seek me, not because ye saw the miracles, but because ye did eat of the loaves, and were filled. Labour not for the meat which perisheth, but for that meat which endureth unto everlasting life, which the Son of man shall give unto you: for him hath God the Father sealed." Verses 26-27. That food that Jesus had produced for them from the loaves and fishes was food which perishes. He sought to introduce them to the food that would bring them eternal life.

In the conversation that followed, these people mentioned about how their fathers did

eat manna in the desert; as it is written, "...He gave them bread from heaven to eat." Jesus answered them: "...Moses gave you not that bread from heaven; but my Father giveth you the true bread from

heaven. For the bread of God is he which cometh down from heaven, and giveth life unto the world. Then said they unto him, Lord, evermore give us this bread. And Jesus said unto them, I am the bread of life: he that cometh to me shall never hunger; and he that believeth on me shall never thirst." Verses 31-35. He said in verse 51: "I am the living bread which came down from heaven: if any man eat of this bread, he shall live for ever:..." He further added in verses 57 and 58: "As the living Father hath sent me, and I live by the Father: so he that eateth me, even he shall live by me. This is that bread which came down from heaven: not as your fathers did eat manna, and are dead: he that eateth of this bread shall live for ever."

What a wonderful opportunity is given us of the Saviour to partake of Him as the Bread of Life! It is a simple thought, but carries great power and blessing. We must eat of Jesus. This is not literal eating. It is spiritual language. And how can we eat of Jesus? He states also in this lesson: "... Except ye eat the flesh of the Son of man, and drink his blood, ye have no life in you. Whoso eateth my flesh, and drinketh my blood, hath eternal life; and I will raise him up at the last day." Verses 53-54. This was a puzzling and hard saying to those who heard Him that day, and they were offended. They turned away and walked no more with Him. They did not comprehend the true meaning of Jesus' words and what it really meant to eat His flesh and to drink His blood.

What did Jesus mean, and how can we eat His flesh and drink His blood? It could not be taken literally. We cannot eat literally Christ's physical body. There is a deeper meaning. What is there about Christ that we can eat? The answer is simple, and He literally explains it in Verse 63: "It is the spirit that quickeneth; the flesh profiteth nothing: the words that I speak unto you, they are spirit, and they are life." Here is the answer: It is His Word and His Spirit that we are to eat of. We must obey and follow His teachings and receive His Spirit into our hearts.

This is the food that endures unto eternal life. We eat of Jesus by hearing and receiving His doctrine and teachings. We drink of Jesus by

> receiving His Holy Spirit in holy consecration and faith. We must continue in obedience to His Word and be led by His Spirit. We must not be led or influenced by the flesh or the sins of this world. We

must eat of Him. We must give ourselves wholly to be like Him. We must partake of His divine nature and keep ourselves unspotted from this present evil world. It is a wonderful thing to give a listening ear to the Word of Christ when it is read, taught, or preached. It is sweet and tasty to the hungry soul. We hear it, we are moved and inspired by it, and we are stengthened with purpose and desire to follow and obey it by the abiding presence of His Spirit in our hearts. This is what He meant by eating His flesh and drinking His blood.

People today are feeding their minds and spirits on so many foreign and soul-destructive things. The lusts of the flesh in adultery, fornication and impurity are being gorged upon by the lustful minds and hearts of the carnal men and women of this world. Oh, that there would be more eating of Christ and His blessed Word and Spirit! Let us eat of His essence. Only through this eating of the Son of God can we have hope of eternal life and being resurrected at the last day.

Serving Christ Acceptably

In our new life with Christ Jesus, we have new goals, a new direction and a new outcome. We no longer live the same way we once did. We live for Christ now, and He has rules of character that we are to live by. These rules are stated in God's Word. Here is where we find out what is available to us and what is required. We are now a part of a covenant. What we are looking at today is, how we can be able to do what God asks of us.

In Hebrews 12:28 it says, "Wherefore we receiving a kingdom which cannot be moved, let us have grace, whereby we may serve God acceptably with reverence and godly fear:..." This says that we need grace so that we can serve God acceptably. Grace in this particular passage means, "the divine influence upon the heart and the reflection in the life." So for us to be able to serve God acceptably, we need His divine influence upon our hearts. The reflection of this influence results in a Christ-like character. Just as our character was evil with the influence of the devil on our hearts, so will our character be good and acceptable with God's divine influence upon our hearts. This is something we need if we are to serve Christ acceptably. However, even though this grace is a strength and power, it does not overrule our will. We must apply this grace to our lives and not expect that it will make us do what we should. We provide the will to do, and God provides the means of doing.

Our focus is a big factor in where we are

going. Hebrews 13:9 says, "...Be established with grace; not with meats, which have not profited them that have been occupied therein." We need to be sure that we are not focusing on the wrong things—things that will cause us to spin our wheels and not get anywhere. At least they are not getting us where we need to be.

We must have a goal and be sure that it is the right goal. Will it make us more like Christ? Will it make others more like Christ? After our goal is set, then we must stay on track, focusing on that goal. If you are driving and you close your eyes, for even a short time, you lose sight of where you are and how to get where you are going. Keep them closed too long and it may cause you to go completely off the road. Let's be sure to stay focused.

If we look in II Corinthians 12:7-10, we see that Paul had a problem. He calls it a thorn. He sought the Lord about it, and the response was that he could bear it. The Lord basically told him that he could live with it through the grace of God in him. In verse 9, it says that God's grace is sufficient for us, that His strength is made perfect in weakness. In the last part of the 10th verse, Paul says that when he is weak, then is he strong. It is only when we are weak in Christ, realizing that we can do nothing without Him, that we can be strong. When the grace of God has free reign in our heart, then His strength is perfect in us without restraint.

Jesus' power is still the same today as it was 2,000 years ago. Satan wanted James' soul, but I am so glad God didn't allow that. Please pray for James that he will give his heart and life over to the Lord.

Stubblefield and lived in California for two years, after which they moved to Oklahoma where they resided until their deaths. To this union one daughter, Anna, was born.


Bro. Alton went to be with the Lord on Dec. 12, 1989.

QUESTION: Please give us a lesson on how to raise our children and teach and train them.

ANSWER: There are some cases, and perhaps we all know some, where the parents need to discipline themselves and get themselves well in hand before they even start in on disciplining and correcting their children. The same God who inspired Solomon to write these texts of instruction in the Scriptures in regard to our chastising and correcting our children, also inspired the Apostle Paul to write this warning and admonition in the Holy Scriptures: "And, ye fathers, provoke not your children to wrath: but bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." Ephesians 6:4. "Fathers, provoke not your children to anger, lest they be discouraged." Colossians 3:21. Ah, fathers and mothers, let us seek God earnestly to enable us to more clearly and deeply understand the extent and depth of our responsibility and authority with our children, that when it is necessary to



chastise them, we may do so in the meekness and gentleness of Christ and not in severity and sharpness.

Adam Clarke says in regard to provoking to anger, "If a father punishes his child in severity and sharpness, the child will only be hardened in his sin." One man was whipping his boy in severity and harshness and asked the boy if he knew why he was doing this, and the boy said, "Yes, it is because you are mad and you are bigger than I am." Here is a fair example of a child being hardened in his resentment through his punishment. Sternness and severity seldom work any good purpose with children. There must be a lot of meekness and love in our chastisements and corrections if they are to be effective.

I remember a time when my own two boys had been guilty of what to me was a heinous crime of misbehaving and making a disturbance in the worship service at the chapel. I took them both down to the bedroom and talked with them a little about how bad a thing that was and how desecrating

that was to the worship and service of God, and that I could not by any means pass over a thing like that. I prayed with them and then soundly spanked them. As soon as I finished with that, I just dropped down between them, and broke out crying and sobbing. Both those boys began to love and pat me and say, "Oh, Daddy, don't do that. Don't cry. Daddy. It's all right, we're going to be good boys." Perhaps that little episode did more good for those boys than any other correction I ever gave them.

I can remember my father's dealings with me in the matter of chastisements. He never jumped at me in an agitated way nor approached me harshly or sternly. Sometimes he would pray over it for two or three days. Then he would take me down to the barn and talk to me and pray with me awhile; then he would give me a genuinely sound switching. All the time he was just as calm as if we were eating ice cream. There was no trace of agitation, sternness or harshness. I can never remember a time when my father would chastise me that I did not feel closer drawn to him than before.

As your children grow older, be a pal with them. As they show interests and tendencies to certain activities—hunting, fishing, playing ball, etc.—provide them with the essentials and equipment for those activities they are interested in. Provide time, on your part, to go with them occasionally on outings for hunting, fishing, camping, playing, etc. Let them lead the way in this, for if you don't, you may be planning things for them which they have no interest in and do not like. You may not enjoy the particular thing your boy or girl does, but that is just one among many points in which you may need to deny yourself and your own likes and dislikes in order to be a good parent to your children.

This is something I did not do enough of. I found out later, when it was too late to bless the lives of my children, how much I should have done this to keep a hold on my children. Anytime I would come along where my boys were playing ball and enter in and throw a few balls or catch a few, no matter who or how many other boys were around, my boys would just pull out and start playing ball with me as they did not get to do this very often. That manifested the hunger they had for Daddy to share their activities with them. I did not, at the time, realize the importance of this, but now give this kind of advice and counsel to all parents with young children. In fact, since my children have all been grown and established in homes of their own, I have talked with all of them and acknowledged that I had not been the father to them that I should have been when they were growing up, in that I did



not spend enough time with them and participate enough with them in the activities they were the most interested in, and asked forgiveness for this shortcoming.

In schools they have a "Father and Son" banquet, and other "Father and Son" activities. They expect the boys to bring their fathers on these occasions. When your boy comes to you and lets you know one of these times is coming up on a certain date, it will make him stand tall and help to create a closer relationship between you and him if you will just say, "All right, son, you can count on me. I will cancel all plans I have for that evening and be available to you." It makes your son feel important and adds dignity to his life.

Now to use a phrase from the world's vernacular, "Learn to roll with the punches." Change

your tactics as your children get older. You cannot deal with them in the same way you could when they were smaller. They are developing and you must develop too if you are to maintain a close relationship with them and keep your hold on them through that period of their lives when they need you the most. Study out different methods of dealing with them, and note carefully which are the most effective. This is the time when you need to develop as close a pal relationship with them as possible. Go places with them, do things with them as much as possible. Above all else, maintain a good, close relationship with God. Pray much and earnestly for God to give you courage, ability, wisdom, grace and faith to be able to pilot your children through this very difficult and important time of their youth.

Though the Lord be High

A brother stood up in church one Wednesday night and shared this scripture from the book of Psalms:

"Though the Lord be high, yet has he respect unto the lowly."

The verse was especially impressive to me because of a book I had been reading which documented the personal lives of the presidents and first families.

In it, the author described how one newly elected president turned aside a trooper's request for an autographed photo of himself.

"I don't have time for that . . . (expletive)," the trooper quoted the president as saying. The author of the book went on to describe this response as a "stunning commentary" on the president's character.

This incident came to mind as I thought about the scripture from Psalms, and along with it, the memory of a quote which says, "A snob is an inferior person, with a superiority complex."

Personalize the incident above by putting yourself in the place of the trooper. Imagine the pleasure of serving the highest ranking official in the United States and seeing what you regard as a wonderful opportunity to obtain a signed photograph to cherish and pass on to your children and grandchildren.

Instead of realizing this hope, you are subjected to not only a refusal of your request, but a demeaning rebuff. You will have no picture to present to your children, but you will have a story to tell. However, not one likely to endear any of them to the nation's leader.

From a strictly political perspective, was this not a poor move on the part of the president? By indulging the trooper in a momentary courtesy, the president may have won a supporter for life, or at least created a warm memory.

As it stands now, the only "warmth" of that encounter is probably the hot flush reddening the trooper's face whenever he recalls the treatment he received.

Compare the action of the president to the courteous conduct of the following. For instance, Diana, the late Princess of Wales.

From the multitude of coverage recounting her life, I recall a particular incident one photographer captured on film, as Diana scurried through an airport, attempting to avoid the cameramen pursuing her. The princess held a tennis racket in front of her face as a shield against the constant flash of cameras, but this did not prevent her from catching glimpse of a little girl, quietly clutching a bouquet of flowers, and waiting hopefully for the opportunity to hand them to the princess.

Diana stopped, smiled graciously, and bent to speak a few words as she accepted and acknowledged the token of the child's admiration.

It is almost certain the little girl will remember and treasure that moment forever, for she, a commoner, was treated royally by royalty.

And this is the kind of treatment our Lord offers to each of us, no matter our station in life.

Christ's regard for the lowly is illustrated in Mark 10:13-16, where a group of mothers attempted to bring their small children to Him for a blessing. The disciples around Jesus rebuked the mothers and tried to send them away.

What did Christ do? The scripture says, "When Jesus saw it, he was much displeased, and said, "Allow the little children to come to me, and forbid them not: for of such is the

kingdom of God." The text goes on to say, "He took them up in his arms, put his hands upon them, and blessed them."

I love that story, for it reveals the tenderness of Almighty God, and offers assurance that no one is too small to be significant in His eyes. Compare how the Creator of the universe regards the lowly, as opposed to how men sometimes treat their subordinates.

A stanza from a poem entitled, *Nobility*, by Alice Cary, expresses the truth of this matter well.

True worth is in being, not seeming—
In doing, each day that goes by,
Some little good—not in dreaming
Of great things to do by and by,
For whatever men say in their blindness,
And spite of the fancies of youth,
There's nothing so kingly as kindness,
And nothing so royal as truth.
