

God's Plan for the Poor

"For even when we were with you, this we commanded you, that if any would not work, neither should he eat. For we hear that there are some which walk among you disorderly, working not at all, but are busybodies. Now them that are such we command and exhort by our Lord Jesus Christ, that with quietness they work, and eat their own bread." II Thessalonians 3:10-12.

God has always been concerned about the welfare of humans. Before He created Adam and Eve He provided an environment that would supply their needs. Then He made them with desires to be ingenious and productive, and gave them work to do. Sometimes we imagine that Adam and Eve had no responsibilities in the Garden of Eden. However, they did have duties, even before they were forced out into a world that grew thorns and thistles. Adams workload only increased because of sin. God

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said, in the first chapter of Genesis, "Be fruitful, and multiply, and replenish the earth, and subdue it: and have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the fowl of the air, and over every living thing ...upon the earth." Adam was to replenish the earth, to subdue it (take control) and get authority over animals of all kinds. That must have been a tremendous job! God kept only one day a week for rest.

Even animals were created with instincts to prepare places to raise their young and with a desire to nurture and protect them. Usually the male and female animals work together to bring their young to a maturity where they can care for themselves. Humans, fashioned in the image of the Creator Himself and having a much higher level of intelligence than animals, should be able to do much more for themselves and their children, in relation to self-sufficiency

Paul instructed the people in Thessalonica "If any would not work, neither should he eat." Also when giving instructions for taking care of the widows, Paul advised the younger women to marry, bear children, guide the house, lest they become a busybody wandering about from house to house speaking things they ought not. (I Timothy 5:11-14.) Paul knew they needed to be industrious. It is very evident in our society that idleness is detrimental to any human. Idle careless children grow up to be irresponsible parents. For the most part, these generate lethargic children. Those children pass the same traits on to their offspring. Christ told us to redeem our time, to be productive. Ezekiel tells us "...the iniquity of...Sodom [was] pride, fullness of bread, and abundance of idleness... neither did she strengthen the hand of the poor and needy," (Ezekiel 16:49.) An old wise saying is "An idle mind is the devil's workshop." The Old Testament laws for taking care of the poor did not include free handouts. The unfortunate person had to work for his food.

God promised the Israelites that if they would carefully obey His commandments there would be no one poor among them. However, because they were a rebellious people, He had to establish laws to protect the poor. The laws for provisions for the poor stated that all fruit that ripened after the harvest was to be left for the poor to glean. The farmers were also to leave the corners of their fields for the poor to gather for themselves. Whatever fell to the ground; he must leave or if a sheaf was accidentally left in the field, he was not to go back and get it. When he shook the olives from the trees, whatever did not shake off was left for the poor to pick. (Deuteronomy 24:19-22. Leviticus 19:9-10.) In those years people lived off what the land produced. These laws allowed families who had lost their land to be able to gather food for themselves during the years between the Jubilees. "Jubilee" was in effect only every fifty years. (Leviticus 25.) This law protected a family from falling into poverty and being there forever. If a father sold his land, his children or grandchildren could get it back. Farming was the only dependable way of making a living so land was necessary to avoid starvation. There were certain laws for returning land and other properties. Only land, not houses in walled cities, were relinquished during the Jubilee.

Every seven years the farmers were not to till the earth. It was to rest. The land would naturally produce some crops from the seeds that had fallen the year before, or from the vines or fruit trees already growing. All that grew by itself was to be gathered by both the owner and the poor who had no fields.

When it came to lending money the law read, "If thou lend money to any of my people that is poor...thou shalt not be to him as a usurer, neither shalt thou lay upon him usury (interest)." (Exodus 22:25.) However, "Unto a stranger thou mayest lend upon usury; but unto thy brother thou shalt not lend upon usury..." (Deuteronomy 23:20.) Notice God did not say to give to the poor, but they were to lend to the poor. The poor were to pay back what they borrowed. If a lender asked for collateral he was not to keep a coat, or blanket overnight for that would cause the poor man to sleep cold. Then the poor man would cry unto the Lord and the Lord would not bless the lender who had kept the coat. (Deuteronomy 24:10-13) Sometimes a person would become a servant or slave to the one to which he was indebted. Sometimes a child would become a servant in place of his parent. There were laws that kept people from being in slavery generation after generation. Every seven years the owner of a slave was to let the slave go free. If the slave had served several vears, then his owner was to give cattle or something as a token of appreciation for his service.

Ruth and Naomi were beneficiaries of these laws protecting the poor. When Naomi returned to Israel after being gone for many years, she still had her land, but no one to work the land for her. All they had to eat was what Ruth could glean from the fields of others. Ruth worked hard in the heat and the cold to gather their food. After Ruth brought the food home, it had to be processed into an eatable form. The little grains of wheat, barley or other grains had to be cleaned and ground before bread could be made. Usually animals tread out the kernels on a threshing floor, but if a person had no animal, threshing was done by hand, a long tedious job. The grains were then ground by rubbing one stone against another. From olives came oil for cooking, to burn for light and for anointing. The small fruit about as big as our thumb had to be picked, then crushed and filtered, then pressed and filtered through cloth, a long hard job to get the oil. Other fruit was picked then crushed for juice or dried and then stored. Although the landowners shared with the poor, both Ruth and Naomi, along with other poor souls, worked hard to maintain themselves. They did not live off free handouts.

Our nation does not have laws like those that God gave. Instead of gleaning in the hot sun or the frosty fall mornings, to supply for their families, many spend hours on a couch in front of the TV. The government supplies them a place to live, and a reasonable amount of food. Some who claim to be poor are not poor at all. They abuse the national welfare system, collecting benefits; receive low-income housing, and food stamps while earning money, (who knows how), buying expensive cars and reveling in immorality. Others sit on park benches or sidewalks all day and go to missions to eat and sleep. When the missions are overflowing, they are homeless and sleep under bridges, etc and we pity them. Many should be pitied because they had no childhood training in Christian work ethic, which was such a part of America in bygone years. "Ingrained deep within the American spirit is the willingness and the desire to give an honest day's work for an honest day's pay. This independent spirit has no desire to simply exist on handouts from government or to depend on the generosity of others. It is this same independent spirit that has allowed America to create the greatest and strongest economy in the history of the world....The powers of the world look at our nation and ask where that spirit of honest labor came from and where this work ethic originated. It came from the men and women who lived before us. Those generations were raised to believe in ... honest work, which is found throughout the Word of God." (The American Patriot's Bible.)

People who have not learned or do not practice these principles of honest work, have no mooring in which to stabilize themselves, so following the whims of their human nature have fallen into this miserable condition. We pity those who have missed such a great heritage. However, neither God nor the government is responsibile for their food or shelter. Each person is responsible for himself. God has promised the working person food and shelter and He has kept this promise throughout all generations.

God's system of taking care of the less fortunate forces that person to work for their food and other needs while also giving them a chance to get out of their poverty. God offers the same chance to the poor of today. God will greatly bless them if they will carefully hearken unto the voice of the Lord and obey his commandments. (Dueteronomy 15:4-11.) A person must discipline himself and his family to work. Start right at home, grow a few vegetables, or make things to sell, clean houses or yards for your neighbors. There are opportunities for those who wish to obey God and work as Apostle Paul did. He said about himself, "Neither did we eat any man's bread for naught; but wrought with labor and travail night and day, that we might not be chargeable to any of you." (II Thessalonians 3:8.)

God will bless those who will follow Paul's example. They will feel better and enjoy life more when they take responsibility for their needs. God created man to be industrious and productive. With God's blessings, soon the poor who were receiving help will be giving to others.

"The LORD our God is righteous...". Daniel 9:14. "There is none holy as the LORD:... I Samuel 2:2. Our pursuit of the Lord is on the path of righteousness. "The path of the just is as the shining light, that shineth more and more unto the perfect day" Proverbs 4:18. To find God it is necessary that we travel in a way that is directly opposite of sin, evil, self and darkness. I have a greater concern for a spiritual disease spreading among God's children. I'm going to call it whyenzia. It is an illness that progresses very slowly many times. It starts with the germ of contempt. Contempt enters the thoughts because of some personal injury, dislike, or disgust. At a time when the person is weak, the disease takes over. The mind will be bombarded with "whys." Why have I believed this? Why have I been taught this way?

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This publication teaches salvation from all sin, sanctification for believers, unity and oneness for which Jesus prayed as recorded in John 17:21, and manifested by the apostles and believers after Pentecost. James 5:14-15.

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There is a story told of a tourist who happened to stop and rest in a certain remote mountain village. Curious about the history of the small town the tourist walked over to an eld-

erly gentleman who was sitting on a bench in front of the general store. He asked, "Friend, can you tell me anything this village is noted for?"

"Well," the old timer responded while scratching his head, "Not that I rightly know of, 'cept that it is the starting point of the world." "Oh?" queried the traveler with a question sounding in his voice. "Yes," the old man continued, "You can start right here and go anywhere you want in the whole world."

This story illustrates an important concept that we should never lose sight of. Every other village, regardless of its size, also shares the noteworthy fact the elderly man stated. If we are a free person and we have a vision of a better place, then it becomes necessary that we start our journey from where we are right now. That means we must take the first step toward that sought for destination, otherwise we will never be any closer than we are today.

Often a journey of a greater magnitude requires some planning and preparation before it can be embarked upon. In this instance our resolve to make the trip and begin making the necessary preparations are important. However, sometimes people become stalled, for various reasons, in the planning stages and never take the first step. Unless the first step is taken, the second and succeeding steps can never be realized.

The first step toward a notable goal is often a giant step of faith. Let us notice in the Scriptures a few examples of men who made the first step to obey and follow the will of God.

"Thus did Noah; according to all that God commanded him, so did he." Genesis 6:22. The Lord told Noah of His plans to destroy the earth and gave him instructions to build a massive ark to save himself, his family and a representation of each of the animals that were upon the earth. This was a huge project and I cannot imagine beginning such a thing myself. However God gave him the commission, revealed to him the plans and Noah bravely started and completed the project. Many others saw what Noah was doing and when the time came for them to go inside, the observers would not even take the first step to insure their safety. Today we respect Noah for his faith and determination to do God's will.

"So Abram departed, as the LORD had spoken unto him; and Lot went with him: and Abram was seventy and five years old when he departed out of Haran. And Abram took Sarai his wife, and Lot his brother's son, and all their substance that they had gathered, and the souls that they had gotten in Haran; and they went forth to go into the land of Canaan; and into the land of Canaan they came." Genesis 12:4-5. Abraham's example of faith has inspired many who have set their heart on the Lord and determined to follow Him. Abraham was willing to leave behind a society that had allowed him to accumulate a degree of earthly wealth to search for a spiritual city that was built on the foundation of God's Divine principles. Time after time he stepped forward to do God's will and He found God to be faithful each time. Our God is still faithful. When we answer to His beckoning call and step forward by faith, we will find the true giver of life is pleased to answer our call and respond to our needs also.

People displease the Lord when they are not willing to take the first step to do His will. Perhaps they are bound by affections and fleshly desires and will not follow the Lord even though He calls and calls. Lot's wife is a prime example. She was unwilling to follow the Lord's directions even after the angels took her by the hand and led her outside the cities of Sodom and Gomorrah. "And while he lingered, the men laid hold upon his hand, and upon the hand of his wife, and upon the hand of his two daughters; the LORD being merciful unto him: and they brought him forth, and set him without the city. And it came to pass, when they had brought them forth abroad, that he said, Escape for thy life; look not behind thee, neither stay thou in all the plain; escape to the mountain, lest thou be consumed." Genesis 19:16-17. We know the sad story of Lot's wife. After the hand of the angel released her, she turned back and was smitten of the Lord. It was not in her heart to leave the cities of destruction behind, and she lost her life also.

There is a story of a man who did not understand about the plan of salvation and he did not know what to think about the religious professors of his day. He really didn't believe

there was anything to religion. However, one day as he was musing about these things, He said to himself, "I do believe there is a God, and I do believe there is right and wrong." That day he determined to act on what he knew was right and to always abstain from what he knew was wrong. The Lord honored that man's decision and through the course of time He led him to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ. Serving the Lord is more than a religion, it is an experience that requires one to take a first important step to possess it. It cannot be obtained by simply having godly parents, nor by some childhood christening ceremony. It requires a conscious decision on the order of the man above, who consciously determined to do what he knew was right. Yes, it is a wonderful advantage to have the benefit of greater knowledge than this man had, but His starting place received the attention of God.

"And Elijah came unto all the people, and said, How long halt ye between two opinions? if the LORD be God, follow him: but if Baal, then follow him. And the people answered him not a word." I Kings 18:21. I fear many people today are in a similar condition that these worshippers of Baal were in when Elijah spoke to them on Mt. Carmel. They are not really interested in following the call of God and when He speaks to them He is greeted with a stony silence. How foolish they are to not accept His blessed invitation to inherit eternal life. God answered by fire that day and consumed the water soaked sacrifice when Elijah prayed. Then there were those who believed and Elijah commanded them to slay the prophets of Baal.

Our journey for the future must begin where we are today. The knowledge God has given us of right and wrong will judge us, and unless w^ step in the direction of the light of truth we will find ourselves in greater darkness and in peril of the judgment.

To commence a journey, one must understand that they are leaving another place behind. For a ship to leave port it is necessary for the rope tying it to the dock, be released. The enemy of man's soul is opposed to people following the call of God, and consequently he is doing everything he can to bind them to the city of destruction. These cords are generally connected to the ungodly passions and lusts of the flesh. It is through this avenue that man finds himself bound and unable to take the first step even if he wanted to. Souls in this condition need to cry out to God for deliverance from the bondage of sin. God does not turn a deaf ear to those who earnestly desire Him.

The children of Israel were likewise in great bondage and God heard their cry for deliverance. Moses, a "goodly child," was spared from death when he was an infant by being placed in a basket and set in the reeds by the bank of the river. He was discovered and adopted by pharaoh's daughter, who came to wash at the river. However, this adoption did not keep the heart of Moses from going out to his own people. He estranged himself from his "royal family" when he slew a servant who was beating one of his own people. This act caused him to have to flee for his life. Years later when Moses was in the backside of the desert. far removed from Egypt, God appeared to him and spoke from the burning bush. After Moses' previous experiences, he was reluctant to go back to lead his people from Pharoah's bondage. However, notice these words, "And Moses took his wife and his sons, and set them upon an ass, and he returned to the land of Egypt: and Moses took the rod of God in his hand." Exodus 4:20.

The rod of God will bring deliverance to those who have a desire to be free from the encumbrances that sin places upon the soul. While the rod of God can cause pain and affliction, it can also part the Red Sea and cause life giving water to flow from the rock in a dry land. When one takes their first step, let them also take the rod of God with them. The Rod is embodied in His Word and is manifest in the pronouncements of destruction awaiting the wicked and in the comforting promises of eternal life for the righteous. It is a source of power that will break every spell of evil and bring glorious freedom when it is properly applied.

All of the men and women of the Holy Scriptures, and others since that time, who have found a place of greatness in the Kingdom of God, were required to take the first step of their journey. It may have been as a child, like Samuel, or it may have been as a thief dying on a cross next to Jesus, but today when the call of the Lord comes, it is time to act. For some it may be the next step that God is calling you to and that is likewise important to take. Never refuse the precious call of God. —Bro. Willie E. Murphey wemurphey@yahoo.com

Discontentment and restlessness sets in. When the infected persons go to read the Bible, they read to try to answer the superficial questions that come into their mind, and their soul is not fed. Worship time becomes a time to seek answers for these questions instead of a time of feeding the soul. When God's Word is preached, instead of eating they pick at spiritual food and go away hungry. The spiritual body becomes weak. The infected person is actually starving to death.

In this weakened condition the family of God seems to be a burden instead of a blessing. The

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victim will find himself pulling away to be alone. The only relief he gets is when he finds others that are also suffering from whyenzia. They talk about their "whys". "Why have we been taught this? Why do we do this, this way? Why, there is nothing wrong with this!" As they talk round and round, they are so uplifted by their kindred spirit, their emotions rise, but the spirit inside is still starving to death.

Some that suffer from whyenzia begin to lose their vision. Even the Christian's vision can be marred by the gods of this world. As it says in Corinthians 4:4 "...The gods of this world have blinded the minds..." When our mind is blinded it is no time to reason with the devil, or our own personal reasoning or what we think does not amount to a "hill of beans." What matters is what God's Word says. We are not our own judge. He is the judge. We are to be "doers of the word." Our vision should be to follow God and His Word

I speak from experience. I once contracted the disease whyenzia. I was tired and weak spiritually. I had lost my joy. It started with some contempt that I had let brew in my heart for years. I felt relief when I talked to others about my suffering. We jawed away and discussed what's wrong with this and that. And went round and round in circles and came up with nothing. One day as I looked at myself in the mirror I said. "I'm tired of worrying about all this stuff. I'm going to just forget all the so called 'saint's standards." In my desperation, the Lord spoke to me so plainly. "I never asked you to figure out what was wrong with everything. I only ask you to find out what is right, and that is what you should follow." I accepted what the Lord said and I have been finding what is right and pursuing it ever since. Praise the Lord, my joy has returned. God is so righteous, and He is so good. It will take a lifetime to discover all His goodness. His ways are past finding out.

If you are suffering from whyenzia, beware, for this is a deadly spiritual disease. It is a spirit that the devil is using to hinder many Christians. I have seen its affect on others and some of my Christian friends. There is a time of questioning that is normal in our Christian pursuit, but God will help us to stay grounded on the solid rock. If our questioning has continued, with no spiritual growth and we see that we are drifting from what God had revealed to usfor "The path of the just...shineth more and more into the perfect day" Proverbs 4:18—If we are leaving a love for righteousness, then we need to run for our lives. The devil wants to talk us out of everything that is righteous. We are in the age when tolerance is portrayed as the right thing to do. I read an article of a Christian man arguing that abortion was right. We serve a God whose commandments do not change.

I would encourage everyone to take the advice given in Psalms 37:27-40 "Depart from evil, and do good; and dwell for evermore. For the LORD loveth judgment, and forsaketh not his saints; ..." Ecclesiastes 12:13, "Let us hear the conclusion of the whole matter; Fear God and keep his commandments: For this is the whole duty of man." I Timothy 6:11, "But thou, O man of God, flee these things; and follow after righteousness, godliness, faith, love, patience, meekness." Colossians 2:8, "Beware lest any man spoil you through philosophy and vain deceit, after the traditions of men, after the rudiments of the world, and not after Christ."

"Happy is he that hath the God of Jacob for his help, whose hope is in the LORD his God:" Psalm 146:5.

"The hope of the righteous *shall be* gladness: but the expectation of the wicked shall perish." Proverbs 10:28.
