

"Fear Not, I Am The First and The Last."

The Isle of Patmos is quite small, mountainous and almost barren. Tradition declares it to have been in the side of a cave where the apostle John received a special visitation from his Lord and Savior. "I John...was in the isle that is called Patmos, for the word of God, and for the testimony of Jesus Christ. I was in the Spirit on the Lord's day, and heard behind me a great voice, as of a trumpet, Saying, I am Alpha and Omega, the first and the last: and. What thou seest, write in a book, and send it unto the seven churches which are in Asia;...And I turned to see the voice that spake with me ...one like unto the Son of man,...and his countenance was as the sun shineth in his strength. And when I saw him. I fell at his feet as dead." (Christ demands reverence, but He doesn't want to terrify us. His greatness could crush us if wielded by power alone, but His endearing love is measureless.) "And he laid his right hand upon me, saying unto me, Fear not; I am the first and the last: I am he that liveth, and was dead; and, behold, I am alive for evermore, Amen; and have the keys of hell and of death." Revelation 1:9-18.

When Jesus laid His right hand upon John, a tender touch of assurance and love flooded his (John's) very being. No doubt many precious memories flashed in his mind as he recalled he had been "...sent to bear witness of that Light." (John 1:8.) Several years before when John baptized in Bethabara beyond Jordan, he saw Jesus coming toward him and proclaimed, "Behold the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world." John 1:29. (He was also the

disciple who had leaned on Jesus' breast.) No doubt he vividly recalled Judas' betrayal of Christ and the horrendous crucifixion scene.

"...His heart was broken on Calvary.

His hands were nail-scarred,

His side was riven.

He gave His life's blood for even me."

Before John was born, he leaped in his mother's womb with joy. We can read the blessed account in Luke 1:41-44. John's mother, Elisabeth, upon hearing the voice of Mary, her cousin, who had come to announce the glad tidings that she was to bear the son of God, "...was filled with the Holy Ghost: And she spake out with a loud voice, and said, "Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb....for, lo, as soon as the voice of thy salutation sounded in mine ears, the babe leaped in my womb for joy."

Now in his old age, John's heart was leaping with awe to the voice of his beloved Savior. "...Fear not; I am the first and the last:...Write the things which thou hast seen, and the things which are, and the things which shall be hereafter." Revelation 1:17, 19. In his exile to the Isle of Patmos, he was under holy inspiration to write to the seven churches in Asia. In most of these churches, God had "somewhat against" them, thus they needed to repent. All of them were exhorted to be even more steadfast and to be overcomers.

John was also shown prophecies which must come to pass before the end of time. This

was made known to him by symbols and figures. "I am Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the ending, saith the Lord, which is, and which was, and which is to come, the Almighty." Revelation 1:8. The Lord encompasses all time and knows everything from the beginning till the end and will usher in eternity with the "crashing of ages" at the Judgment Day.

Dear reader, stop and contemplate why Jesus Christ appeared unto John. Jesus had a message to give to the Church-His bride. He is coming back soon and wants us to be ready. While Jesus was here in the flesh, he instructed us to watch and be ready. "Watch, therefore: for ye know not what hour your Lord doth come....for in such and hour as ye think not the Son of man cometh." Mathew 24:42,44. In the book of Revelation, the phrase, "to him that overcometh" is forcefully and repeatedly stressed. Only the overcomer may enter in through the gates of the heavenly city for all eternity.

On August 8, our paper supplies were just enough to print this edition of the Faith and Victory. I felt we would be losing time if we stopped the presses until this issue was printed. On faith, believing God to supply the need, I went ahead and ordered another skid of paper.

On the morning of August 13, we had a severe thunderstorm. The lightning was striking very close to the Print Shop. We went into my office and detected the smell of burned electrical components. The lightning damaged the Macintosh computer that I use to page the Faith and Victory and for many other duties related to the work. It also damaged the equipment for the phone system here at the Print Shop. We are thankful that the Lord protected us from injury, and we are trusting Him to bring His work through these difficult times with greater victory and a brighter testimony of His deliverance.

My vision for the work of the Lord is getting greater. There are so many that have never heard what God can do for them. Not only in the foreign fields, but even in this country. I recently had a call from a man who told me that the "Truth just isn't getting out to people." My prayer is, Lord, help me know how to publish your gospel to all the world. Help me to know how to present the truth in a way that will be effective. That the books and tracts will capture the minds of the reader and witness the Truth of God's Word to them.

On August 25, the Lord blessed us to be able to attend the Sunday morning service at the Boley, OK, camp meeting. Some of you may remember that there was a question at Monark about whether they would be able to have a camp meeting because of the condition of the facilities at Boley. The Lord worked things out for the meeting to be held. Sister Lucille Johnson brought an encouraging message Sunday morning on II Tim. 1:7. "For God hath not given us the spirit of fear; but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind." On August 31 she would have been 104 years old. The Lord allowed us to attend her funeral services in Okmulgee, OK, on August 27. May the Lord bless her children and loved ones.

down the strongholds the enemy has built to take them by force. Take away their pride, their false security, their unbelief, which are paved roads for satan to creep in. Cause them to not even hear the lies of satan, neither the call to riches nor pleasure, but cause them to hear the joy and gladness that You give. Create in them a longing and a craving for that heavenly country.

"Don't let them flirt with the world as Samson did with the Philistines until they put his eyes out. Keep their spiritual eyes open that they may see and know right from wrong. Help them to know that they cannot hold to the world with one hand and hold to God with the other. Help them know they cannot handle and control sin.

"Dear Lord, help them not to neglect communion with You. Help them to always be prepared with Your wisdom and Your spirit as the five wise virgins were. May they value Your wisdom, use it and never exalt their own ideas against the knowledge of God. Give them a spirit of submission and obedience to You. Take out the unteachable, 'I'm okay,' attitude. Give them a desire to be on fire for You, eager to pursue the knowledge of God. I again beg You to give them a keen desire to have an intimate relationship with You. May they press the battle to the end and desire to be in the presence of Jesus in the mansion You have prepared for them. I pray this for myself also. Amen."

"Saved from the Flames and Waves, and Shall be From Sins"

A Christian wife, whose husband was an officer on a Mississippi steamer (which was burned), as she prayed that her husband would be preserved and saved, not knowing of the disaster, was assured that his life would be spared, and that he would be saved. When, the day following, she received a telegram, stating that her husband had perished, she folded it and said: "It is not so. He is saved from the flames and waves, and shall be from his sins." A few days later he arrived at home and was soon converted. The faith of this Christian wife, after praying earnestly, was of the same nature as the faith of Luther, who, after praying nearly all night with some of his friends exclaimed: "Deliverance has come! Deliverance has come!"



"I'll pitch you out of the window if you don't shut up!" shouted the soldier. "Pitching me out of the window will not alter the fact. If you do not believe upon the Lord Jesus Christ you will be damned."

The officer sprang up in a towering rage, but his companions held him back, saying, "Never mind the poor fellow. Don't you see he's off his head?"

"Whether I am a lunatic or not" said Trench, "cannot alter the fact. If you do not believe upon the Lord Jesus Christ you will be damned."

At this moment the train reached Charleville, the officers sprang to the door, jumped out, and looked for another car. Trench leaned out of the door and called after them, "Leaving the car will not alter the fact. If you do not believe upon the Lord Jesus Christ you will be damned."

Two years after, when traveling to Holyhead by the Irish mail-boat, he went into a certain place for refreshment. Let no one assert that the doctrine of future punishment is an invention of hardhearted priests who desire to terrify their parishioners. The most loving and tender Teacher the world has ever seen, the Lord Jesus Christ, spoke of that place where there is "wailing and gnashing of teeth" and where there is "everlasting fire."

The best way of settling the question will be to do as the officer mentioned in the story did—repent and believe on the Lord Jesus Christ.
