"In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth. And the earth was without form, and void; and darkness was upon the face of the deep. And the Spirit of God moved upon the face

of the waters" (Genesis 1:1-2). As in creation, our lives are empty, without form, and void, a real mess of a mass of flesh. The Spirit of God is the answer for purpose, life, order, and beauty. He can turn the raw, broken elements of our life into a beautiful creation if we are willing to surrender all into his hands.

The Lord once told the prophet Jeremiah to go down to the potter's house. Jeremiah obeyed and I can see him standing to the side quietly watching as the potter worked

on a vessel. All looked good and well for some time, then something happened that caused the vessel to mar in the potter's hands. Perhaps it was some piece of hardness in the clay that caused the marring. As Jeremiah watched, the potter took the marred vessel, perhaps adding a little moisture, and began working it in his hands once more. He then started forming another

vessel. As Jeremiah beheld this scene, the word of the Lord came to him saying, "O house of Israel, cannot I do with you as this potter? saith the Lord. Behold, as the clay is in the potter's hand, so are ye in mine hand, O house of Israel" (Jeremiah

18:6). Has our life been marred? Is it empty, without form, and void? Have we made a big mess of things? The message is one of hope for you and me. The people in Jeremiah's day felt there was no hope for them. Perhaps they had tried and failed again, so they decided not to try any more but to go on in their own ways. A teenage girl that we tried to help expressed this sentiment to me once after family worship: "I tried that before and it didn't work for me." Well, I knew she was wrong because I had seen what the Lord had done in my own life and in the lives of many others; and it occurred to me that for a recipe to work correctly, all the ingredients needed to be in the mix.

Isaiah 57:15 gives us one of the most necessary ingredients that is often lacking on the part of humanity: "For thus saith the high and lofty one that inhabiteth eternity, whose name is Holy; I dwell in the high and holy place, with him also that is of a contrite and humble spirit, to revive the heart of the contrite ones." It is truly simple;

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when we truly humble our hearts, the spirit of God moves. However, the natural temptation for all of us is to put blame on our circumstances or other people. David, when confronted with his sin, cried out to the Lord, "Create in me a clean heart, O God; and renew a right spirit within me" (Psalm 51:10). David's eyes were once blinded to his real condition; but now he realized the old heart was defiled with adultery, murder, and deceit. The Lord told of an account of a sinner that came to the temple: smiting his breast, he cried unto the Lord, "...be merciful unto me a sinner." It was beyond his ability to get a new heart. There was no sacrifice that he could offer that would create something new or effect any change. The weight of his sins was weighing heavily upon him. David also came to this realization. "For thou desirest not sacrifice; else would I give it: thou delightest not in burnt offering. The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit: a broken and a contrite heart, O God, thou wilt not despise" (Psalm 51:17). The Lord is not interested in our purposes and resolutions to be better; they will soon fail.

As I behold the power, majesty, greatness, and beauty of the Lord in His Creation all around me each day, it reminds me that I can bring the broken fragments, failures, and sins to the foot of Calvary and find that He is able to create anew.

The 600 horsepower engine cranked slowly then burst into life as a squirt of starting fluid was sprayed into the intake manifold. The air boat was the only means to get out onto the ice to break it up then try to locate the boy who had been missing for 30 plus hours. Experienced divers would be put to the test as they experienced equipment failure and extreme cold.

There was no hope of rescue. Those chances

were gone in just minutes after the contact with extremely cold water and one and a half to two inches of ice on top of the pond. Before the two-day ordeal was over, everyone would go through some kind of difficulty. Family members were

with temperatures near 13 degrees above zero. At one point there were 22 police, fire, paramedics, sheriff's deputies, and dive team members, not counting all the news media, friends, and neighbors gathered; so it was a very intense time. The boy's tracks were obvious. They approached from a side street then moved along the edge of the frozen water and then out to the middle of the pond where a break occurred and then quickly refroze with only a glove left on top of the ice.

After walking around the retaining pond area, I noticed there were no footprints in the snow where he might have exited. It was very positive that he was there somewhere in the water

under the ice. Our life is much like this. We are leaving a set of footprints that are traceable. Some folks go missing for years. There are tracks where they once were when they took off into the world. Sadly enough most of them never come back. It made me wonder, did this boy scream for help and was there anyone close enough to hear his distress? Evidently not. The further people get away, the less likely they are to be heard if help is wanted.

Just imagine if this were your son who was

missing. Wouldn't you be glad for all the help you could get to find him? We should pray for God to send workers to help rescue our unsaved children and loved ones. Pray God will help those laborers to be skillful and able to reach them quickly because

time is of the essence. Pray that they will have resources, efficiency, and be persuasive and

influential to be able to bring them back. Remember this could have been your child.

My story has no good ending except that the family did have some sort of closure because their son was found not far away from the hole in the ice. This family's holidays were spent in grief, and now their life is forever changed. Now the question to you is, "Friend, where are your footprints? Have you wandered away. Have you told anyone where you are going?" Thank God he has people who care for you and He is interested in pulling you out before it is too late.

Quick and Powerful!

This is an excerpt of a message preached by Marty
Clevenger at the
Guthrie, OK Assembly Meeting
December 23, 2013

We have a gift folks; a gift that is quick and powerful. It has the ability to preserve us as a people and as individuals. It is the precious gift of the Word of God. Can you imagine what things would be like if the Lord had not seen fit to bring the Word of God down to us in our time? Can you

imagine not being able to draw on the words, "For God so loved the world?" Do you know how many times I have wondered what the Lord really thinks of me? Things

don't always go well for me. I have some questions sometimes. Yet, there are these very powerful words that say, "For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son." I draw from that. Do you know how many times I felt less than I should have, thinking, Lord, how do I approach God? There is a scripture in Hebrews that says to "Come boldly to the throne of grace." Those are powerful words to me. I am glad I can draw from that. "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want."

How many times have I been in a place where my needs are before me and yet there is the Word of God? Over and over again I think of being in His pavilion. I think of being in His high tower. I think about the things of God that have been in me. I hear a word—the word *care*. I heard it the other day and I said, "Yes! Casting all your care upon

Him for He careth for YOU." It was there. The Word of God meant something. It means something. When I need something there is something to draw on. Can you imagine if you didn't have that? No! I couldn't imagine it! To me it is strength. It is power.

Do you ever feel hopeless? Do you ever feel like you don't understand? There is a scripture that says, "Faith is the substance

of things hoped for." Faith. I draw on the things of faith. I need the Word. I want to challenge us today on something, because I think if we are not very careful we do not take advantage, we really don't utilize the Word of God and its powerful effect in our lives. It is altering. It is changing. It is encouraging. It is inspiring. It is uplifting. But left to itself it accomplishes nothing. Hebrews 4:12 says, "For the word of God is quick..." I do not think that means little, fast motions. It is alive. Do you know what that means? It is not dead and unperforming. It is animated. It is animated in the soul. It is animated in the heart. It doesn't just go there and stop. The Word of God is not dead. Once it is put there it begins to animate. It works.

It goes. It does something. It is quick. The word of God is quick and powerful. It is sharper than any two-edged sword. If we

have a situation we do not know how to handle, I am going to tell you, there is the Word of God for that thing. It will take care of that situation. I do not know about you, but when I listen to the news, a lot of times I am comparing the news with the Word of God. Somebody will say, "The answer to this problem is...." and I say, "No it's not! No it's not! I have a scripture for that!" The Lord already gave us the answer for that problem, and that is not it! The Word of God is not something that just takes care of symptoms. It isn't a "symptom" thing.

At home my Dad would cut down locust trees. When we cut down locust trees there would be 50 or 100 of them spring up in the yard—because we took the top out and the roots were still there. No, there is another solution! The ax is laid to the *root* of the tree. The Word of God is sharp and

powerful. It wants to get right down to the problem. It wants to fix it once and for all. It wants to do what is not possible for anything else to do. I read something where a woman was a worrier. Finally, she saw her doctor who said, "You just worry too much." He said, "You know they did a study and 80 percent of what you worry about doesn't come true." She said, "See it works!" That is proof! She worried about them and 80 percent of them didn't come true! The Lord does not want us thinking about those kinds of things. He said we should do His will and follow Him and do what we are supposed to do and quit worrying about what the country is going to do, what the nation is going to do, what this will do and what that will do. God already told us it was in His hands. He said, "Be servants of God!" Thank God for the Word of God today! But, it is meaningless if I don't apply it.



Do you know what the world needs to hear? They don't need to hear my opinion! They don't need to hear our opinions! They need to hear the Word of God. It is quick and powerful. It will bring conviction to hearts.

I want to look at anther scripture in Jeremiah 23:29. "Is not my word like as a fire?" See, a fire has life, doesn't it? Fire quits burning when it quits consuming. As long as fire is burning it is consuming something. Burning it up. Has not my word the ability to burn up everything unlike God? Isn't my word powerful enough to do it? Isn't my word – placed in the right place – profitable? Can it take out what needs to be taken out? Sure it can. It is quick. It is alive. Fire burns. It is alive. It is powerful – to destroy. We need that destroying element. To destroy self, selfishness. To destroy the things the world is trying to bring into our midst. Purity. We need purity of heart and mind.

I know the world religions don't teach it, but it is still truth. You know, the Word of God says we should be holy because He is holy.

You want to live for God? It is a holy way. How are you going to get that way? Words of fire burn up all the other elements – if applied. Yes, Lord. Give me your Word. Help me to speak right, act right, and look right.

I hope the Lord helps me to say, "Lord, let me know what it [your Word] is and help me to apply it deeply in my life. This is the rule of my faith that I will take this and accept it into my life and go by its suggestions and comments and will place it in my life for the betterment of my own life and for my eternal destiny. I believe it is right there in the Word of God, standing forever."

DOES THE OUTSIDE MATTER?

Dear Young Friend,

I would like to speak to you about a matter very close to the heart: your outward appearance. I say it that way because there is a dangerous lie being perpetuated among professing Christians today: "God doesn't care about the outside; it's the heart that counts." But the Bible answers this assumption in

several ways:

What you look like on the outside, for the most part, makes a statement about what is on the inside

I believe lots of room can be given for people who have come to know Jesus but aren't yet familiar with the truths of the Bible. They really love Jesus, and He has saved them from sin, and their hearts are pure. They want to live as God wants, but they don't really know what that means yet. Their fear of God may have been taught to them, since they were small, by the commandments of men. "God doesn't care about this; this Scripture means this; this is what that is talking about." An example might be a no-nonsense type woman who just really likes to save time and eliminate nonessentials. Her idea of that is to give herself a "boy" haircut just for the efficiency of it. She may feel that she pleases God by saving that time. The truth in I Cor. 11 about God giving a woman long hair to be an essential covering for her, which has spiritual meaning as well, has not yet been revealed to her.

That being said, the inner, spiritual qualities of meekness, modesty, quietness of spirit, shamefacedness, and humility are very important to God (think *Beatitudes*!) and of "great price" in His sight. If they are being cultivated diligently inside a person's heart, they will begin to produce changes

in the statements a person makes with his/her clothing. You know how it works. If a person likes "western/cowboy" stuff, he makes a statement about that with the type of jeans, shirts, belts, boots, or hats he wears. If you're into hunting, you would probably choose a camo jacket rather than a wool dress coat. What you're "into" really comes out in your choice of apparel. If you were an employee of Baskin Robbins but insisted on wearing a Dairy Queen uniform to work, just how would your boss react to that? My point is that we really represent who we work for! If you're really interested in what is pleasing in God's sight, you're totally "into" that, and you start seeking to portray that and represent Him, not only inwardly, but by what comes out of your life in conversation and appearance.

God deeply cares about both the inside and outside and addresses both in His Word

Seeking after God's will in dress will have you searching His Word. It will have you saying to Him, "God, I'm willing to do WHATEVER You show me." Does His Word address this issue? Yes, from beginning to end, and here are a few examples:

Genesis 3:7, 21. Because of the shame that sin brought, Adam and Eve attempted to fix the problem by making aprons out of leaves. Aprons were not sufficient, as you can see when God took an animal and sacrificed its life to make coats to clothe them instead. So God proves here that He does care what you look like on the outside.

Exodus 28:42. God was very specific that His priests should have sufficient covering of their bodies. (Are we not "priests" of God today? I Peter 2:9).

Deuteronomy 22:5. Gender distinction is important to God.

I Corinthians 11:1-15. A person's hair does matter to God, and demonstrates one's honor and respect to his or her God-given roles.

I Timothy 2:9-10 and I Peter 3:3-6. Both Paul and Peter instructed the saints to dress with modesty and simplicity. True, God doesn't want us to appear righteous on the outside while neglecting the inside, as Jesus rebuked the Pharisees for doing (Matthew 23:25-28). The outside has its place of importance because of the influence on people around us, who, as God told Samuel, do look "on the outward appearance."

What you look like on the outside directly influences what happens on the inside of the hearts of those around you

Please consider prayerfully what happened on one of King David's darkest days. Il Samuel 11 has to be

one of the saddest stories, but we can read it and learn from it. A woman's indiscreet display of her body had such awful repercussions. A man--because of negligence, lust, and deceitfulness--paid an awful price for the rest of his life.



Jesus said that adultery is committed in the heart when someone looks lustfully on another person. (Matthew 5:28). Does a whole lot more need to be spelled out? Can we not humbly accept this as a fact, that what we wear or not wear can affect someone else? Can we not, in love for another's soul, help our brother, be our brother's keeper, and regard his human weakness with carefulness and concern? What is legalistic about that? That is loving one another as Christ also loved us!

Clothing styles are originated by and/or strongly influenced by some type of spirit, either the spirit of this world or a Christ-like spirit

I would like to tell a true story. When I was a teenager, a group of we girls went to the mall to do some shopping. Along the way, a couple girls began sharing some discouraging ideas about this whole issue of modesty. Quite honestly, before long, a pretty rebellious attitude took shape in this conversation. Some of us did not agree with what

they were saying, but we pretty much kept quiet and prayed silently about it. When we entered the mall, we discovered that a cheerleading competition was going on in the center area. The music, with its sensual dance beat, reverberated throughout the entire building. The young women were in embarrassingly brief uniforms, and their dance routines were sickening in their vulgarity. There was a heavy influence of an evil spirit. You could feel its opposition to God, or anything godly. We didn't stay long, and when we were all back in the car, quietness settled down on us for a while. Then one of the girls who had been complaining about modesty teachings said, soberly, "I guess I was totally wrong about my attitude. There really is a

spirit controlling the worldly people. It was so strong, and I was scared!"

It doesn't take long for something that seems so innocent--just earthly, just human--to deteriorate into something sensual, and then devilish, because that

is the root of it all. Satan is the prince of this world, and his spirit rules in the fashion world the world of drama, theatre, glamour, entertainment. It is at war with the Spirit of Christ, and if we would be true to Jesus, we must abstain from these fleshly lusts which war against our souls. Remember this also: God may not have spelled out every detail in His written Word, but He has promised the Holy Spirit to be our guide and teacher. The New Testament also instructs us that the older men and women were to teach the younger ones about godliness (II Timothy 2:2 and Titus 2:4-5). Diligently consider the teachings the older, godly saints give you. "To be discreet, chaste. . . " Teachings on this will most definitely contain instructions about your appearance. Don't despise them. They are not your salvation--only Jesus is--but they are things that ACCOMPANY salvation. (Hebrews 6:9).

God bless you, my friend, to find a safe, contented place in God's will.

Search the scriptures. Seek to know God's will. He is not willing that any should perish. His words are life, and His word shall judge each one in the last day.


