THE LATEST IMPROVED

Taken from the book How to Live a Holy Life by C. E. Orr.

As we walk along the streets of villages and cities, we see machines of different kinds exposed to view and bearing a card with these words: "The Latest Improved." For our life to be perfect every day, it must be our latest improved. The world is getting worse, we say, but you and I as Christians can daily grow better. Our life today can be an improvement over our life of yesterday. The Christian life is a real life, and is capable of development as any life. The same law that develops us physically is necessary to our development spiritually. Day after day we can be built up into stronger spiritual beings. We can become more like God, possessing a firmer Christian character and having an integrity that will not swerve for a life nor a world from the path of virtue. Constant progress is constant peace and happiness. It is the triumphant life.

Dear reader, I am going to ask you to lay aside for a few minutes the busy cares of life and come and have a talk with me about spiritual and heavenly things. Now, if you feel that you scarcely have time, and cannot fully dismiss the temporal concern of life from your mind, then I will excuse you. I do not care to speak with you unless you can give me your undivided attention. I desire to help you if you need help. I want to talk to you about your everyday life, and I do want your calm, serious attention. Surely by God's help we can spend a few minutes to some profit.

Some people hesitate to look closely into their life lest they find such a delinquency as will disquiet them. Some fear to give a close examination lest it give Satan an opportunity to accuse them. This need not be. We can look closely into our daily life and not allow Satan to whisper one word to us. We cannot make improvement upon our life without close examination in order to discover weakness and imper-

fection. When we discover them, we must set earnestly to work to correct them. The discovery alone is not sufficient. If we do not correct a fault that we have discovered, we soon lose consciousness of the fault. There are times with everyone, no doubt, when it seems that they are making no progress, but these may be the times when we are making most progress.

If we have just one fault, we ought to desire to get rid of it. Our desire should be so great that we shall set about at once to correct that fault. Now if we say, "Oh, it is such a little thing," then we shall not get free from it, and that little thing may become a greater thing. To be too quick to speak is a fault. The Bible says, "Be slow to speak." If we have the fault of speaking too quickly, we should correct that. We can if we will.

The Bible tells Christians to watch and pray. Christians do not need to watch and pray lest they rob a bank. They would not rob a bank if they never prayed. But we do need to watch and pray lest we do some little thing that we should not do. I will relate to you the experience of a dear brother who desired to live for God, but who neglected to watch and pray as he should. An evil thought was presented to his mind. Not seeing the evil of it, he indulged the thought and found pleasure in the indulgence. After a few minutes he felt the reproving of the Spirit of God and so dismissed the thought. Later it came again. It was so pleasing that he indulged it a little longer than before. Again the Spirit reproved him. In a few evenings the thought came again. It was only a little sensual thought, a little imaginary indulgence of the flesh. But it came again and again. It was indulged a little longer and a little longer. Eventually it worked a fleshly lust into his heart, and after two or three years he was led into actual commission of a sinful deed. It was an apparently innocent thought in "I will now give you, not learned theology, but plain, simple instruction how to make daily advancement in the divine life and to be strong in God."

the beginning, but it ended in sin committed.

There are little yieldings to lightness, impatience, air-castle building, exaggerations, frettings, murmurings, idleness, etc., that prey upon the soul and rob it of peace and the sweet consciousness of God's presence. But there is progress in the divine life for every one of us if we will only give attention to our life as we pass along. The first thing is to have a deep interest in making spiritual gain, and then to be full of faith and encouragement.

Jesus will help you to make some gains each day if you will press your way through the crowd and touch Him. It is the earnest prayer of faith that gets us through to God and makes us feel like giants in His strength. If you would be strengthened in your soul, you must exercise. This is the law of development in the spiritual as well as in the animal life. "Exercise thyself unto godliness." This is a motto we should hang upon the walls of our memory. Its meaning is that increase in godliness is attained only by exercise.

I shall have much now to say about your doing, but bear in mind that the doing is to be not in your strength, but in God's strength. Here are two mottoes to keep in remembrance: "Without Him I can do nothing;" "I can do all things through Christ, who strengtheneth me." By the help of the Lord we are going to tell you how to be strong in Him. God wants you to be a David. Go out in His strength and meet the Goliaths. They must fall before you. I shall not tell you so much you do not know as I shall endeavor to get you to practice what you know. How many times have you resolved to do and have failed to keep your resolution? Your failure was not because you could not, but because you did not. To make a success in any business enterprise, one must give it constant and daily attention. Likewise, if you make a success in the Christian life, you must give it constant and daily attention. You must make it not only a business, but also the first business of your life.

But some make this complaint: "It takes so much time." It will take some time, that is true, and if you do not think you have time, then you had better not begin. What would you think of a man who contemplated engaging in some business, but said he did not have much time to devote to it? You would advise him not to engage in the business at all. It takes time to make advancement in the Christian life. One brother said, "But we must attend to our temporal duties." My reply was, "Shall we not attend to our spiritual duties?" When people talk of having to attend to temporal duties, it appears that they are going to do this if they have to neglect spiritual duties. Unless we have a better enlightenment than this, we shall never make progress in the Christian life.

We have no excuse for not being strong in the Lord. "Watch ye, stand fast in the faith, quit you like men, be strong." Of course, you need the help of God, but God helps those who help themselves. He will not by some irresistible power convey you to your closet and put you on your knees, but He will give you strength to go if you will use what He gives you.

I will now give you, not learned theology, but plain, simple instruction how to make daily advancement in the divine life and to be strong in God. "Dearly beloved, I beseech you as strangers and pilgrims, abstain from fleshly lusts, which war against the soul." I Peter 2:11. Any indulgence of the flesh weakens the spiritual powers. The question might arise, "What are fleshly lusts?" We are here in the flesh. The flesh has not only its desires but its needs. To indulge the flesh in its needs is not fleshly lust, but to indulge it in anything beyond its actual needs is "fleshly lusts." In other words, any intemperance is lust of the flesh. Temperance is a fruit of the Spirit. We are to add temperance to our knowledge. The more knowledge we get of the divine character, the more clearly we can discriminate between fleshly lusts and temperance.

"I keep my body under, and bring it into subjection," says Paul. He spoke these words when talking about running to obtain an incorruptible crown. He calls our attention to how people run to obtain a corruptible crown, and

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A while back I was on a trip with Bro. Joe Fine. We stopped in a restaurant for an evening meal. Seated several tables from us were some men who continually used God's name in vain. After a time, Bro. Joe went over to their table and kindly asked them not to speak in that manner.

They graciously complied. Back in the car, Bro. Joe stated that before God saved him and his wife, Sis. Judy, they had used God's name in vain. But after being cleansed from their sins by the precious blood of Christ, they had quit doing so, and now it hurt them deeply to hear others use God's name in such a way.

Today, we live in a society where it is not uncommon to hear people carelessly use the name of our Lord. Perhaps some do it with little thought, but I would like to impress upon us how careful God would have us be when using His name.

In teaching His disciples to pray, Jesus made this statement about His Father: "Hallowed be thy name."

In the fourth chapter of Revelation, we read that John was taken up into heaven. One of the sights he saw was the four beasts (rendered by many translations as "living creatures") which are signified in Revelation 5:9 as being those who have been redeemed by the blood of the Lamb. They were crying, "Holy, holy, holy."

Just how holy is God, and how sacred is His name? The greatest depth of this question must come from God Himself.

After God told Moses to go down into Egypt to lead out the children of Israel, Moses posed this question to God: "Behold, when I come unto the children of Israel, and shall say unto them, The God of your fathers hath sent me unto you; and they shall say to me, What is his name? what shall I say unto them? And God said unto Moses, I AM THAT I AM: and he said, Thus shalt thou say unto the children of Israel, I AM hath sent me unto you." Exodus 3:13-14.

There was no name understood by the Israelites by which they could conceive the fullness of God. Therefore, God could not give Moses a name to offer the Israelites. They had to experience God through such mix a vious happenings

as the plagues, the parting of the Red Sea, etc.

God is so mighty that the English language, or even the Greek, which is known as the most expressive of all languages, cannot justly depict Him. When we call Him "God" we are speaking of His position and not of His name. His name is felt and experienced in the soul, not described by an intellectual description.

In giving the Mosaic law, God put restraints on the people in forming images and representations of Him. His name was written on the priest's miter so that His name would be before the people, but it was only to be spoken by the high priest at the solemnities when he entered the sanctuary. God was very particular that His name not be associated with something which misrepresented Him or did Him injustice.

He did give His name to His Son. Jesus prayed, "I have manifested thy name unto the men which thou gavest me out of the world." John 17:6. Yet in doing so, God did not give us something of outward beauty to relate to Him, (Isaiah 53:2) but something to experience and feel in our hearts.

Should we not also hold His name in high esteem? Should we not through our actions, demeanor and language teach others how holy the name of God is? How weak and unjust it is for people to carelessly use His name in their language. I wonder what they will do when they stand before Him and feel the greatness of His presence? I don't believe they will have the courage to look Him in the eye on that day. May we behave ourselves with the understanding that we, in this world, are living in His presence, and that He is very mindful of how we use His name.

A number of camp meetings have been held across the country during the summer months, and we are thankful for the good which has been reported as a result of these services. We live in a time when every saint needs an opportunity for encouragement and every sinner needs to be challenged with the story of redemption.

As announced on page 9 of this issue, we have opened a new web site with our own domain. The internet is quickly becoming an integral part of society. It is used to conduct business and transfer information. We see this as a prime opportunity to expose many people to the Word of God.

The internet is also a medium through which the devil works to corrupt the minds of the masses, including children. God has given us the responsibility to keep our minds pure, and He has also given all parents the responsibility to protect the innocency of their children.

With this in mind, on our new web site we will be using Integrity Online, which is a filtered service. We hope you will derive much good from the efforts we are making in the use of this technology.


congregations so that the information can be added under their listing.

MO—Dear saints scattered abroad: God's blessings have been manifold throughout my life, and I thank Him for each and every one of them. Naturally, some blessings stand out more than others.

On Wednesday, September 23, 1998, I fell at work. A new carpet had been installed and at times my toe would catch on it. Others mentioned the same thing happening to them.

On this particular day I took a message to an employee's office down the hall. I hurried; in fact, it was more like jogging. Sure enough, my toe went into the carpet and down I went.

There was a blessing in the way I fell, because I could have hit the wall on one side or a large copier on the other. Instead, I fell right in the middle of the hall, with my left cheekbone getting a carpet burn, and bending my glasses so much I could not wear them. Some way, my knee jammed into my elbow, dislocating it.

Someone asked if I was all right, and I said, "No, I'm not." Immediately a lieutenant colonel came to my rescue and helped me upright.

Dorthy, a co-worker, was very concerned with my face and eye. I was only concerned with my elbow, as I didn't feel the carpet burn was enough to worry about. When the accident first happened, the pain was hard, but I never cried, although there were times the pain shot through my arm when I moved.

Another person drove me to the Guthrie, OK, hospital for x-rays.

The doctor in the emergency room was mostly concerned about my elbow and wanted me to see a specialist. The x-rays showed the bone had popped out in the back of my arm, which made it more difficult since it was dislocated on the front. When I got home, my daughter, Felicia, phoned the saints for prayer.

I had to sit propped with pillows under my arm and at my back to sleep. I woke frequently to adjust my position.

Once when I awoke that first night, I felt the Lord's presence, and He asked, "Nadine, what are you going to do?" Groggy, I replied, "I don't know, Lord, but I want to trust You." Soon I was asleep. Just before the next time I awoke, I dreamed of flames going up and down my arm. The pain was so great it woke me. Now was when I cried. I struggled to get Felicia and awaken her. I told her I couldn't stand the pain and gave her numbers to call for prayer.

Within 30 minutes, the pain subsided. I never had severe pain like that again at any time throughout the ordeal. There were times a flash of pain would make me catch my breath, but once the flash was over it never developed into anything more.

At work there appeared to be a misunderstanding about how to handle the paperwork, and I didn't get in to see a physician until the following Monday, a delay of five days. The specialist said since it was so long after the accident, he couldn't pull it into place without giving me a general anesthetic. If that didn't work, he would have to make a small incision to work the bone into place. He scheduled it for the next day. Everything went well and he didn't have to make an incision, for which I am very grateful. I was told that when the anesthetic wore off I would probably have a lot of pain, and to just expect it. They gave me a prescription for pain—which I never filled.

Three days later the nurse called to see how I was getting along. She brought up my pain. I said, "What pain?"

"Well, the pain you had after the surgery." I told her, "I didn't have any pain."

"You didn't? You were lucky, lucky, lucky." Ireplied, "No, I was blessed, blessed, blessed."

The bone specialist put a cast on my arm after setting my elbow, and scheduled me for physical therapy to start the next day. He even indicated the therapist he wanted and I was able to get her. She was very nice and caring.

The therapy was twice a week for about four weeks, and then three times a week for another two or three weeks. The therapist always seemed quite pleased with my progress.

Once I said, "I guess I'm doing well for someone my age."

"Some people half your age don't do this well," she replied.

Of course, I was quite pleased with the way the Lord had blessed me all along the way. As I said before, there were times when the arm ached and maybe there would be a flash of pain, but never once the hard pain like I had the first night. To Him be the praise, honor and glory.

In March of this year I moved to Missouri, and at times my arm hurt from all the activity of moving. After a good night's rest the aching would be gone.

I really feel blessed through this entire incident and am most thankful for the Lord's goodness, mercies and love.

"every man," he says, "that striveth for the mastery is temperate in all things." If men must be temperate in all things in order to obtain a corruptible crown, how much more temperate must we be in order to obtain an incorruptible crown? If the soul does not keep the body under, the body will keep the soul under.

But this keeping under does not consist in many prayers, in long vigils, and fasts, in severe chastening of the body, in dwelling in a cloister or being a hermit. Do not make this sad mistake. His yoke is easy and His burden is light, yet the Christian life is one of self-denial. But His love in our hearts makes it a delight. We are not to keep our bodies under by prolonged fasts and beatings, but to keep in control the self-seeking that is natural to the self-life of man.
